## Congressmen Get Secret Matter, Claims Vinson

WASHINGTON (AP) - Rep. Vinson (D-Ga.) said Saturday "I've heard" three or four congressmen were given copies of a document which the Army says was leaked to "unauthorized persons."

It dealt with limits put on the Army's development and use of new missiles.

"I've heard three or four congressmen were given copies of it," Vinson, chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, told a reporter. "I understand they were all from Alabama."

Vinson said he has been told also that "this colonel" gave the document to the congressmen "on his own volition."

The Army announced Jan. 7 that Col. John C. Nickerson Jr. was one of several officers being questioned after a document which "apparently contained secret information" was found "in the hands of unauthorized persons."

The Army named only Nickerson, chief of the field coordinating office at the Army's ballistic missile center, Redstone Arsenal, Huntsville, Ala., as among those being questioned.
