farm forest acts

Super trees exist in our forests as do outstanding people in the human race.

Like men or women with exceptional qualities of body, mind or spirit, trees having unusual growth rate, form, vigor, resistance to disease and insect attack and quality are not too uncommon.

Naturally, environment plays an important part in the life and development of a tree as it does with a man. Nevertheless, these super trees, like exceptional people, do exist.

Much has been done in the development of superior strains of wheat, corn, berries and numerous other short rotation farm crops. This work has also been carried on in the field of livestock.

The same method can be used in the development of superior strains of a long rotation crop such as timber. It may take a little longer—but not as long as you might think. At least you can see signs of improvement long before the ultimate goal is reached.

THIS IS WHY far sighted individuals, both in industrial and public forestry work, specify that seedlings they wish to plant shall come from superior seed.

And where does this superior seed come from? From "seed orchards" of superior natural strains of trees, and, if possible, from superior individuals called "plus trees." These are the individuals described earlier in this article.

In other words, ideally the trees you plant should stem from superior seed produced within reasonable limits of the area where you intend to plant.

Now, this business of superior trees is not new as work along these lines has been going on in Europe for a period of 50 years. The German and Scandinavian foresters in particular have accomplished much in this field.

FOR EXAMPLE, in the early days the Swedes planted Scotch pine from seed of inferior or climatically unsuited strains, resulting in inferior trees. I guess that some seed of this type must have found its way to the United States as there are quite a number of old Scotch pine plantations in New England whose trunks resemble corkscrews. Apparently, however, the Swedes were quick to see their error for today they have classified their forests, identified their superior stands and "plus trees" and for some time have been producing quality Scotch pine.

This quality of the country, Leo A. Jan of the Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment Station and J. W. Duffield of the Industrial Forestry Assn. are pioneering with Douglas fir in this field and are making good progress.

Perhaps you might say that this is no time to be fussy about quality when planting stock is as scarce as "hens' teeth." But ask yourself this question: What did Henry Ford and some others do when the public demanded a better car for less money? Also, doesn't the customer control your lumber market? So isn't it up to you to let people know what you want? If planting stock is going to continue to be scarce, it might just as well be good as well as being scarce.

State, federal and progressive private nurseries are well aware of this problem and are attempting to produce only the best. But there is a good possibility, however, that you might be stuck for a while if you don't get your stock in order from a comparatively unknown nursery. So check your seed source to avoid disappointments and get best results.

with the Garden Clubs

Rainbow Garden Club

The cyclamen is one of the most popular of all the winter and early spring blooming house plants. The plant being of symmetrical form and low growing with handsome mottled foliage and beautiful blooms.

The petals are all reflexed and many are quaintly twisted. The blooms last on the plant a long time, with very few flowering and a range of color including white, pink, rose, crimson and purple.

The cyclamen is a tender plant and will not stand frost. For best results, soil should be composed of leaf mold, well-rotted manure and coarse sand. Good drainage is very essential.

Seed, which should be sown in winter or early spring; for blooming the following season, must winter. The seed is slow to germinate. In growing from seed, the plant should not have a rest period through the first year, but should be kept growing.

Seed may be sown in small pots or shallow seed pans and should be covered very lightly with a fine soil. Repeat when ready, taking precautions not to shift to a larger size until the pot becomes well filled with roots.

The young plants should be kept partially shaded and care taken to water evenly, keeping moist, but not wet. By fall the plant should reach such a size as to require a five-inch pot, in which it will remain for blooming.

After the blooming season is over, gradually dry and keep through the summer in a cool place, watering sparingly. Repeat in fall, being careful not to disturb the soil directly about the bulb-like stem or flat tuber.

When the period for keeping the plant dormant is over, begin watering again. There are other strains, the giganteum, which produce larger flowers, but are not as prolific bloomers. The butterfly hybrids, another strain, have fringed or crested petals. Culture these types as mentioned above.

Mistakes To Avoid. Inexperienced indoor gardeners usually overwater pot plants. Give just enough water to thoroughly moisten the soil in the pot when the surface feels dry.

Blooming plants usually need more water than foliage plants or bloomers which are not in flower. Potting earth in a heavy, rich soil should be avoided as they will grow too fast, be too soft and will not bloom. Use a very sandy, gritty soil and good drainage.

African violets, pelargonium tomentosum, glaxia and other hairy-leaved plants should be dusted with a soft brush if necessary, but never washed.

House plants should be shaded for a week or two when they are first put out of doors for the summer. The sudden exposure to burning sun after the subdued light of a room is likely to cause burning of the foliage.

Fuchsias, although they enjoy some shade in the garden, flower best in a sunny window indoors.
