POLES RESIGN

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — The Polish Communist newspaper Glos Wabrzeza published in Gdansk (Danzig) reported Friday that "numerous Poles have announced their resignation from the (Communist) Polish United Workers' Party and ostentatiously returned their party books in protest over the brutal methods of the Soviets in Hungary."

Address Reports

The Immigration and Nationality Act of 1952 requires each alien who is in the United States on Jan. 1, 1957, to report his current address to the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization within the period Jan. 1 through Jan. 31, 1957, reminds Clyde Carstens, Roseburg postmaster.

Every non-citizen except those not required to be registered, who is in the United States on January 1, 1957 must submit an address report. Aliens required to report include:

Aliens residing permanently in the United States.

Aliens admitted for temporary periods, as visitors, transients, students, etc.

Cited To Aliens

Aliens who, through violation of immigration laws, are in the United States illegally.

Address reports are available at the Post Office. After the alien has completed the card, it is to be turned in to employees at the post office windows.

494,600 Persons Had Non-Farm Employment

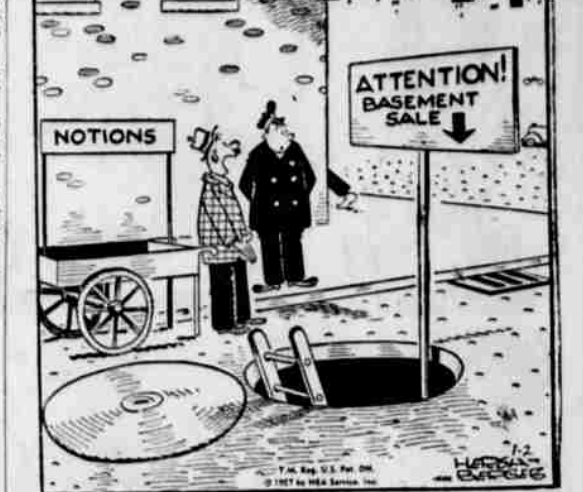
SALEM (AP) — The Oregon Unemployment Compensation Commission estimated this week that 494,600 persons had non-farm jobs in Oregon in mid-November.

The total was 30,000 fewer than the peak of last September, but was 13,900 above a year ago.

The drop since September was caused by seasonal shutdowns in lumber, food processing and construction industries.

Average weekly earnings in manufacturing plants was \$88.47 in November, or \$1.68 more than a year earlier.
