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PCC Presidents Meet Thursday To Revise Code

SAN FRANCISCO — Pacific Coast Conference school presidents continue their longest football season in history Thursday when they gather around a table to revise the loop's athletic code.

Top items are a plan for financial aid to football players and other athletes based on need, revision of the round-robin football schedule, increased academic standards, and more responsibility on individual schools for policing their athletic programs.

Another Bid
It was expected that Southern California and UCLA, two of the schools hit hardest by conference penalties for illegal aid to athletes, would make another bid to regain eligibility lost by players who received such aid. The conference ruled the athletes lose one year of competition.

Eight months ago, the presidents found themselves centered in the bitter controversy touched off by conference penalties against Washington and UCLA and penalties against USC and California that followed.

Since that time the Presidents' Council has met periodically seeking solutions to the knotty problem.

PROTHRO HAPPY AT OSC
PASADENA, Calif. — Coach Tommy Prothro of the Oregon State College football team said Wednesday he had been offered a coaching spot at another school, but he hastened to add he wasn't interested.

Declining to name the school involved, Prothro said: "I just told them I was happy at Oregon State and wasn't interested in any other spot."

Prothro's Beavers dropped a 25-19 decision to Iowa in the Rose Bowl game New Year's Day.

Round-Robin Football
Final decisions are expected during the sessions Thursday and Friday when the presidents meet with their faculty representatives for athletics and the athletic directors. The faculty group takes official action for the PCC but a recommendation from the presidents generally is considered a mandate.

The round-robin football schedule with all teams, with the exception of Idaho, playing each other annually went into effect in 1956. Schedules are drawn with the seven conference games per member through 1960. The presidents recommended that after that the requirement be reduced to five. Both USC and UCLA seek additional non-conference games.

Stanford Favors
Opposition to the plan was expected from segments of the Northwest group which includes Oregon, Oregon State, Washington and Washington State. Stanford's football coach, Chuck Taylor, said Wednesday he favored continuation of the round-robin.

Changes will be made in the aid plan. The presidents have recommended grants-in-aid for tuition and fees to continue plus on-campus work and grants-in-aid for other necessary expenses, based on need, during the season of competition.

Their plan was announced in general with specifics to be worked out.

A recommendation also was made that athletes be required to maintain a virtual "C" average to remain eligible.

Reports would be required of each conference member on financial aid and scholastic achievement. These would be available on request to other PCC schools.

Russell Subject Of NBA Dispute

PHILADELPHIA — Eddie Gottlieb, owner of the Philadelphia Warriors, concedes that rookie Bill Russell can do some wonderful things on a basketball court, but says part of the success of the Boston Celtics' center is due to illegal maneuvers.

Gottlieb's charge yesterday was immediately termed "sour grapes" by Celtics' Coach Red Auerbach.

'Goal Tends'
Gottlieb, whose defending champion Warriors trail the Celtics in the National Basketball Assn. Eastern Division and have had a rough time with Russell, says towering Bill tries to play a one-man zone and that he "goal tends" at times.

The Warriors chief said he planned an official protest on at least one play in Tuesday's night game at Syracuse.

"Our Paul Arizin went underneath for a simple backboard lay-up and as the ball headed down toward the basket, Russell batted it away. If this isn't goal tending, I want somebody to tell me what it is."

Plays 'Zone'
Goal tending applies to the maneuver — outlawed in basketball — of deflecting a ball after it begins its downward curve on a shot. Gottlieb contends that the 6-foot-10 Russell tries to play a zone by standing under the basket and waiting to "try and bat shots out."

The zone defense too has been outlawed in the NBA to keep the game going at a fast pace.

Jocko Collins, NBA supervisor of officials, said he had received no official complaint. He said he had seen Russell play "as far as I'm concerned Russell is playing legitimate."
