

Benton Sheriff Suffers Heart Seizure In Fight

CORVALLIS — Benton County Sheriff Clifford N. Lilly suffered a heart attack here early Tuesday after struggling in the street with a Philomath police officer he was attempting to jail on a drunkenness charge.

Lilly, 62, was reported in critical condition at a hospital here.

The police officer, Capt. James A. Steadman, 28, a former prize fighter, said he could not remember the incident. He was quoted by officers as saying that he remembered being in a night club near Philomath New Year's Eve about what happened between that time and when he woke up in jail.

The management of the night club had called Lilly at 4 a. m. Tuesday to report that Steadman was trying to get back into the club after having been ejected. Lilly went to Philomath, arrested Steadman and brought him to Corvallis.

They were entering the jail when Steadman shoved Lilly to the ground and then fell on top of him, said Aaron Dearing, chief sheriff's deputy. Steadman was jailed by other officers.

A short time later Lilly became ill. He collapsed while being taken to a hospital.

President Eisenhower Asks Standby Powers

proposal which the President said was "designed to deter Communist armed aggression in the Middle East area."

A White House statement said this would be linked with a request for "an enlarged program of economic aid to the nations in that area," to be administered under Eisenhower's personal direction.

The general principles of this new peace-keeping doctrine got immediate backing from leaders of both parties, subject to a more detailed explanation Eisenhower will give Congress within the next five or six days.

Some conferees said Eisenhower may deliver the special message in person early next week, but the White House said no decision on this has been reached.

Speaker of the House Sam Rayburn (D-Tex.) told reporters he believes the President's proposal — which conferees said involved standby presidential authority to order U. S. military forces into action — "will be a very fine thing if it can have proper explanation and practical unanimity in the Congress."

Chairman Cannon (D-Mo.) of the House Appropriations Committee said, "The President's proposal seems to me the only sensible course for us to follow."

Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, the Senate's Democratic leader, reserved judgment. He said Eisenhower's request involved some "rather far-reaching proposals with grave and serious implications." But he promised speedy Senate consideration of them.

Sen. Wiley of Wisconsin, top Republican on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said he "didn't hear any opposition" when Eisenhower broached his plan to the assembled 13 senators and 16 House members.

But Sen. Sparkman (D-Ala.), who was not at the meeting, said Eisenhower has "quite a selling job to do," and added he wants to know more details before he votes.

Aimed at filling the power vacuum left by waning British and French influence in the potentially explosive Middle East, the new Eisenhower doctrine was reviewed at a session designed to give Democrats as well as Republicans an intimate look at the administration's plans for meeting pressing foreign and defense problems.

Vice President Nixon gave the legislators a summary of his report to the President on the Hungarian refugee system. In it he recommended that no ceiling be put on refugee admissions to this country. Eisenhower announced the attorney general will continue to permit entry of refugees above the present 21,500 limit until Congress acts.

The new foreign aid program, reported to total \$4,400,000,000, was laid before the conferees by foreign aid chief John B. Hollister. Some of those who attended said the Middle Eastern fund of 400 million dollars, which Eisenhower wants placed in his emergency fund, was included in this total.

Secretary of Defense Wilson was said to have disclosed that the administration will ask for \$3.5 billion dollars in military spending in the new government year beginning next July 1 — an amount some Democrats already have indicated they think is too little in the light of world conditions.

Conferees said, however, they got no figures on the overall budget, expected to run close to \$72 billion dollars.

Egypt Concludes 1954 Treaty With Britain On Troops

CAIRO — Egypt has formally ended the 1954 treaty that gave Britain the right to station troops in the Suez Canal zone in the event of Soviet aggression in the Middle East.

A decree signed by President Nasser said the pact was broken "from the moment the British armed forces attacked Egypt."

In effect the treaty was written off when British and French planes bombed Egypt Oct. 31 in preparation for the invasion of the Suez Canal zone. The next day the Egyptian army seized the five big British supply bases maintained under the treaty, jailing their British civilian caretakers and confiscated the stores of arms and equipment.

Nasser's action takes away the right of British troops to return in case of attack by an "outside power" — mutually understood to mean Russia — on Turkey or any of the Arab nations of the Middle East. Loss of the British bases at the strategic crossroads between East and West may be a heavy blow to Western defense planning.

The pact had five years to run. At the canal work to clear the wrecks and debris blocking shipment of oil and other necessities from Asia to Western Europe finally got into full swing under U. N. auspices.

Two U. N. chartered salvage vessels — the Italian tug Hercule and the Swedish ship Heracle — began clearing away wreckage at Kilometer 39 in the northern half of the water way.

LONDON — Britain Wednesday rejected Egypt's abrogation of the 1954 British-Egyptian treaty giving the country conditional rights to reoccupy the Suez Canal zone. Britain considers the pact still in force.

The sound of small arms fire marked the coming of the new year in Budapest, Vienna reports said. The shooting went on for an hour after midnight, during the regular six-hour military curfew that kept Hungarians in their homes. Radio Budapest said only "There was some shooting during the night by irresponsible elements."

When the curfew was lifted at 4 a. m., the broadcast said, many drunks came out on the streets, apparently from parties in private homes.

Austrian police reported that the stream of refugees from Hungary is increasing hourly, compared with the rate in recent days. Police said only 483 Hungarians came across during the night but that from 7 a. m. to 10 a. m. more than 250 refugees arrived in Austria.

Authorities had expected an increase in the number of refugees after the holidays, which many Hungarians wanted to spend at home before making the break for freedom.

In contrast to Hungary's drab holiday, Radio Warsaw said "a good time was had by all" in Poland. The broadcast reported there were 250 New Year balls in Poland and said "the mood was excellent."

State Funeral Set For Russian

MOSCOW — The Soviet government plans a state funeral in Red Square tomorrow for Deputy Premier Avrami Pavlovich Zavenyagin, minister of medium machine building since February 1955.

Tass, the Soviet news agency, published a medical report signed by six doctors which said Zavenyagin died Tuesday of arteriosclerosis and paralysis of the heart brought on by thrombosis of the left coronary artery. He was 55.

Zavenyagin also was a member of the Communist party's Central Committee and a "Hero of Socialist Labor."

American students of Soviet affairs considered Zavenyagin to be the boss of Russia's atomic energy industry and identified his Ministry of Medium Machine Building as a cover designation for the Russian equivalent of the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission. These American experts also considered him a top expert on the use of slave labor.

During World War II he was in charge of much of the Soviet forced labor system.

Rhode Island Election Settled

PROVIDENCE, R. I. — Two months after the election, the turbulent fight for the Rhode Island governorship has been settled by a State Supreme Court ruling that Democrat Dennis J. Roberts won re-election for a fourth term.

The court's ruling, that Roberts had defeated Republican Christopher del Sesto came three hours after the time originally set for the inauguration of a new governor Tuesday.

Roberts was sworn in later after Del Sesto announced he would not appeal the court's decision.

The state's highest court threw out civilian absentee and shut-in ballots that had given Del Sesto a 427-vote margin after all votes had been counted.

Roberts led by 207 votes in the count of ballots cast at the polling places.

Newsprint Price Goes Up Another \$4 Per Ton

TORONTO — Abitibi Power and Paper Co. Ltd. Wednesday announced a general increase of \$4 a ton in the price of newsprint effective March 1.

A company spokesman said a letter dated Dec. 31 has been sent to all Abitibi publisher-customers advising them of the increase.

The price rise, he said, is due to increased costs, including higher freight costs.

The last price increase came a year ago.

The spokesman said the price before the increase was \$130 a ton delivered in New York and slightly lower in Canada.

To obtain this special cancellation, collectors should send addressed, stamped envelopes to the Postmaster, Washington, D. C., to arrive prior to midnight, Jan. 21, according to local Postmaster Clyde Carstens.

The envelope address should be endorsed "Inauguration Cancellation."

Storm Wrecks Drilling Rig In Persian Gulf

MANAMA, Bahrain — Oilmen disclosed Wednesday a storm has wrecked a 1 million dollar offshore drilling rig, left 20 Arab workers dead or missing and dealt a crippling blow to a four-year hunt for oil under the Persian Gulf.

The disaster struck a 1,200-ton steel floating tower of the Shell Oil Co., last Thursday night in the shallow waters of the Gulf that separates the rich oil fields of Iran and Saudi Arabia.

A spokesman for Shell, which had invested more than 25 million dollars in the maritime search, said: "Although the platform is still standing, it is doubtful whether it can be salvaged. An examination is being made by experts from abroad."

Delayed word gave this picture of the incident:

The rig was being prepared for removal to a drilling site in deeper water. Weather forecasts had indicated a low could be started during the night, but a northeasterly tempest sprang up. The wind damaged the two 1,800-ton pontoons on which the drilling platform — its main deck a huge 40 x 140 foot living and working area 40 feet above the water — was mounted for towing.

A heavy swell came on, with 20-foot waves. Under the swell, the crossbeams connecting the pontoons snapped like glass rods.

Despite desperate efforts by three tugs, the loose pontoons smashed against the drilling platform. Heavy equipment broke off and crashed into the gulf.

Orders were given to abandon the platform and 250 men jumped, dived or slid into the raging waters in complete darkness.

Most of them reached the accompanying tugs.

One Arab worker was known to be dead and 19 were missing and feared dead. Forty were injured.

Most of the Westerners concerned in the operation have been sent home.

Tallahassee Takes Bus Suspension Order In Stride

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Tallahassee took a mandatory suspension of its bus service in stride Wednesday with white and Negro riders alike getting to work by walking, catching rides and using taxis.

The problem will be complicated Thursday, though, with resumption of classes at Florida State University and Florida A. & M. University. Many of the approximately 10,000 students at the institutions have been away for the holidays.

First acts of violence in the city's long bus integration dispute prompted the Gov. Leroy Collins order temporary suspension of bus service Tuesday.

He took the action under his emergency powers after a teenage youth hurled rocks through the windows of a Negro leader's home and a Negro grocery store was blasted with shotgun fire.

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Hungarian Family Of 8 Sets Up Housekeeping In Roseburg Home

Setting up housekeeping in a strange land without being able to talk to people is one of the problems facing eight new Roseburg residents.

The new residents are eight Hungarian refugees who will live in a house at 3470 W. Harvard Ave. They are: Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Mike and their daughter, Eva, 16; Mrs. Ilona Fehervari, her daughter, Marianne, 17, and son, Peter, 15; Miss Ruby Olah, a sister of Mrs. Mike and Mrs. Fehervari; a cousin of the three sisters, Miss Theresa Toth.

The house they will live in has been donated for their use by Warren Cloake. In Hungary, one family lived in a two-room house with 10 other people, so their new home looks like a mansion to them, Joseph Mike said.

"We were surprised we did not have to register with the Roseburg police when we arrived in town," Joseph Mike told Rev. Karl Faulkner, pastor of one of the churches sponsoring the group. In Hungary, people are issued identification cards, the Rev. Mr. Faulkner explained. The latter's church, the Baptist Church of Glide, and the Rev. Virgil Savage of his congregation, members of the Roseburg First Baptist Church, are sponsoring the Hungarians' settlement.

Although none of the eight persons can speak English they are learning fast, and it may be possible for 17-year-old Marianne Fehervari to attend Roseburg High School next semester, Faulkner said.

The Mike family has two married daughters still in Hungary. The Mikes cannot communicate with their daughters because they are afraid of reprisals. One of the daughters and her husband struck out with the Mike family when their flight for freedom started in Hungary, but the daughter and her husband had to return, because their small child became ill.

Present plans for the group are indefinite, but it is hoped they will be able to find employment soon.

Sixteen-year-old Eva Mike worked in Hungary as a clerk in the women's fashion section of a department store. Joseph Mike worked as an assistant to a surgeon, book binder and a Baptist missionary. Miss Ruby Olah held jobs in a hospital and as a seamstress.

The two ministers brought the group to Roseburg from Portland Saturday night. Until the refugees get settled in their home, they are staying with the Rev. Mr. Faulkner and the Rev. Mr. Savage.

The Rev. Mr. Faulkner said they hoped the families could move into their home soon, but many plans remain yet to be made. The group needs bedding, a couple of double beds and dining room chairs, the Rev. Mr. Savage said.

tural damage. But the pressure of the wind-driven ice was so great neither ship could maneuver.

The scene of the battle against ice and sea was near Cape Hallett at the northwest end of the Ross Sea, 500 miles north of this U. S. Antarctic base, Capt. Johnson, of Alexandria, Va., sent this account by radio:

His ship was headed toward the Knox Coast, 1,000 miles to the west, to establish a U. S. base for the International Geophysical Year (IGY).

It was buffeted by 70 m.p.h. winds — almost hurricane velocity.

The 100-square-mile ice floe came down on the Arneb swiftly, from across miles of open sea. If the Northwind can clear a path, Johnson said, the Arneb will try to seek shelter inside Cape Hallett to make repairs to the outside of the hull.
