NCAA Meet Marked By Law Changes

ST. LOUIS (AP)—A couple of new laws tightening reins on recruiting and financial aid to athletes and a loud blast at professional baseball by college coaches provided the only fireworks of the 51st NCAA convention.

The week-long meet ending Saturday with a routine closed-door session of the policy-making council, was the most peaceful in more than ten years.

The assembly at its final session Friday amended its financial aid rule by putting a lid on the amount of money a student athlete can receive during a school term. Side jobs and athletic scholarships are to be handled on one basis. An athlete has a job in addition to a scholarship he can't receive more than the limits of the scholarship, which includes room, board, tuition, fees and a \$15.00 laundry allowance.

There was considerable wrangling over a clause in the financial aid amendment which included governmental grants for educational purposes in its limitations. Minority spokesman contended inclusion of government grants would work a hardship on GI's and married athletes with children.

Transportation Paid

The other new rule permits colleges to pay the cost of transportation for a prospective athlete to make one visit to a school. It prohibits alumni and booster club groups from bringing in the prospects.

Pakistan Army Coach To Study At Oregon

EUGENE (AP)—Capt. Yasin Raja of the Pakistan Army will study under University of Oregon track coach Bill Bowerman and later will serve as an assistant coach.

Raja, who helped coach his country's Olympic team, will be at Oregon for about three months, Bowerman said.

Bowerman went to Pakistan for three months last year to coach runners as part of a U.S. State Department good will program.

An organization known as the Asian Foundation is paying Raja's expenses.

Jackie Robinson Makes Final, Official Statement

NEW YORK (AP)—It's official now, Jackie Robinson is through with baseball as an active player and ready to begin a new venture as personnel manager of a new Y restaurant and coffee shop chain.

Robinson made what he said was his "final decision" last night in a phone call to an official of the New York Giants, who had obtained him in a trade with the Brooklyn Dodgers in December.

Eisenhower To Start Six-State Inspection

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower starts a six-state inspection trip Sunday in which he will view the worst U. S. drought conditions in 100 years in some areas.

The plane and motor trip, ending Tuesday night, will take the President and his wife and a group of federal officials to Texas, Oklahoma, Arizona, New Mexico, Kansas and Colorado.

Marine Out To Prove All Instructors Not Monsters

These Marine Corps drill instructors, recently regarded perhaps as some breed of monsters, are human after all. And the Marines are attempting to prove it.

Traveling through Douglas County Friday was one such, a T-Sgt. Harry Keller. He is a Korean veteran, and in his charge beginning next week will be some 50 to 75 Oregon recruits who have enlisted in the newest Beaver Platoon for training at the Marine Corps Recruiting Depot at San Diego.

Among the Oregonians will be "five or six" from Douglas County, according to M-Sgt. Barney Shanks, recruiter here.

The Marines sent Keller to Oregon to dispel beliefs among parents here that the typical Marine "D-I" breathes fire. Keller doesn't even smoke.

The 27-year-old sergeant, a 10-year man in the corps, has started graying, perhaps from trials he was under while winning two presidential unit citations and a personal commendation at Inchon and Chosin during the Korean War. He's making a career of the service. He was in the First Marine Division, which is enough said in itself.

The crew-cut Keller is married and has a son, 7 months, and daughter, 2½. He proudly pointed out that he is a product of Astoria and Warrenton and that his parents now live in Hermiston.

The soft-spoken Keller left no doubts though, that he will be boss. He said that he was in entire charge of teaching the young Oregonians "everything they need to be a Marine."

He made the trip into Douglas County to meet parents of the new Marines, but because the recruits were so widely scattered, took the newspaper method of introducing himself. He had a long way to travel yet.

Shanks said the recruits from Douglas County will leave Roseburg Wednesday morning for induction at Portland.

Roseburg High Students Slate Revote On Drive

Roseburg High School students will revote on Jan. 21 to decide what kind of fund-raising drive they will hold.

Members of the school Student Body Council decided to put the matter up for a revote when opposition was voiced concerning a campaign drive for polio.

Students who opposed the polio drive mentioned three other possible fund-raising campaigns. They were cancer, heart disease and the local youth center. The fund raising campaign had come up for a vote of the student body once. At that time 710 students were in favor of having a polio drive and 338 wanted another kind of fund-raising campaign.

Dates of the proposed polio drive have been set as Jan. 24 to 30. Last year the students collected \$19,082.92 during their polio drive, making the collection the largest contribution to polio of any high school in the nation.

Negroes Invite Presidential Interference

ATLANTA (AP)—Southern Negro leaders are continuing their integration fight with appeals to President Eisenhower, Vice President Nixon and Atty. Gen. Herbert Brownell for assistance.

About 60 Negro leaders representing nine Southern states yesterday telegraphed Eisenhower to come South immediately to make a major speech in a major Southern city urging all Southerners to abide by the Supreme Court's decision as the law of the land.

The group, including a two-day meeting here, asked for a conference with Brownell "at the earliest possible date" and said "the confused state requires that we talk with you in order to secure a clarification from the highest legal authority of the land."

Parental Responsibility Act Due In Washington

OLYMPIA (AP)—A parental responsibility act will be presented to the 32nd Washington Legislature convening here Monday.

The act would make parents financially responsible for any willfully destruction acts of their minor children.

To make it easier for injured parties to recover losses, damage actions up to \$300 could be brought against parents in Justice Courts.

Actions for greater amounts would go into Superior Courts.

The new bill will be offered in the House under the bi-partisan sponsorship of Roy Mumday, Ephraim Democrat, and Eva Anderson, Chelan Republican.

They said it would help curb juvenile delinquency and vandalism because parents would be more likely to keep tabs on their youngsters if they knew they might have to pay for any damage.

Severe Weather Lessens Across Northern States

Relief from the severe cold was reported Saturday in most of the storm swept areas from the Rockies to New England.

The arctic air which enveloped the area after the season's worst snow storm moved off the central east coast during the night. Temperatures from New England westward through the Great Lakes region and in parts of the Ohio Valley and middle Mississippi Valley were as much as 20 to 30 degrees higher than 24 hours earlier.

The stormy weather was blamed for at least 31 deaths, including 10 each in Illinois and Michigan; four each in New York and New Jersey and three in New England.

However, a fresh blast of icy air spread along the northern fringes of New England, the northern plains and upper Mississippi Valley in readings were below zero in many places. One of the low marks was 16 below in International Falls, Minn., on the Canadian border.

Most widespread precipitation was reported in western parts of the country. Rain fell off the Washington coast southward into central California. Snow fell in the mountain areas in northern California and in southern Oregon. Light snow also fell from the Cascades in Washington eastward into Montana.

Lawrence J. McKearney, deputy police inspector, told newsmen a police laboratory inspection of writings by the dead man, Andrew Kleewen of the Bronx, contained "no similarity whatsoever" with letters written by the "mad bomber."

McKearney said the case was being returned to Bronx Park precinct detectives as a "routine investigation" of a natural death.

Portlander Fined, Jailed For Drunk Driving In City

Jimmie L. Dolph, 27, Portland, arrested in Roseburg about 4 a.m. Friday and charged with driving while intoxicated, found himself facing fines totalling \$50 and 150 days of jail sentences after court action Friday.

Arraigned in district court, Dolph pleaded guilty to driving while intoxicated and was fined \$250 including costs and sentenced to 90 days in the Douglas County jail by Judge Warren Woodruff.

Dolph admitted in court that it was his second driving while intoxicated conviction with a week. The first was in Lane County.

In municipal court, Dolph pleaded guilty to negligent destruction of city property (a traffic light standard at the intersection of Southeast Washington Avenue and Jackson Street) and was fined \$300 and sentenced to 60 days in the city jail by acting Municipal Judge John Horn.

Judge Horn agreed to suspend all but \$50 of the fine if Dolph would pay for the damage to the property.

Ex-Convict Held For Portland On Narcotics Charge

A 44-year-old ex-convict from Portland, once in the innocent grasp of the law, was placed under arrest Friday afternoon by Canyonville police and the resident deputy sheriff at Canyonville, according to the sheriff's office.

The man, Carl Robert McKenney, has been claimed by Portland police who wanted him on two charges of possession of narcotics. Police found that he was armed, and they also found implements associated with narcotics addiction on his person, the sheriff's office said.

But the officers didn't know a few hours earlier that McKenney was a wanted man. That was after McKenney had lost control of his car north of Canyonville and collided with a dump truck driven by Richard James Rupert.

A deputy sheriff, not suspecting that the man was wanted, gave him a ride to Canyonville after the accident. McKenney stepped out of the car and was seen entering a hotel.

A few hours later, the deputy was informed that McKenney was wanted. The deputy recognized his name. McKenney converged on the hotel, and McKenney was taken without further incident.

The sheriff's office also said that McKenney, who was carrying a .25-caliber revolver, is being investigated for an armed robbery.

Multipurpose Room In Doubt At Eastwood

Whether a multipurpose room will be constructed as a part of the new Eastwood School in East Roseburg depends on the amount of the basic bid, school authorities said today.

Bids on the structure will be opened on Jan. 31, according to Roseburg School Supt. M. C. DeJager, and the multipurpose room has been included as an alternate.

But whether it will be built will depend on whether bidding contractors can stay well within the \$192,000 worth of bonds which have been set aside for construction of the six-classroom school.

The school board Wednesday night accepted plans for the building from architect Lytle Glenn.

The school will have classroom space for children in the first six grades not already being educated in Benson School, with only minor exceptions.

It is to be built as a starter unit, with six other classrooms and additional facilities included in the eventual plans. That would include the multipurpose room should the school board decide to omit it when the contract for construction is awarded.

Completion of the building will be about Aug. 31.

Missile Control Sought By U.S. At U. N. Meeting

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—The United States is expected to outline a broad proposal for international control over space missiles Monday when the U.N. political committee takes up the key arms question.

Informed sources indicated U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge Jr. would relay President Eisenhower's call for a "reliable agreement" on controlling military use of such projectiles.

Eisenhower set the stage for such a proposal in his State of the Union message Thursday. In effect, the President called for an air-tight agreement within the framework of the U.N. on the use of intercontinental ballistic missiles.

U.S. officials in Washington disclosed recently that the United States has revamped its disarmament plan to include long range missile control. The prospect that the next few years will see the development of intercontinental missiles capable of carrying nuclear warheads was said to have increased the pressure for controls.

REUSE TO EAT

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—About 15,000 New Delhi school teachers refused to eat Saturday in a token strike for hunger strike for increased wages.

The teachers now get from \$15 to \$60 a month. Union leaders did not say how much of an increase they sought.

Green PTA Hears About Robin Dale

The Robin Dale School for Exceptional Children took the limelight at the latest meeting of the Green Parent-Teachers Assn.

Featured speaker was James Dawson, executive director of the school. He was introduced by Charles Church, former member of the school board.

Dawson told the members the mentally retarded children at Robin Dale have special problems which cannot be handled in public schools. They must have special types of education.

He complimented the people of the Roseburg area for showing "progressive spirit" in their efforts to do something about these children.

Dawson also revealed that a study is in progress to see what can be done to establish a school for exceptional children on a county level under the jurisdiction of the county school system.

Dawson, returning to the subject of the children themselves, said particularly emphasis at the Robin Dale School is on teaching the children to get along with people.

Asst. Secretary Taking Leave Pending Probe

WASHINGTON (AP)—Asst. Secretary of Defense Robert Tripp Ross today began a self-imposed leave of absence pending completion of congressional investigations of an Army contract held by a firm headed by his wife.

Ross is the husband of Mrs. Claire Wynne Ross, president of Wynne Enterprises Inc., Knoxville, Tenn. Last Nov. 13, this firm was awarded an \$834,150 Army contract for 249,000 pairs of cotton trousers.

The Senate and House government operations committees started inquiries when details of the contract were published.

Last night, Ross made public a letter to Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.), chairman of the Senate committee. Ross' letter said "a complete documentation of the facts" would show the contract award "was made in accordance with normal procurement procedures."

Then he told McClellan he was taking a leave of absence until the congressional investigations of the contract had been completed "and the matter has been cleared up."

Miss McDonald In Seclusion

ENCINO, Calif. (AP)—The whereabouts of Marie McDonald of her secret today.

Her physician, Dr. Rexford Kennerly, said she had suffered a relapse and that he ordered her into strict seclusion. Mrs. Marie Tuboni, the actress' mother, declined to say where her daughter had gone.

Miss McDonald's story of being kidnaped in her home the night of Jan. 3 by two men and of being held captive 24 hours before being pushed out of her car is being investigated by police.

She was hysterical and slightly injured when a truck driver came upon her on the highway 120 miles from Los Angeles and took her to Cactus City. She was then taken to a hospital at Indio and returned the next evening to her home here.

Ex-Convict Held For Portland On Narcotics Charge
