Jay Hebert Takes Bing Crosby Title

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP)—"I'm hitting the ball better and thinking better, not making as many mistakes."

That's the way golfer Jay Hebert, 33-year-old former Marine officer, explained his 2-stroke victory in Bing Crosby's \$15,000 tournament yesterday.

Hebert, a pro for eight years and often right behind the top men, started out with a pair of birdies and finished with a great 12-foot putt as the wind whistled over the Pebble Beach course.

His 2-under-par 70 was the only sub-par round of the day. It gave him a 213 winning total for the 54 holes and good for \$2,500.

Cary Middlecott, U.S. Open champion who had won here two previous years, finished with a 72 and 215.

Third prize money of \$1,000 from this national pro-amateur event went to Canada's Stan Leonard, co-leader at the end of the second round, who took a final 74 for a total of 216.

Walter Burkemo, Franklin Hills, Mich., captured fourth place with a 76-219, good for \$700. At 220 were Paul O'Leary, Los Angeles, who shot a final round 76; Lloyd Mangrum, Apple Valley, Calif., 72; Ken Venturi, San Francisco, 76; and Wesley Ellis, Rye, N.Y., 75.

Iowa State gets a chance tonight to prove it was no fluke when it scared the daylight out of Wilt (The Stilt) Chamberlain and his Kansas hotshots before dropping a one-point decision in the Big Seven conference basketball tournament in December.

The Jayhawks, undefeated in 12 games, pulled that one out 58-57 with Chamberlain held to a miserable 12 points. The Kansas also got a scare from Kansas State Saturday before finally pulling it out 51-45. But in this one the seven-foot Stilt from Philadelphia dropped in 30 points.

Carolina Seeks 15th
North Carolina, which is giving Kansas a tussle for the top spot in the weekly Associated Press poll, moves into action against a weak North Carolina State team tomorrow night in quest of its 15th straight.

Two other members of the top 10 play tonight and neither should have any trouble. Col. Adolph Rupp's Kentucky outfit, a distant No. 3 in the poll, visits Tulane in quest of its 10th triumph against two decent teams. Vanderbilt, No. 6, plays Mississippi State.

Meanwhile, the picture in some of the major conferences began to clear, but in others, like the Big Ten, there was no telling what was in the works.

Ohio State Unbeaten
The Big Ten has only one undefeated team—Ohio State (2-0). Indiana, Minnesota and Northwestern all suffered their initial league defeats Saturday.

Big Seven—No contest. Kansas, 3-0, leads.

Atlantic Coast—North Carolina the big choice with a 5-0 in conference play.

Southeastern—Kentucky is 2-0 in league play, but so is Alabama. Pacific Coast—UCLA seems headed for another league title, although it now is tied for second with Washington, each with 4-0.

Southwest—Southern Methodist is living up to preseason expectations—3-0 in the league and 13-1 overall.

Ivy—The oldest championship in the country is still very much in doubt. Princeton leads with 3-0 but Dartmouth, Columbia and Yale are right behind with 2-1.

Idaho State First
Rocky Mountain—A familiar name, Idaho State, is racing toward its fifth straight league title. Skyline—Brigham Young heads the pack with 3-1 and has high hopes of winning. But it will have to overcome defending champion Utah (2-1).

Missouri Valley—St. Louis and Oklahoma A&M, the early favorites, have been disappointing, leaving the door open for Bradley (3-0) to take over.

Regulations Would Raise Umpqua Limit

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Game Commission will hold a second public hearing here Jan. 25 before adopting final 1957 sports fishing regulations.

Little change from last year is shown in tentative regulations announced Saturday.

In all zones, the trout season would run from April 27 through Oct. 31 and there would be a continuation of the separate season for high Cascade lakes, from May 25 through Oct. 6.

The proposed regulations provide a few changes in bag limits. The Umpqua spring Chinook limit would be raised from one to two fish per week. A special silver salmon bag limit of four fish per day and eight in possession would be permitted for Tenmile Lakes and Tenmile Creek. Fishermen would be limited to 25 shad per day.

Other proposed changes in the regulations would:

- Close the Metolius to all salmon fishing.
- Drop the minimum length limits for eastern brook trout in all northeastern Oregon areas.
- Add Lake of the Woods to the lakes with April 27 openings.

Others are Odell, Suttle, Wickiup Reservoir, Detroit Reservoir, Fish Lake (Lincoln County) and Fish Lake (Jackson County).

Reinstated radius closures on Lake Creek outlet and the mouths of Siletz and Short creeks in the Diamond Lake region.

Increase the bag limit at Mud Lake near Bend to 20 trout per day and 60 in possession. That's because the lake is to be poisoned with rotenone in the fall to get rid of trash fish.
