Nine basketball games are scheduled for the Douglas County area Friday and five more will be played on Saturday, seven of the Friday dates are league counters along with one of the Saturday tilts. The others are non-league tilts.

Two games are slated for Douglas B League action Friday. Canyonville will be at Elkton and Camas Valley journeys to Yoncalla. Umpqua Valley League play has three games on the docket. Glendale will be at Myrtle Creek, Sutherlin is at Douglas and Glendale plays at Riddle.

First UVL Action
It will be the initial loop action for both Sutherlin and Myrtle Creek. Glendale and Douglas are tied for top rung of the league ladder with four straight wins. Glendale is third with 2-2.

Reedsport travels to Taft for its second Coast League tilt and will attempt to make it two straight. They defeated Florence during opening action Tuesday.

The non-league schedule for Friday has Coach Bill Harper's Roseburg Indians trekking to Grants Pass for a return battle against the Cavemen. Roseburg won the first meeting on the local floor.

Saturday slate has Myrtle Creek and Douglas traveling to coastal points. The Vikings of Coach Bob Abrahamson play at Coquille and Coach Russ Hawk's Trojans will be at Myrtle Point.

Rogue League action will find Eagle Point at Glendale. Two non-league battles end up the weeks basketball slate. West Fir will be at Canyonville and Reedsport's Braves play North Bend, there. The latter is a member of the District 5-A-1 league.

Lamotta, Three Arrested On Morals Charges In Florida

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (U-P)—Jake Lamotta, former world middleweight boxing champion, two women and another man were arrested Wednesday on various charges involving a 14-year-old girl.

The 34-year-old Lamotta was charged with maintaining a place for lewdness and prostitution, encouraging a minor to engage in prostitution, and permitting a minor to be served alcohol. He was released under \$6,000 bond.

Lt. Jack B. Farrell of the Miami Beach Juvenile Bureau said the 14-year-old girl told officers she picked up men in Lamotta's bar and took them to the apartment of Melvin Stoller, 43, receiving a minimum of \$20 from each man.

Stoller was charged with having sexual relations with a minor and permitting a minor to use his apartment for prostitution.

Also arrested were Florence Balsam, 36, and Sherrie Alexander, 22. Both women gave the same address as Stoller.

Miss Balsam was charged with encouraging a minor to engage in prostitution. Miss Alexander, who told police she formerly was a Tampa strip teaser, was charged with disorderly conduct.

Lamotta told newsmen, "It's a bum rap. They gave me a couple of charges to read, but they don't make sense. I don't know the girl. The charges are ridiculous. They were made just because I'm a big name."

Jackie Robinson Repeats Stand

NEW YORK (U-P)—Jackie Robinson, standing firm on his decision to quit baseball despite a passionate plea by the New York Giants last night, said today he planned to submit his letter of voluntary retirement to the proper authorities not later than next Tuesday.

He reiterated to this writer that no amount of pressure could get closed by The Associated Press yesterday, Robinson acknowledged he had a dinner party at the home of Charles (Chub) Feeney, vice president of the Giants, who made a final desperate effort to induce Jackie to play just one more season.

Vol's Bowden Wyatt Picked Coach Of Year
ST. LOUIS (U-P)—Bowden Wyatt, who led his Tennessee football team to an undefeated season and the Sugar Bowl game, was honored Thursday as "Coach of the Year" at a luncheon of the American Football Coaches Assn.

At the same meeting, Jess Neely of Rice, AFCA president for the past year, turned over the reins to his successor, George (Lefty) James of Cornell.

Wyatt was picked as coach of the year on a vote of 535 members of the AFCA. He was the 21st coach selected for this honor.

Vancouver Is Selling Shares To Finance Team
VANCOUVER, B.C. (U-P)—The Vancouver club of the Pacific Coast Baseball League Wednesday opened a public share selling campaign in an effort to raise \$225,000 to start the 1957 season.

The club said first day sales of the \$25 shares netted \$16,800, bringing to \$110,000 the money on hand. The Mounties still owe former owner Brick Laws \$125,000 for the PCL franchise and must be able to show league directors \$15,000 for 1957 operating expenses.

Pro All-Stars Dominated By Giants, Bears And Lions

NEW YORK (U-P)—The champion New York Giants, Chicago Bears and Detroit Lions today dominated the Associated Press National Football League all-star team, capturing 15 of the 22 berths.

Five members from each of the three clubs were named to this mythical two-division team by 28 sports writers who covered the NFL campaign for The AP in the various cities from coast to coast.

Two Unanimous
Two players, offensive end Harrison Hill of the Bears and defensive tackle Roosevelt Grier of the Giants, were picked on all 28 ballots. Halfbacks Ollie Matson of

Chicago Cardinals and Frank Gifford of the Giants missed unanimous selection by one vote.

The Bears, Western division winners, placed center Larry Strickland, guard Stan Jones and fullback Rick Casares on the first offensive unit, along with Hill, and landed middle guard Bill George on the defensive team.

The Giants had tackle Rosey Brown, besides Gifford, on the attacking line and end Andy Robustelli and safety Emilen Tunnell along with Grier on the defensive squad.

Lions who made the first team were tackle Lou Creekmur and quarterback Bobby Layne on offense and linebacker Joe Schmidt, halfback Jack Christensen and safety Yale Lary.

Others on the first team: OFFENSIVE — BG-Dick Stanfel, Washington Redskins; RE — Billy Howton, Green Bay Packers.

Zora Folley Wins 28th Boxing Match Wed.
SYRACUSE, N.Y. (U-P)—Zora Folley left his boxing door open today, saying he'd fight "anybody."

The Arizona boxer, although floored in the seventh round, scored his 28th victory in 31 starts last night at the War Memorial Auditorium with a split decision over Slugger Wayne Bethea in their 10-round, nationally televised bout. Bethea now has a 13-8 record.
