

## Glacial Cold Hits Eastern Section Of U. S.

Glacial cold reached 35 degrees below zero in upstate New York Tuesday as polar air gripped most of the eastern half of the nation.

The minus 55 mark at Boonville set an all-time record for New York State, shattering a 21-year-old record set when the mercury sank to 52 below at Stillwater reservoir Feb. 9, 1934.

Local records fell by the hundreds as the arctic surge went in to its second day with no immediate relief sighted. At Massena, N.Y., the temperature reached 44 degrees below zero at 6:30 a.m. Other recordings were -27 at Watertown, -25 at Utica, -23 at Elmira, -21 at Syracuse and Glenn Falls, -19 at Binghamton and Albany, and -12 at Buffalo.

At Owego Head in New York's Adirondacks, an unofficial -57 was reported.

New York City, favored by its coastal location, recorded 3 above zero in the early morning. LaGuardia Airport had 3 below.

Subzero marks were general throughout the northeast, and southward into the Pennsylvania and Maryland mountains.

As the Senate met Tuesday, both sides said there have been no negotiations since Sunday night's long caucus. There wasn't time to negotiate Monday, because of Gov. Holmes' inauguration and hall.

The first caucus, which ended at 4:15 a. m. Monday, consisted of 38 tie ballots for the presidency.

The Democrats support Sen. Walter J. Pearson, Portland insurance man; and the Republicans favor Sen. Warren Gill, Lebanon lawyer.

So far, the Democrats have shown no disposition to compromise. But some Republicans said they would vote for a Democrat other than Pearson.

In other words, the Republicans are more interested in winning control of half of the key committees than they are in the presidency.

Since Oregon doesn't have a lieutenant governor, the Senate president is first in line of succession to the governor.

There has been one agreement on Senate committees, although a minor one. It is that all committees shall consist of seven members, split on a 4-3 basis between the two parties. The party with a majority on each committee would have the chairmanship.

The House met for 10 minutes Tuesday and adjourned until 10 a. m. Wednesday.

Rep. Clarence Barton (D), Coquille, chairman of the House Taxation Committee, said his committee would meet at 1 p. m. to begin work on the tax program.

The income surtax was imposed and the exemptions cut to \$500 by the Republican-controlled 1953 Legislature. The administration proposes to replace the revenue that would be lost under the new bill by increasing income tax rates on individuals and corporations.

## Israelis Withdrawing Troops From Sinai

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291 of the victims were refugees of the 1948 Palestine War and the others were Arab residents of the strip.

An Israeli spokesman at U.N. headquarters declared the casualty figures were obtained from sources of questionable accuracy.

An Israeli Foreign Ministry spokesman claimed the dead "were largely personnel of the Palestine units attached to the regular Egyptian army who took an active part in the fighting in the 'national guard' units, and as fedayeen (commandos)."

Israeli military authorities Tuesday opened the court-martial of nine members of Israel's border police on charges of slaying 47 Arab villagers in a curfew incident near the Israeli-Jordan border Oct. 29. The trial was expected to last 10 days.

The two officers and seven enlisted men are accused of shooting the Arabs at the village of Kfar Kassem when the villagers — men, women and children — were found outside their homes in violation of an all-night curfew.

## Eighth Fatality On Antarctic Continent Told

— A 22-year-old Seabee has become the eighth fatality of the American campaign into the frozen antarctic.

Ollie Barrett Bartley of Slaughter, Ky., drowned Monday when a weasel snow tractor in which he and five other men were riding plunged through thin ice.

Bartley's companions escaped although they suffered shock from being dashed into the icy water. The vehicle tipped over and disappeared beneath the surface only 30 yards from the spot where a weathered wooden cross marks the loss of a British seaman from the Scott expedition of 1902.

Bartley's body was recovered nine hours after the accident by Navy frogmen flown in by helicopter from the cargo ship Arneb.

The weasel was traveling over ice formed in the year since the icebreaker Glacier broke a channel to Hut Point. Most of the frozen surface is four feet thick, but it was believed that currents near the shore weakened the spot where the vehicle broke through.

Members of the board set Jan. 20 as a date for the budget board to meet. The school board will meet to discuss the district's budget, but that date has not been established.

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loss of revenue should be made up by revising income tax rates. Smith also agreed that the state should give more aid to education, but he didn't name any specific amount.

Holmes' message, which came after Chief Justice William C. Perry administered the oath of office, included many proposed changes in state government.

Several of these would concentrate more power in the governor's hands, such as abolishment of the Board of Control and Liquor Commission.

Holmes, charging that the Republicans have "stood complacently by" while Oregon hasn't been developed economically, asked for creation of a state Development Department to bring new industries to the state.

He also asked for abolition of the death penalty, repeal of the state welfare relative responsibility law, construction of more power projects, increased funds for higher education, higher teacher salaries, and federal aid to education.

Reaction to his address split on party lines. Democratic legislators generally applauded it, although a few wondered where the state would get the money to finance the increased cost.

Republicans expressed doubt that income taxes could be increased sufficiently to pay the extra 39 million dollars that the school aid increase would cost.

Sen. Jean Lewis, Portland Democrat, only woman in the Senate, presided at the ceremony. She was campaign manager for Sen. Wayne Morse last fall, and is a lawyer.

Normally, the president of the Senate would have presided, but the Senate, split 13-13 between the two parties, was unable to pick a president before the inauguration and Mrs. Lewis was chosen for the temporary role.

O. J. Monger accepted a contract renewal to serve his tenth year as superintendent at Canyonville, a renewal which also marks his 14th year as an administrator in Douglas County.

Prior to his term at Canyonville, Monger served three years in the Roseburg school system and one year at Glendale.

The board also set the date of Monday, Jan. 28, at 7:30 p.m. for a special budget meeting at the high school.

A report from Mrs. Norman Chappell was also heard by the board regarding the proposed cafeteria. Mrs. Chappell is chairman of a PTA committee which has investigated the cafeteria proposal. Funds for this time have been included in the 1957-58 Canyonville school budget.

The attorney was directed to draw up and present the proposal with the aid of the district's consulting engineers. Final plans for purchase of water from Myrtle Creek will probably be reached after the proposal has been presented to the city council, according to Clark Stokes, chairman.

Four plans for securing water were presented at the meeting. The board believes that buying water from Myrtle Creek would be the most economical plan at this time, Stokes said.

Present at the meeting were James Richmond, attorney from Roseburg, Cliff Shaw from the Corvallis engineering firm and two visitors from Tri-City, Jack Dowd and John Birenbaum.

Stokes said the plan will probably be presented at the next city council meeting, Feb. 5.

## President Views Drought Areas

TUCSON, Ariz. — President Eisenhower was told Tuesday that Arizona's drought-stricken ranges are in the worst condition in more than 30 years.

Before taking off for the final round of drought inspection, he heard that cattle, one of the backbones of the state's economy, were the poorest since the Crop and Livestock Reporting Service began making estimates in 1922.

Dr. Harold Myers, dean of the College of Agriculture at the University of Arizona, said: "The drought effect will last far beyond the coming calf crop. Breeding cow numbers will have to be rebuilt. This repair job will take several years."

Some ranchers already have spent almost as much on feed as the value of their cows, Myers said.

The President may disclose later Tuesday what the federal government proposes to do about easing the worsening plight of farmers and ranchers.

Simplicity, which he liked in his lusty life, prevails in the rites planned for 12:30 p.m. at All Saints Episcopal Church in Beverly Hills.

The Rev. Kermit Kestelone, assistant rector, will read the short Episcopal funeral service. The eulogy will be written and delivered by John Huston, who directed Bogart in three of his most noteworthy movies, the Academy Award-winning "African Queen," "The Maltese Falcon" and "The Treasure of the Sierra Madre."

There will be no honorary pallbearers. And the widow, actress Lauren Bacall — Bogie's beloved "Betty" or "Baby" — asked the omission of flowers, preferring, instead, donations to the American Cancer Society.

Burial will be Forest Lawn Memorial Park in nearby Glendale. Bogart died in his sleep of cancer early yesterday morning at his Holmby Hills home, with "Baby" at his bedside.
