

Prayers, Song Ease 18-Hour Elevator Trap

NEW YORK — What does a man do when he's imprisoned for 18 hours in an elevator?

He sings.
He says his prayers.
He waits.

At least that's what Morris Gerson, 56, a foreman for a leather company, said he did during the long, lonely period he was trapped.

Gerson had gone to his company offices on the third floor of a building at 609 Broadway to do some work.

When he started to leave, the elevator stopped down part way between the third and second floor, and stopped.

On a Sunday, no one else was in the building to hear the alarm buzzer. It changed all afternoon and all night, unheeded.

"I decided to take it easy and save my strength," Gerson said. "I started to say my prayers."

"It was cold in the elevator, but I had my galoshes and a sweater, and they helped to keep me warm."

To keep up his spirits, and his vitality, he sang. He could hear his words echoing all through the dark, empty building.

He said he remained confident "all would be well when the place was opened Monday."

It was the first man to arrive at work summoned police who rescued Gerson from the elevator, none the worse for his experience.

Woman Guilty Of Fraud In Welfare Payments

SEATTLE — Mrs. Irene Rockko, 29, convicted of larceny by welfare fraud, was sentenced here to spend six months in the county jail without her 1955 Cadillac.

She was found guilty of drawing \$1,071 in welfare funds to which she would not have been entitled if she had disclosed her earnings as a clerk and payments from her ex-husband.

Testimony was presented in justice court that a welfare investigator, Ben J. Thieme, had given Mrs. Rockko a ride in his 1951 Chevrolet to the lot where her car was parked. She was quoted as telling Thieme: "You should have power steering, like I have."

The court did not ask her how she came to own the 1955 Cadillac to which she was delivered in Thieme's automobile.

Use Vaccine Against All Nerve Viruses, Salk Urges

NEW YORK — Dr. Jonas E. Salk today suggested the bold new idea of a vaccine guarding you against all viruses which attack nerves.

He listed two big reasons for seeking such an all-virus vaccine.

1. Perhaps many diseases which hit adults stem from childhood virus attacks which weakened nerves but gave no sign at the time.

These ailments might include back pain, ulcers or high blood pressure.

2. Certain viruses might "sleep" in the nervous system for years until some stress made them active and caused trouble.

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Get-Tough Policy, Appeal For Financial Help Linked In New Hungarian Program

BUDAPEST, Hungary — Premier Kadar's Soviet-installed government, taking the wraps off its long-promised "new program," combines get-tough Stalinism with an appeal to the West for financial aid.

The program was issued from the Premier's office in Parliament building, ringed by protecting Russian tanks.

The Hungarians, led by some informants to expect a "surprising mild" declaration, were told among other things:

"There is a dictatorship of the proletariat in Hungary. . . . The counter-revolutionaries and persons who attack the legal order and the basic principles of the people's democracy have no freedom even if they mask their counter-

revolutionary efforts by democratic slogans. The law will always punish them severely. . . .

In an obvious reference to the Soviet-crushed revolt in November, the statement said:

"People of petty bourgeois thinking or people who were masking themselves as Marxists set as their aim the disintegration of social order and the dissolution of it whereby they used slogans like 'democratization, de-Stalinization and others. . . . It is therefore a main task to strengthen the people's democratic installations and organizations."

Coalition Promised
The statement said "the government is planning talks with various public figures and non-partisan experts aimed at their participation in leading state affairs with the government." It did not mention any non-Communist parties.

The government pledged a continuation of the socialization of agriculture and asserted that "steps will be taken with all the severity of the dictatorship of the proletariat against people who damage agricultural installations."

The statement blasted Stalinist leaders Matyas Rakosi and Erno Gero as well as Imre Nagy, who succeeded them and was ousted as premier by Kadar and his supporters with Russian help.

Religions 'Respected'
The government also proclaimed that it respects the freedom of belief of all citizens and considers the standpoint of religious questions a private matter.

Bills To Authorize Coast Projects Ready

WASHINGTON — Bills to authorize construction of two harbor projects along the Oregon coast have been introduced in the new Congress.

One is the \$1,693,100 Siuslaw River project near Florence; the other is the \$19,800,000 Yaquina Bay project modification to serve Toledo, Newport and Waldport.

Rep. Porter (D-Ore) introduced the Siuslaw proposal after taking his oath of office as a new member. The Yaquina Bay bill was offered by Rep. Norblad (R-Ore).

Both projects have been approved by the Army Engineers. The Yaquina project was one of several added by the Senate to an omnibus rivers and harbors bill which was vetoed by President Eisenhower.

Supporters Plan Another Battle For Civil Rights

WASHINGTON — Congress' fight over civil rights proposals seemed likely today to break out again in about two weeks, this time in the House.

Chairman Celler (D-NY) of the House Judiciary Committee said in an interview that civil rights bills have "No. 1 priority" with that group.

Speed is the keynote of strategy worked out by Celler and other House backers of such legislation. They made their plans even before the House Judiciary Committee, as expected, lost a fight last Friday for a rules change that would have made it easier to curb filibusters.

Southern senators have used the filibuster, or endless debate, to kill civil rights bills in past years.

A coalition of House Republicans and Democrats from the north and west hopes to get civil rights legislation through the House quickly. Then, they feel, changes would be improved for bringing the issue to the Senate floor early enough to make a filibuster as long and as difficult as possible.
