Mixed Reaction Reported To Eisenhower's Message

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower's appeal to Congress Saturday for emergency new authority to help keep peace in the Middle East was met with praise from some members and sharp dissents from others.

Sen. Lyndon F. Johnson of Texas, the Senate Democratic leader, described as "an effort to act in the interests of freedom" Eisenhower's plea for standby authority to use U.S. troops in the area if he deems such action necessary to counter any open Communist aggression.

Rep. Martin of Massachusetts, Republican House leader, predicted that the Democratic-controlled congress will approve the request "by an overwhelming vote."

Sen. Goldwater (R-Ariz.) said he is "very afraid" of the proposal and where it will lead, adding that "I don't like it."

Sen. Jenner (R-Ind.) said "The President's proposals on the Middle East involve issues that will affect the security of our country for generations to come. Some aspects of the proposals need especially careful analysis."

Sen. Aiken (R-Vt.), a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said "until I know more about it, I'm making no commitments."

Sen. Ervin (D-NC) said he sees no reason to grant the authority Eisenhower is asking.

Chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) of House Armed Services Committee said he will support the request, and he added: "I believe this is the proper step to take because it strengthens us and keeps down aggression."
