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ACTION IN PROSPECT

Looking into the crystal ball at the year 1957 we can see one thing for sure, the ensuing year will be one of hard work for the world's newspapers.

Everything points to a year of politics, of nerve tensions, of international crises, in addition to all the normal happenings.

Starting close at home, we find that we will have some substantial changes in local government, including a majority switch in personnel and political affiliation on the county court.

Our State Legislature will be dominated by the Democratic Party. At the national level we will have a Republican President and a Democratic Congress. Congress and the Oregon Legislature are certain to produce political pyrotechnics to start excitement early.

Recent events in international affairs appear to be only a tune-up for the coming year. It is entirely possible that the year could see the collapse of Communism, the emergence of the United Nations as the guardian of peace, and relief from the tensions of the long continued Cold War. I fear, however, that we are more apt to experience even greater crises than we have been through, and that the threat of a third World War is not yet to be dispelled.

Legislative Fight Looms

It is quite apparent, I believe, that 1957 will be a year to keep news reporters, editors and all press media exceptionally busy.

Let's start with the Oregon Legislature. In the first place we have a Legislature with an unusually large number of freshman members. I don't agree with some observers that this is all bad. It is true that it will be more difficult to organize the Legislature; that it will be necessary to instruct members in techniques and procedures; that we have interrupted the continuity of many studies. On the other hand we will have some fresh ideas. Freshmen must take an active part in the session instead of following the usual course of being "seen but not heard" during their first year. These same members will be less apt to be bound by precedent and procedure. As a result they may come up with some refreshing innovations.

Republicans are exceedingly vocal about pledges by many of the successful candidates to provide more services while reducing taxes. Voters obviously were not influenced by campaign promises, pledges or platforms. Otherwise they would not have supported candidates promising the impossible. Thus, in my opinion, the general public will not be too critical of legislators who "change their minds" after taking a look at the situation.

Democratic candidates, for example, were almost unanimous in opposition to sales taxes. At the same time they denounced the surtax. Yet it will be necessary to raise more money than ever before to keep the state government operating.

Whole Program Needed

Although Oregon voters have rejected a sales tax on previous occasions, it is my observation that much of the opposition arises from fear that a sales tax would be only an "extra" tax. A sales tax, submitted as a part of an entirely new tax program, would have a much better chance of gaining approval than have any of the proposals previously presented to the people, I believe.

If the Democrats would offer a tax program in which property taxes would be left to local sources, incomes below \$5,000 exempted from income taxes, with rather sharply graduated rates above \$5,000, and a general sales tax at comparatively low rate applied with but few exemptions, thus serving to keep the rate low, I believe the public would treat the "package" proposal favorably. Despite pre-election campaigning against a sales tax, I believe the Legislature would do well to submit a whole tax program to voters as early as possible, giving time to act late in the session upon decisions handed down by voters.

But taxes will be only one of many interesting issues to be faced by the Legislature. At the same time Congress will be in session. The Democrats will be in control, but probably will be in a fight among themselves, inasmuch as chairmanships will be held by the Southern (conservative) Democrats while the Northern (liberal) Democrats will be trying to put across their left-wing policies.

With all this in prospect, the early part of the new year appears in our crystal ball to offer plenty of action.

SALEM — Train speeds in 27 Oregon cities were fixed Thursday by Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Holtzel.

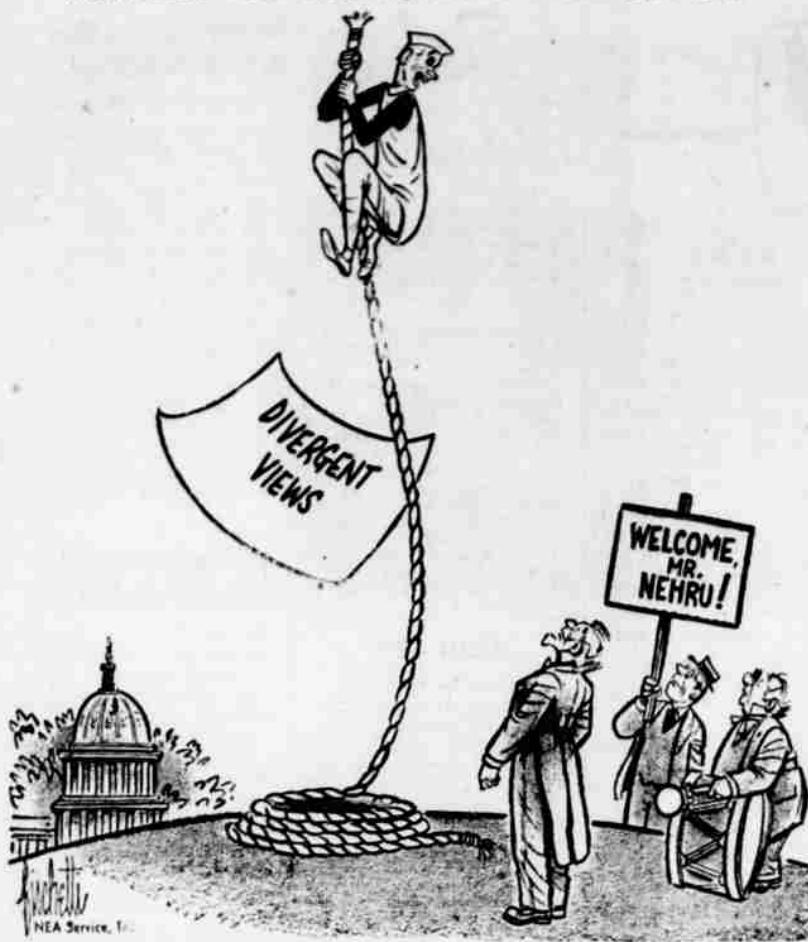
All of the cities are on the Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railway system, and its two subsidiaries, the Oregon Electric and Oregon Trunk.

Helzel adopted most of the limits that had been fixed by the cities, although he did increase the limits in some cases.

urer and he takes care of the situation. If the household bank account runs low, a new tax is levied and that's that.

It sounds wonderful. But Juliana is fed up with it. She wants to run her own life. In her annual Christmas broadcast to her people she up and says so.

Screwball? I wouldn't know. But note, please, that all over the world people are demanding the right to RUN THEIR OWN AFFAIRS.

Why shouldn't a queen yearn to hold her own affairs, just like millions of commoners?

In Britain another queen takes to the air waves. In a royal Christmas broadcast Elizabeth pleads with her people to be tolerant; to be reasonable; to be SENSIBLE. Specifically, she urges "healing of the serious rift that has imperiled the unity of the British Commonwealth as a result of the recent Anglo-French attack on Egypt."

She calls for UNITY. What she means is this: "We pulled a boner. Let's admit it, instead of trying to lay the blame on somebody else. Let's forget our wounded pride and get down to business and work with our allies, for if we don't we'll get into serious trouble."

So much for queens — who are born to their jobs.

Let's turn now to ELECTIONS of officials — in this case President Sukarno of Indonesia.

Sukarno has a rebellion on his hands. It is a peculiarly embarrassing rebellion. It is embarrassing for this reason:

For a long, long time the Indonesians weren't allowed to run their own affairs. They were a colonial people, under the ruler-ship of the Dutch. They yelled bloody murder over the injustice of it and demanded the right to run their own shebang. Under the leadership of Sukarno, they pushed loose from the Dutch and set up their own government, with Sukarno at the head of it.

NOW a considerable number of them are dissatisfied with the government as administered by Sukarno and under the leadership of an Indonesian army colonel by the name of Simbolon they are REBELLING against Sukarno — just as Sukarno rebelled against the rule of the Dutch.

So Sukarno is calling for UNITY — which in this case means UNITY BEHIND SUKARNO.

What I'm getting at is this: We're hearing a lot in these days about the cruel injustice of ruler-ship of one set of people by another set of people. We're especially critical of the system of colonial empires, under which one people holds ruler-ship over another people. We're pretty sure that's BAD.

But — No sooner did the Indonesians get out from under the thumb of the Dutch than they began to get restive under the thumb of the leader who got them out from under the thumb of the Dutch. Now they're staging a rebellion against him.

And in Britain one segment of Britishers is dissatisfied with government as administered by another segment of Britishers — and Queen Elizabeth has to call for unity behind the government in power, just as Sukarno is calling for unity behind Sukarno.

And in The Netherlands Queen Juliana is fed to the chin WITH THE WHOLE SYSTEM OR RULER-SHIP, under which THE QUEEN can't do as she pleases but has to do as other people think she OUGHT TO DO.

Where will it all end?

The equivalent of an American 47¢ coin program has also been started for Venezuelan farm youth. Only it's a 5-V program here — for Valor, Vigor, Verdad (truth), Ver-guerra (honor) and Venezuela.

There were some sad failures and total losses of around 1/2 million dollars. But today the Rockefeller assets in Venezuela are valued at about seven million dollars.

Among the more successful ventures is a string of eight supermarkets to 15 stores is leased to a private operator. In spite of some local business competition objection, "sobremercados" have caught on. They are changing Venezuelan buying habits, and they are being copied.

ANOTHER VENTURE which paid off was the introduction of modern dairymaking methods, pasteurized milk and home deliveries.

Nelson Rockefeller personally bought out three of the farm enterprises for three million dollars. He is experimenting on production of basic foods to make Venezuela self-sufficient on things like rice, potatoes and livestock for a bigger and better meat supply.

In 1932 the Rockefellers formed IRECO — the International Basic Economy Corp. — to take over the oil company investment in these enterprises and write off their losses. Later the government's share was bought out to prevent it from sustaining losses.

The fundamental Rockefeller idea, however, is to start these enterprises, show they can be run profitably, then sell them to Venezuelan private investors.

IN ADDITION to these private enterprises, the Rockefellers have organized in Venezuela and four other Latin American countries their American International Association — AIA — for educational work.

About \$5,700,000 has been spent here for this more philanthropic work in the past eight years, but it has come two-thirds from the Venezuelan government and one-third from the oil companies. The Rockefellers supply the management for around \$100,000 a year. Here again, they plan to pull out in a few years.
