Dick talked on the newly-issued "Code of Conduct" which governs U. S. armed forces personnel who are taken prisoner to an audience which included army reserve and ground observer corps members.

After explaining the code from the standpoint of a man who had been a prisoner, Dick answered questions from the audience which centered mainly on his experiences.

Dick became a prisoner when his plane was shot down over North Korea.

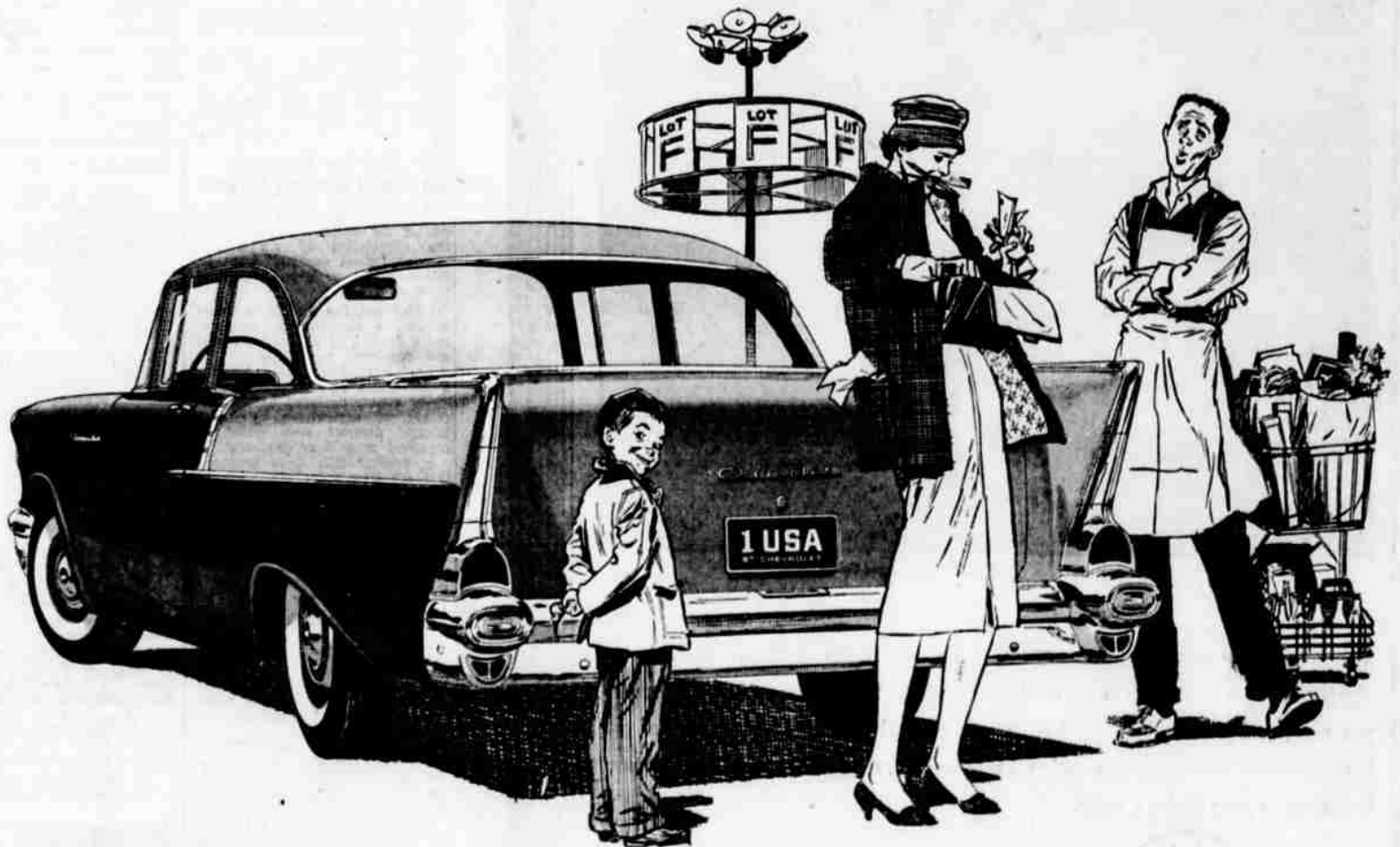

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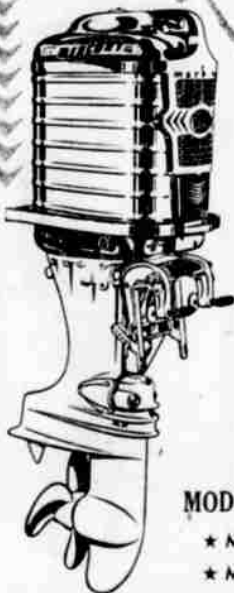
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
