Prothro Comments On Darrell Royal

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP)—Coach Tommy Prothro of Oregon State's football team says Darrell Royal quit as coach of the University of Washington's football team because he resented the "treatment" he received from the Pacific Coast Conference.

Prothro, visiting his parents, Dr. and Mrs. Thompson Prothro, over the weekend, told David Bloom, Commercial Appeal sports columnist, Sunday:

"I'm sure that's why Darrell Royal quit at Washington. As far back as June he'd expressed resentment at the treatment he got."

Prothro did not elaborate. The PCC slapped severe penalties on

Washington and three other conference schools last summer for illegal aid to athletes.

Royal resigned recently to become head coach at the University of Texas.

Prothro said a PCC coach never knows how strong his team is going to be until just before the season starts.

"Some kid's liable to come up with an extra milkshake and then boom! Those faculty people start getting busy."

"The conference insists on trying to put the coaches and the athletic directors in their places. I've been with it six years, and while I don't like it, it's just something you have to face, and I guess it's all right after you get used to it."

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP)—Manager Bill Rigney said Sunday his New York Giants will do everything "within our power" to get Jackie Robinson back into baseball.

"The way he's talking," Rigney said, "it won't be easy. But I'm still clinging to the hope that he'll be with us when we open spring training camp in Phoenix next month."

Robinson, the first Negro to play in the major leagues, announced his retirement from baseball in a magazine article.

The 38-year-old athlete was traded by the Brooklyn Dodgers to the New York Giants in December for pitcher Dick Littlefield and \$30,000 in cash. Under baseball law, Robinson's failure to report would cancel the transaction.

Under Brennan, who succeeded Frank Leahy Feb. 1, 1954, Notre Dame staggered through the 1956 season with a 2-8 record, defeating only Indiana and North Carolina.

DOUGLERS INVOLVED AGAIN

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Van Brocklin Completes 19-20 Passes, Dropkicks Four Points

HONOLULU (AP)—Norman van Brocklin passed the pro all-stars to a 52-21 victory over some of the year's outstanding collegiate players Sunday in the Hula Bowl.

The Los Angeles Rams quarterback completed 19 of 20 throws for five touchdowns and 281 yards before 24,000 shirtless fans.

Scoring placekicks, the former University of Oregon back dropkicked four out of eight point after touchdown attempts. One other was a clear miss and three were blocked.

Notre Dame's Paul Hornung hit

on 10 out of 22 pass attempts for 73 yards and all three of the collegiate touchdowns. He also carried the ball four times for 74 yards. Mississippi's Paige Cothren kicked all three extra points after the collegiate touchdowns.

Van Brocklin did most of his passing to Elroy Hirsch, Ram end who also coached the pro all-stars. Hirsch scored three times, on 8, 31 and 53 yard passes from Van Brocklin.

Stanford quarterback John Brodie wrenched his knee in the first few minutes of play and was benched for the rest of the game.

Just behind were some of the greatest names in golf — Cary Middlecoff, Jack Burke Jr., Tommy Bolt, Dow Finsterwald, Doug Ford and England's Ryder Cup star, Harry Weetman.

PORTCUPINES ARE TARGET

TORONTO (AP)—The Ontario Lands and Forests Dept. has asked hunters to shoot porcupines on sight, to combat an invasion by the animals in southern Ontario. The prickly creatures do considerable damage to trees and often kill hunting dogs.

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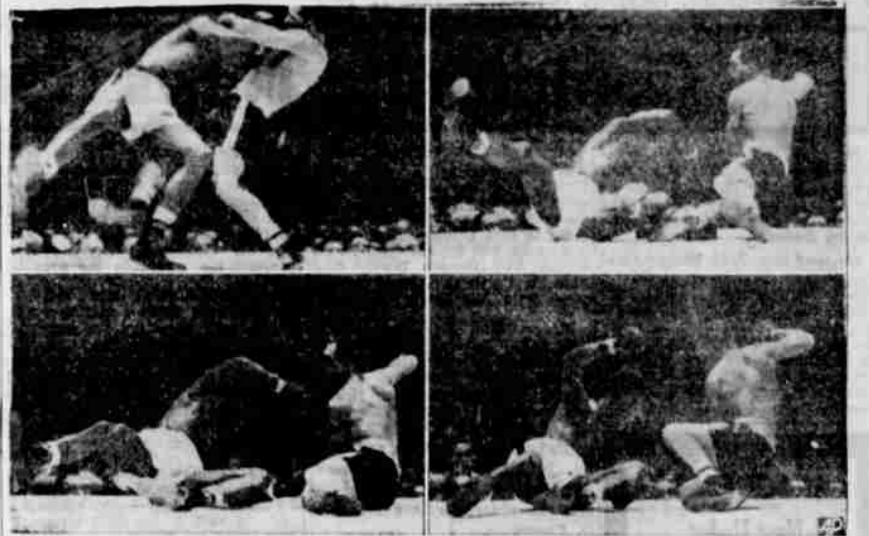

Jayhawks, North Carolina Cage Teams Stay Unbeaten

Kansas and North Carolina, the nation's top-rated college basketball teams, will seek to increase their unbeaten streaks this week. There's little reason to believe they'll be stopped.

The Jayhawks, No. 1, can pick up their 11th victory tonight against Oklahoma and take over sole possession of the Big Seven conference lead. Both teams won their league opener Saturday night, Kansas defeating Missouri 92-79 as Wilt (The Stilt) Chamberlain was held to 23 points and Oklahoma with a 60-47 triumph over Kansas State.

North Carolina's Tar Heels (11-0), well rested after an eight-day layoff, will take on William and Mary tomorrow night.

Plenty of action also is on tonight in the Big Ten. Knocked off by Minnesota 91-88 Saturday, Illinois will try to get back on the bean against Iowa. In other games, Wisconsin is at Indiana, Michigan at Michigan State and Purdue at Ohio State.

Michigan at Michigan State and Northwestern won their league opener Saturday.

Kentucky, third-ranked nationally, meets Loyola of Chicago tonight hoping to improve its 9-2 record.
