Many Sawmill Closures Hold; Plywood Price Up

EUGENE — Many holiday closures of sawmills have been extended and extremely low production marks the region, Random Lengths, weekly lumber market news letter, reported Monday.

Green mills' prices have gone up slightly but this does not reflect a market pattern, the report said, since demand is limited to essentials. Still to be seen, it adds, is whether buyers will absorb the recent increase in rail freight rates.

Retail yard buying from mixed car fir mills was reported to be reasonably active, with most of the purchasing in the Middle West.

The pine market expects to see the New Year's trend developing in the next week or so. Meanwhile, the market is unchanged with shop grades the weakest and common the strongest.

The price jump in plywood from a base of \$67 to \$72 now is nearly industry-wide, but the report said the move seems to be to test the market and buying volume will tell whether the price holds.

NEW POLLUTION SOURCE

SEATTLE — A new source of pollution for Washington's waters may come with the advent of atomic power in industry, E.F. Eldridge said here.

The director of the state Pollution Control Commission told the Legislative Interim Fisheries Committee that atomic wastes may some day replace sewage and pulp disposal as the major pollution problem.

Reedsport High School Budget Decrease Sought

A public meeting to discuss the discontinuance of certain courses of study in Reedsport high school in order that the school's budget may be reduced, will be held Tuesday, Jan. 15, at Reedsport.

The meeting was called by Mrs. John B. Young, president of the Reedsport High P.F.A. as a precautionary step in case the ballot measure for unification of three school districts in the port of Umpqua area fails, Feb. 3.

The Feb. 3 election will determine whether the Reedsport high, Reedsport grade school and Gardiner elementary school districts will be unified into one district.

At present, the high school and Gardiner are part of the Douglas County rural school system. Reedsport grade school is not. While Gardner has an assessed valuation which is third largest for county schools, the Reedsport grade school is below the county average and showed a decrease early last year.

State Contracts Let For Gasoline, Car, Truck Tires

SALEM — Tidewater Oil Co. and Richfield Oil Co. won contracts Monday to supply gasoline to state-owned motor vehicles during 1957.

The state Department of Finance and Administration said the prices are about half a cent per gallon more than in 1956.

Richfield won the bulk gasoline award with a bid of 22.04 cents a gallon for premium and 19.54 cents for regular.

Tidewater got the contract for gasoline to be delivered at service stations, bidding 28.8 cents for premium and 25.8 cents for regular.

Shell Oil Co. won the contract for lubricating oils and greases. All prices include state taxes.

Peck Bros., Portland, got the 1957 contract for tires for cars and trucks. It has had this contract for the past two years.

The passenger tires will cost the state slightly less than last year, as will smaller size truck tires. The bigger size truck tires will be slightly higher.

OSC Dean To Speak At Camas Valley Meet

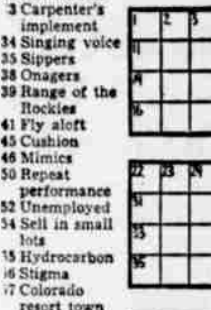

A dinner is scheduled at 6, followed by entertainment and the address by the guest speaker. A special invitation has been issued to Camas Valley High School boys and their fathers.

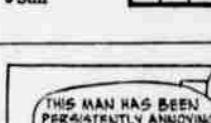

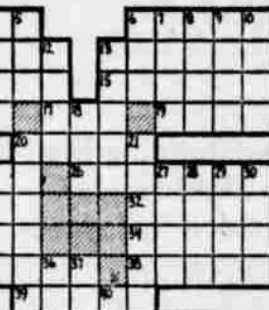
