TOUGH LUCK grapples of the local area seems to be Mark Bunn, 146-pounder of the Douglas team. Coach Glen Walshaw says he has yet to win a match in two years of competition, but has been pinned only twice.

Most of his matches went the full time limit and the Troy grappler has given a good account of himself, and according to Coach Walshaw, Bunn usually wrestles out of his weight giving away close to 10 pounds.

Douglas County lost a good sports booster and organizer last week when Fred Weber announced his plans for moving to Caldwell, Idaho, to take up a post with the highway department there. He was an active ski enthusiast and assisted greatly during the softball season with the Roseburg Timberjills girls' team.

Weber, a native Swiss, started the move toward development of a ski area soon after he arrived in Dr. In 1951 from Switzerland. Soon he had the interest of some part-time skiers aroused and the Edelweiss Ski Club was formed.

THAT GROUP with Weber aiding in the planning, was largely responsible for development of the Taft area, which during the first couple of years has had enough use to warrant county aid in keeping the forest road to the ski slope open during the snow months.

Weber also organized the first ski patrol in Southern Oregon in 1951, and subsequently became leader of the organization — the Umpqua Ski Patrol. Since its organization, 10 other ski patrols have been formed in southwestern and south-central Oregon.

Weber was Southern Oregon section chief of the National Ski Patrol Assn. With his announcement that he is moving to Idaho, he named Bob Matthews, now president of the ski club, to be acting section chief.

Improvements so far have included the cutting of a long slope through a logged-off hillside, building of a warming hut and snack bar, ski rental service and instruction by Weber. Recently, there have been setbacks — vandalism and a costly fire — but Weber contended that possibility of development of a first-class ski area "isn't propaganda at all."

Harper, on the other hand, has been doing likewise and will probably bring the services of transfer center John Caudill, who was injured several weeks and missed a good deal of action. Caudill played limited time in the last Roseburg outing and should be in fine shape when the opening whistle toots tonight.

Kansas Still Leads Poll; UCLA Eighth, Chiefs Ninth

Kansas continued its reign as the kingpin of college basketball today according to the latest Associated Press poll of sports writers and broadcasters, but North Carolina's Tar Heels are awaiting just one faltering step.

The Jayhawks, with an 11-0 record, for the fifth consecutive week ranked No. 1. But Frank McGuire's club, with an identical record, was only 8 points back.

The two teams completely dominated the voting, heading all but nine of the 83 ballots cast. Kansas drew 45 first-place votes and 72 points while North Carolina received 29 top votes and 684 points on the basis of 10 for first, 9 for second, etc.

Kentucky, with four first-place nominations, remained in third place, followed by Southern Methodist, Louisville, Vanderbilt, Iowa State, UCLA, Seattle and Illinois.

No new teams were about to break the hold of the top 10, but there was some shuffling as a result of Illinois' loss to Minnesota Saturday. The Illini dropped from fifth to 10th with the others moving up or holding their positions.

Vanderbilt made the biggest jump among the leaders after handing Tennessee its first setback Saturday. They advanced from ninth to sixth.

Darrell Royal Wants To Tell Own Feelings
AUSTIN, Tex. — Darrell Royal, former head football coach at Washington and now a grid mentor at Texas, said Monday night he wished that others would let him express his own feelings about his recent switch in jobs.

Royal was commenting on a statement made Sunday night by Coach Tommy Prothro of Oregon State to David Bloom, sports columnist for the "Phil Commercial Appeal."

Prothro told Bloom that Royal quit as head football coach at Washington and moved to Texas because Royal resented the "treatment" he received from the Pacific Coast Conference.

Prothro did not elaborate. The PCC slapped severe penalties on Washington and three other schools last summer for illegal aid to athletes. Prothro said "as far back as June" Royal had expressed resentment at the treatment he had received.

Said Royal, "I don't recall that at all. I feel Tommy Prothro is just expressing his own opinion through me."

"Prothro is a good friend of mine and I have lots of others at Washington and in the Pacific Coast Conference. I certainly don't want to start any controversy. I've got too many friends up there who have been too good to me. I wish my feelings wouldn't be expressed by anyone but me."

Middle-Road Recruitment Policy Sought

SAN FRANCISCO — Search for an acceptable middle-ground between a free ride and nothing at all for collegiate football players continues in the troubled Pacific Coast Conference.

Some thought the problem virtually licked, except for details, when the conference approved in principle by a 7-3 vote last Friday, a liberalized plan based on need.

That plan would provide for grants-in-aid making up the difference between living costs of the school year and what an athlete's family plus his own campus work could provide.

Dismay Expressed
Both Stanford, which voted against the plan, and California, which voted for it, have expressed official dismay at the possibility an athlete might be given special financial treatment when not participating in his sport.

California's Chancellor Clark Kerr started the fireworks when he said he believes the plan, if not modified "is a long step toward professionalism."

He said he hoped changes would be made when the conference meets again May 19-23 in Spokane, Wash., to work out details of the new aid program.

He added that "if it isn't reversed, we'll have to take a new look at our arrangement as it affects the Berkeley campus."

Dr. Wallace Sterling, Stanford president, said, "we will have to re-examine the effect of conference action on Stanford's participation in intercollegiate athletics."

Stanford Disturbed
Asked if California might withdraw from the PCC if changes were not forthcoming, Dr. Kerr said this might come under study.

Fred Glover, assistant to Stanford's president, said Dr. Sterling was "disturbed over the implications of the new code" but added "talk of withdrawing from the conference is sheer nonsense, and Dr. Sterling has at no time made such an intimation."

There was no comment from either UCLA or USC, where reports of possible withdrawal circulated last year but for a different reason. The schools both were hit with conference penalties because of illegal aid to athletes, as were Washington and California. Both UCLA and USC sought a code more liberal than the one presently in effect.

This code under which the PCC has previously operated permits grants-in-aid for tuition, on-campus work in which an athlete can earn up to \$100 per month at \$2 an hour and bona-fide off-campus employment.

Strand Goes Along
President A. L. Strand of Oregon State said he "went along reluctantly" with the new plan.

President O. Meredith Wilson of Oregon said PCC approval was given on "only general outlines of the program." Oregon cast the other negative vote on the plan.

President D. R. Theophilus of Idaho commented, "the principles of the new financial code are sound — but the program will be difficult to develop."

There was no statement from Washington or Washington State.

'Reluctance' Cited By OSC's President
CORVALLIS — Dr. A. L. Strand, Oregon State College president, said Monday he "went along reluctantly" with the proposal approved last Friday at Berkeley under which aid to athletes would be made on need.

And although he said he doesn't like the proposal and maybe he will have to modify it, Dr. Strand said it had long been evident that some change in the Coast Conference code of aid was needed.

"I think there has to be some subsidy," he said. "There always has been. The objective is to keep it known and above the table."

"I think regulations that inspire sub-rosa deals," he said, "are worse than regulations that recognize some subsidization is necessary."

But despite disagreements, Dr. Strand said he doubted that any school would leave the conference. "Some of our own alumni, too, have sometimes suggested that we get out. But they never have the answer to the next question: 'Where would we go?'"

December Salmon Run Unusual On Umpqua River

The strong freshet that swept the Umpqua River in mid-December brought an unusually high run of salmon upriver that had previously been retarded by low flow and cold water temperatures, reports the Winchester Counting Station.

Appearance of any number of salmon at Winchester Dam as late

as mid-December is quite unusual, but the 1956 run was the result of the combination of the weather and water conditions experienced in the late autumn weeks.

The run included 1,713 winter steelhead, 449 silver salmon (adults), 39 fall chinook, 26 salmon trout, two silver salmon and one fall chinook, jack, all in the period of Dec. 16-31.
