John Day Dam 'Partnership' Plan Abandoned

WASHINGTON 26.—The Eisenhower administration has given up its plan for "partnership" construction of John Day Dam on the Columbia River, the Washington correspondent for The Oregonian said in a news story Thursday.

Instead, A. Robert Smith reported, it is studying the possibility of having the dam "built as an all-federal project."

Three private utilities, Portland General Electric, Pacific Power & Light, and Washington Water Power, suggested the partnership plan two years ago, offering to put up 88 per cent of the estimated \$310,000,000 construction cost. Rep. Con. (R-Ore.) sponsored it in a bill that had administration backing.

Con, however, was defeated by Democrat Al Ullman last November after a campaign in which public vs. partnership power was a major issue. Smith quoted an unnamed administration spokesman as saying the partnership bill "is as dead as a doornail."

The correspondent wrote that although the administration is studying an all-federal plan it still hopes John Day Dam can be financed with private funds. He reported that officials see some favorable points in the plan of the Klickitat County, Wash., Public Utility to obtain financing and build the dam.

Space Visitors Hit Earth 2,300 Times A Second

NEW YORK 26.—Speedy visitors from space hit earth 2,300 times a second, new calculations reported today.

These visitors are meteors or shooting stars.

They are so numerous they might literally blast open a space ship long before it could journey to the moon or Mars. They could be one of the greatest barriers to the promised age of space travel.

The new calculations are that 200 million shooting stars visible to the naked eye ring the earth's atmosphere every day. The size of dust specks to BB shot or bigger. In total, the 200 million daily visitors weigh at least 10 tons. They travel at speeds from 30,000 to 100,000 miles per hour, and most perish in momentary brightness from friction of our planet's air.

They all come from so-called empty space, which man is on the eve of exploring with little man-made moons.

Rep. Powell Says Rayburn Bent 'On Purging Me'

NEW YORK 26.—Rep. Adam Clayton Powell (D-N.Y.), who bolted the Democratic presidential ticket to support President Eisenhower, says House Speaker Sam Rayburn (D-Tex.) seems "bent on purging me."

Powell, a Negro, said last night that Rayburn sent him a letter dated Dec. 4 and told him he would not be given a set of new congressional offices. Powell said he was entitled to these offices "on the basis of seniority."

Appearing on Mike Wallace's "Night Beat" television program, Powell declared:

"As on March 1, I was entitled to new offices being vacated by Dan Reed (D-N.Y.). He (Rayburn) has given these offices to Chief of Staff L. B. Nichols (D-Tex.) because I did not support some nominees for president and vice president on the Democratic ticket and Chief did support those nominees.

"That seems to indicate that Rayburn is bent on purging me, but if the Democratic caucus on Jan. 1 purges me as the first person in the history of the Democratic party it will be obvious that they are purging me only because I am a Negro.

"They have never done it to any of the state rights boys from Dixie."

Powell supported the Eisenhower ticket, he said, because he preferred the President's stand on civil rights to that of Adlai E. Stevenson, the Democratic presidential nominee. Powell said at the time he was still a Democrat.

U. S. Rejects Wool Tariffs Apportion Plan

WASHINGTON 26.—The United States disclosed Wednesday it has rejected a suggestion to apportion wool tariffs on a quarterly basis.

A State Department announcement said 1957 low duty tariff quotas on imports of woolen and woollen fabrics will come under a single annual tariff quota.

There will be no apportioning by quarters, countries or otherwise.

The announcement said this would avoid uncertainty and discourage marketing.

Under this system, low duty is charged on the imports until the quota has been exhausted. After that a higher duty is charged, although there is no outright ban on letting the goods come into the country.

The tariff quota on wool imports will be set in the first three months of 1957. This delay is due to the need to have full figures on U.S. wool and worsted production during 1956.

Under the formula set by international agreement, the 1957 quota must be no less than 5 per cent of the average annual U.S. production in the years 1954-56.

Last year, under a similar 5 per cent of the average of the previous three years, the tariff quota was 14 million tons.

Clo Ann Weigner To Be Released From Hospital

DENVER 26.—Clo Ann Weigner, 17-year-old runaway bride, will be released from Denver General Hospital today. Police said they will question her about her husband's escape.

A jail cell awaits the husband, 16-year-old Mike Weigner. The hospital plans to release him tomorrow.

The young bride and groom were injured in a crash with a police car after a wild chase through Denver. Mike faces charges of auto theft and assault.

"We're going to jail Mike for wrecking a police car, if nothing else," said Detective Clifford Stanley. "We want both of the kids to clear up a few points."

Weigner has been charged in California with tying up Clo Ann's parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Mowall, and taking the girl off in the night.

Mowall said they were married last month in Montana. Mike was sent to a California state mental hospital but escaped.

Crown Zellerbach, Time Plan Huge Paper Mill

NEW YORK 26.—Crown Zellerbach Corp. and Time Inc. are embarking jointly on a \$1 million dollar paper mill in Louisiana.

The joint venture, a paper-making and magazine-publishing concern, announced their plan Wednesday. The joint announcement said the plant, to be at St. Francisville, will produce machine-coated magazine paper.

Crown Zellerbach will own the plant. It will get half the output for marketing in the Midwest and East. Time Inc. will get the other half for its magazines.

The mill, 25 miles north of Baton Rouge on the Mississippi, will create an abundant supply of white as well as the hardwoods which have had little economic use.

MUST REGISTER BIKES

PORTLAND 26.—Police registration of all Portland bicycles is required before Jan. 1, the department's juvenile division reported Thursday.

The purpose, under a new city ordinance, is to cut down on thefts and to aid in restoring recovered bicycles to their owners.

Gordon W. Ware Passes Wednesday

Gordon W. Ware, well-known rancher and livestock raiser, died suddenly Dec. 26 in a local hospital at the age of 41.

Ware was born in Roseburg May 28, 1915, the son of Edward and Nora Jones Ware, whose families were early Douglas County settlers.

Ware was married to Ruth Houlik on Oct. 6, 1933, in Roseburg. He was associated in partnership with his brother, Darley E. Ware, in livestock raising.

He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church, Roseburg; Elks Lodge, the Douglas County Livestock Assn. and the East Douglas Farm Bureau.

Surviving are his widow, Ruth Ware, Roseburg; two sons, Larry Ware, Roseburg, and Edward Ware, USAF, now stationed in France; a daughter, Linda Ware, Roseburg; one sister, Mrs. William (Shirley) Calhoun, Myrtle Creek; and one brother, Darley Ware, Roseburg.

The body has been removed to Long & Orr Mortuary and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Sumatra Revolt Leader Surrenders Command

"The 13 original American colonists had no idea of its rights, each one afraid of too much central authority, but each one wanting to preserve our 11-year-old republic."

A government delegation sent to central Sumatra to confer with the military junta in control there returned last night reporting failure.

A spokesman for the group, criminal investigation chief Sulaiman, said the mission failed because it represented Sastroamidjojo's government, not President Sukarno. Sulaiman said the rebels would deal only with the President.

The military groups in north and central Sumatra, Indonesia's second largest and richest island, took over the civilian provincial administrations late last week in bloodless coups. In nightly radio broadcasts since the uprising, they have reiterated that they want Sastroamidjojo to go and the reunion of Sukarno and former Vice President Mohammed Hatta, the latter a Sumatran.

They also have declared they do not want to split from the republic, but seek government reforms and more autonomy for the provinces.

TV Quiz Show Producers Sued

NEW YORK 26.—A West Coast night club dancer has filed a \$100,000 suit in U. S. District Court against the television quiz program, "The Big Surprise," answering she "deliberately" asked a question the producers knew she couldn't answer.

Miss Dale Logue, a red-haired dancer now appearing in a Las Vegas, Nev., club, contended Wednesday that she was cheated out of a \$100,000 jackpot.

Miss Logue said she missed a \$20,000 question on the program Nov. 6 after she first had missed it in a "warm-up session" that preceded the broadcast. Her category was astronomy.

Sieve Carlin, executive producer of Entertainment Productions, Inc., which produces the NBC network show, termed the allegations "ridiculous and hopeless."

Carlin said the question missed by Miss Logue involved naming a star in the constellation and the date of its discovery. He said she knew the first two parts of the question, but failed on the third.

New High Speed Plane Makes Initial Flight

WASHINGTON 26.—The Air Force announced Thursday that the Convair F106A—a new delta-wing, high speed jet interceptor—made its first flight at Edwards Air Force Base, Calif., Wednesday.

The Air Force announcement said the faster-than-sound fighter is designed to hunt down attacking bombers in any kind of weather, day or night, using new electronic aiming devices.

The Air Force announcement contained no details about the plane. All information, including the type of engine used, was withheld by Pentagon censors.

However, it was understood the F106A used a Pratt and Whitney J75 jet engine which produces 10,000 to 20,000 pounds of thrust.

The Glide minister said he had known some Hungarians, but has forgotten most of it now. So he has invited the help of the Rev. Mr. Faulkner and the Rev. Virgil Savage of the Conservative Baptist Church to live in Roseburg. The ministers will bring them here by car.

The Rev. Mr. Faulkner said he knows of no one in the community who knows the Hungarian language.

The language barrier won't prevent the two churches from aiding the immigrants, though. The Rev. Mr. Savage said that they will live in a house at 2740 W. Harvard Ave. through the courtesy of the owner, Warren Ciolek.

And the churches now are trying to collect clothing for the family and furniture for the house. There also the matter of jobs, and the churches are attempting to find employment for the adults of the family. The Red Cross, the woman wrote, has been caring for their needs in Austria.

The Rev. Mr. Faulkner spent five years in Eastern Europe in the late 20s and early 40s as a missionary. Three years were spent in Budapest, and it was then that he knew of Mrs. Fehervari through his parents.

He said he hadn't heard of the family again until Mrs. Fehervari's letter, for the Iron Curtain had clamped shut behind the people he knew.

Oregon Groups Join In Fight To Back PAA

PORTLAND 26.—Five Oregon groups have joined in a fight to have Portland included on direct air service via the great circle route to northern Europe.

The five—the Portland Freight Traffic Assn., the Port of Portland, the city of Portland, the Portland Chamber of Commerce and the state Public Utilities Commission—filed with the Civil Aeronautics Board exceptions to an examiner's recommendation against inclusion of Portland.

Pan-American Airways and Trans-World Airways sought to originate daily flights from Los Angeles and San Francisco to England and the Scandinavian countries. The examiner ruled that Pan-Am should make one stop a week in Seattle but none in Portland.

Frank S. Clay, secretary-manager of the traffic freight association, said a brief is to be filed soon with the CAB.

Grand Jury To Probe Theft Of Oil Maps

PITTSBURGH 26.—A federal grand jury was summoned today to look into the alleged pilfering of valuable oil exploration maps from the Gulf Oil Corp. offices here.

The case came to light Dec. 18 when U. S. Atty. Malcolm Anderson made a public announcement and FBI agents arrested three men in New York.

Anderson said the maps were stolen by a trusted Gulf employee who was in debt to New York gamblers. He said potential oil reserves were listed on the maps and that the information was used to purchase leases before Gulf's real estate department could do so.

NEWMAN, Ga. 26.—An explosion in the smelting department of an aluminum products plant early Thursday killed two workers and injured at least four others, one critically.

Steel Industry Loses Battle For Tax Assists

WASHINGTON 26.—The steel industry has lost its battle for further government tax aid in expanding its facilities.

The Office of Defense Mobilization rejected yesterday the industry's request that rapid tax amortization be permitted on the cost of another round of plant expansions to meet a growing need for steel.

ODM Director Arthur S. Flemming announced also the government will not set up a priority system to channel steel supplies to other needed uses and could lead eventually to a "controlled economy" in peacetime.

Under the tax amortization program in which the steel industry shared during the Korean War, a company is permitted for tax purposes to charge off a substantial portion of the cost of a new plant within five years. Normally the depreciation must be figured over a period of 20 years or more. At the faster rate, more of the cost could be met from money which otherwise would go to the government in income taxes.

Snows Blanket Northeast Areas

Heavy snows blanketed some areas of the Northeast Thursday in the wake of a surprise winter storm.

Buffalo, N.Y., took the bulk of the snowfall, accumulating more than 10 inches. Numerous traffic snarls were caused by the storm and American Airlines canceled operations overnight.

Other snowfalls were reported in the northern Ohio Valley, Pennsylvania and western New York. In the Great Lakes region an additional four inches fell at Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., increasing the snow cover there to 14 inches.

In Florida temperatures remained uncomfortably cool. The mercury slid into the low 40s at Miami overnight.

Clear and unseasonably mild winter weather continued over most of the Midwest, Northwest and Far West.

Revolutionary Car Designer Passes

YPSILANTI, Mich. 26.—Preston Tucker, 53, whose plans to revolutionize auto making raised hopes and heartaches, died at a hospital here yesterday.

A native of Capac, Mich., Tucker entered the hospital about three weeks ago suffering from cancer. He was stricken with pneumonia shortly before his death.

With him perished the fading hope that his Tucker Torpedo might yet be seen in the nation's garages.

After World War II, Tucker's plans for a rear-engine car gained widespread publicity.

In February 1946, he revealed that the Torpedo would be of tear-drop design with a 150 horsepower engine capable of speeds up to 130 m.p.h.

Revolutionary features included front fenders which turned with the wheels. The aluminum-and-plastic car was to sell for about \$3000.

A model was unveiled in 1947 but it never went into production at the former defense plant in Chicago which Tucker had leased from the government.

Generally Fair Weather Seen

Generally fair weather is expected through Friday in Oregon but the weatherman predicted that the fog and low clouds which have hampered road, water and air travel will continue to blanket the state's valleys.

Ships in the Columbia River began moving again Thursday morning after being tied up throughout the night by heavy fog.

Portland International Airport Thursday was open to air traffic after being closed during the night. One of its first incoming flights carried 60 Hungarian refugees bound for Seattle.

The Highway Commission said roads were "bare" throughout the state but travel was closed by fog throughout Western and Southern Oregon.

Baker reported the lowest temperature in the state Thursday morning, a brisk seven degrees. Rancourt at Crater Lake National Park Wednesday reported a Wednesday high of 57 despite a 26-inch snow depth.
