Chou, Leaders Of East Germany Support Moscow

MOSCOW — Premier Chou En-lai of Red China and the leaders of Communist East Germany have reaffirmed their countries' support of the Soviet Union as the leader of the world Communist movement.

Chou also extended his visit in Moscow an extra day, until Friday. Presumably he or the Russians want more consultations before Chou goes on to Poland and Hungary, two countries where the Kremlin's leadership has been challenged.

(Moscow Radio reported talks between Soviet and Chinese Communist leaders continued at the Kremlin Wednesday.)

The keynote in Moscow was Communist solidarity against alleged attempts of the West to drive a wedge into the Red world. The pace of diplomatic activity was intense as the Kremlin sought to strengthen Communist unity.

The East German delegation went home after joining Soviet leaders in a party declaration that two nations would stick together against "imperialist reaction."

Chou, who arrived Monday, conferred with East German party secretary Walter Ulbricht and also met at the Kremlin with Soviet leaders. An official announcement said the private talks ranged from Soviet-Chinese relations to "the international situation as it affects both countries."

Red China already had endorsed the Soviet Union's strong action against the revolt in Hungary and denounced Yugoslav President Tito's idea that there can be "different paths to socialism."

National Park Service Lists Finished Projects

PORTLAND — The National Park Service has reported it undertook \$3,107,387 in construction projects in the Pacific Northwest last year.

This helped match the increased use of parks and monuments. The agency said 2,376,717 visitors were tallied on Northwest park record books for the first nine months of 1957, an increase of seven per cent over the same period the previous year.

Park Service property in the Northwest includes the three national parks, Mt. Rainier, Olympic and Crater Lake; Oregon Caves, Craters of the Moon, Fort Vancouver, Wash., and the Whitman Dam national recreational area. Construction funds for fiscal 1957 have been increased by about half a million dollars over last year's total. It will mark the beginning of a 19-year National Park

Teamsters Plan Appeal Against Records Probe

SEATTLE — The powerful Teamsters Union Wednesday planned an appeal to the State Supreme Court to ban inspection of its financial records by a Senate subcommittee.

The union said Tuesday it will ask the state's high court to order King County Superior Judge Henry Clay Agnew to make permanent a restraining order barring two Seattle banks from turning over the Teamsters' records to the investigations subcommittee of the Senate Committee on Government Operations.

Judge Agnew ruled Tuesday he did not have the authority to issue a permanent injunction, although he did continue the temporary restraining order until Friday so the union could take its case to the State Supreme Court.

The Senate subcommittee, investigating union practices and handling of welfare funds, subpoenaed the financial records of the Western Conference of Teamsters, Frank W. Brewster of Seattle, the conference president, and several affiliated groups.

The subpoena called for bank records from the start of 1955 through 1957. The union obtained a temporary restraining order and sought Tuesday to have it made permanent.

Before ruling that he did not have the authority to make the injunction permanent, Judge Agnew said he "has no doubt" that the subcommittee exceeded its authority in issuing the subpoena for the records.

Poland Ousts Agriculture Head

WARSAW, Poland — Poland ousted its minister of agriculture Wednesday and the Polish press published sweeping reforms intended to put its farming industry on a firmer economic basis.

The radio said Agriculture Minister Antoni Kuligowski had been recalled from his post by the Council of State, which named Edward Ochab to succeed him. Ochab formerly was Communist boss of the Central Trade Union Committee.

Measures for agricultural reform include a cut of one-third in compulsory grain deliveries to the state and 100 per cent increase in state payments for grain.

In the future the legal rights of all landholders will be guaranteed and the right to buy, sell and lease land less than 30 hectares (about 125 acres) in area has been reintroduced.

A union of agricultural associations is to be formed with the aim of looking after farmers' interests, improving the country's agrarian policy and raising the general farming standard.

PORTLAND — Edward Armstrong, executive assistant to Gov. Elmo Smith and two other governors before him, has been appointed business development representative for the First National Bank branch at Salem.

Armstrong was director of development at Willamette University in Salem before he became executive assistant for Douglas McKay when he was governor. He also served in the same capacity for the late Paul Patterson during his term.

Soviet Press Opens Attack On Plan Of U.S.

MOSCOW — The Soviet press, after several days of sniping, Wednesday opened up a full-scale offensive against what it calls the "Eisenhower - Dulles Doctrine" for the Middle East.

The newspaper said the plan for economic assistance to the Middle East area with standby authority to use troops against any Communist aggression was a cover for "American monopolists" to replace British-French "colonialists."

Soviet Fleet, the navy paper, printed a cartoon showing U. S. Secretary of State Dulles on all four serving as a launching platform for an atomic rocket ridden by three American soldiers and tagged "to countries of the people's democracies."

The newspaper said it was obvious that American government and military leaders had "learned nothing from the failure of the counter-revolutionary putsch in Hungary."

At the same time Komsomol Pravda, the Young Communist League newspaper, reviewed a new book published in the Soviet Union which sets out to prove that the United States planned and directed the revolt in Hungary. Komsomol Pravda said the "plot against the Hungarian people is but a link in a chain of plots prepared by international reaction against the world system of socialism."

Pravda, the Communist newspaper, said talk in Washington about filling a "vacuum" in the Middle East was for the purpose of covering up "the open colonial seizure" of its wealth by American monopolists.

Oakland Schools Schedule Drive To Get Clothing

World Clothing Week, a campaign to gather used clothing, shoes and bedding for orphaned and needy children and adults in the United States and overseas countries, will be observed by Oakland school children, starting next Monday.

The project is conducted by the schools in cooperation with the Christian Children's Fund Inc., a charitable organization which assists orphaned and other needy children in this country and 30 other countries of the world.

Since 1938, the Christian Children's Fund Inc. has been aiding needy children in more than 200 orphanages in 30 countries.

Programs, besides the one operated in the U. S., are operated by C. C. F. in Austria, Belgium, Borneo, Brazil, Burma, Finland, France, Free China, Greece, Hong Kong, India, Indonesia, Italy, Japan, Korea, Laos, Malaya, Mexico, Okinawa, Pakistan, Philippines, Puerto Rico, Syria, Viet Nam and West Germany.
