Huge Highway Project Moving Rapidly, Report

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Commerce Weeks told senators Monday the new \$3-billion-dollar highway program "is moving along very rapidly" and that "no significant delays have developed" so far.

Weeks, appearing before a Senate roads subcommittee to report on progress of the vast program, said that in the six months it has been under way "we have started work on over \$1,700,000,000 of highway improvement."

This compared with federal-state roadbuilding programs of about the same size for the full year ended last June 30.

"This spectacular increase in our rate of construction advertised and funds obligated is not just a sudden spurt, and there is every reason to believe that the present rate of progress will be maintained and further increased in future months," the secretary said.

He said the states already have submitted advance programs totaling more than four million dollars for work on an interstate system of superhighways.

John A. Volpe, temporary federal highway administrator, said that of the 21,957 miles of interstate route locations that have been set out, about 75 per cent follow existing roads and 25 per cent will have new locations.

Snow Perils Highway Travel; Chains Advised

SALEM (AP)—Highway travel was hazardous in mountain areas Monday because of 2 to 6 inches of new snow, the Oregon Highway Commission reported.

Chains were required at Timberline, Green Springs Summit, Willamette Pass and Meacham.

Chains should be carried at Government Camp, Detroit, Prospect, Santiam Pass, Oboona Summit, Brothers, Lapine, Chemult, Bly, Baker and Austin.

Javits Names Special Prosecutor For Probe

ALBANY, N. Y. (AP)—State Atty. Gen. Jacob K. Javits has appointed Edward A. Rigney, a New York City lawyer, as a special prosecutor to continue an investigation of alleged wrongdoing by public officials in Republican-ruled Suffolk County.

The Republican attorney general, who has not yet taken his seat in the U. S. Senate, described Rigney, a former deputy police commissioner of New York City, as "an independent Democrat."

Javits acted on a formal request by Democratic Gov. Averell Harriman for appointment of a special prosecutor to carry on a special grand jury probe that Harriman ordered last May.

The governor had tried to persuade Javits to appoint former Dist. Atty. George W. Percy Jr., a Democrat.
