SALEM — Gov. Elmo Smith presided Thursday at his last meeting of the state Board of Control. He leaves office next Monday. It was the first board meeting for Secretary of State Mark Hatfield, who took office last Monday.
The third member of the board is state Treasurer Sig Unander, who was reelected to a second term.
The meeting lasted only 15 minutes, dealing with routine matters.
It received a report from its secretary, William Ryan, that the four-year dispute over water rights in the Salem area has been settled. This means that the state will get water to irrigate 1,678 acres of institution lands.

Tree Fruit, Nut Output Up 7 Per Cent Last Year

CORVALLIS — Tree fruit and nut production in Oregon last year was 7 per cent below that for 1955, the Oregon State College extension service reported Thursday.
The severe November, 1955, freeze was blamed for the drop in production. This freeze virtually wiped out cherry, prune and apple orchards in the Milton-Freewater area. Sweet cherries in The Dalles and Cove areas also were damaged as were apples in the Hood River Valley. Frost damaged walnut and filbert trees in the Willamette Valley.

Sec. Seaton To Speak At Northwest Meeting

SPOKANE — Secretary of the Interior Fred Seaton has accepted a Grange invitation to come to the Pacific Northwest to speak on the Administration's power policy. A. Lars Nelson, state Grange master, said Thursday.

The date and place for the talk haven't been set, but Nelson said it may be some time late this month or early in February at a "central location."

Nelson said he invited Seaton to the area in an attempt to promote the cause of publicly-owned power.
"The private power companies," he said, "have been going back to Washington and talking about complete resource development of the Snake River. But private power development isn't complete resource development."
"The public power groups in the Northwest are not being heard."
