

Atomic Energy Committee Posts Sought By Two

WASHINGTON — Washington State conceivably could have two members on the Joint Atomic Energy Committee in the 85th Congress.

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Rep. Westland (R-Wash.) said Saturday he has asked for the assignment. He said he has been given the unanimous support of Republicans in the 11 western states.

If successful, he would join Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.) who served on the committee while in the House and was reappointed from the Senate shortly after moving to that side of the Capitol.

Westland is seeking the Republican vacancy caused by the death last summer of Rep. Hinshaw (R-Calif.).

Working against his appointment to the committee is his relative low seniority. The same seat reportedly is being sought by other House Republicans.

How successful Westland will be may depend upon the Republi-

can's decision in filling the House Rules Committee vacancy caused by defeat of Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.). Westerners are seeking to get a man from that area on the committee, possibly Rep. Allen (R-Calif.).

If seniority were to govern the selection, it probably would go to Rep. Scott (R-Pa.).

One Republican leader indicated privately this week the dispute over the two committee vacancies may be settled by compromise. This, he said, would send Scott to the Rules Committee because of his seniority and give the Atomic assignment to someone from the west.

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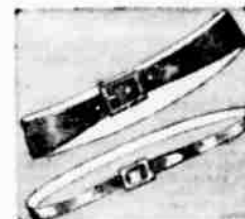
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
