

Cal To Appoint Coach Tonight

University of California should name its new football coach tonight with Nebraska's Pete Elliott seen on the inside track.

There was nothing official from the university except an announcement that the two groups having the final decision meet at 7:30 p.m. to hear the report of Athletic Director Greg Engelhard and Paul Hastings, executive director of the Associated Students Organization.

Speculation, however, pointed to the 30-year-old Elliott, a star at the University of Michigan in his collegiate days, as the man most likely to succeed Lynn O. (Pappy) Waldorf, who resigned after a 10-year tenure.

The split-T formation mentor, who would be the youngest football coach in Cal annals, said from Bloomington, Ill., "There is nothing official I can say at the present time. I hope to make a statement soon because I don't like to carry things like this out any longer than possible."

He added that his three-year contract at Nebraska was a verbal one and "I don't believe it could be considered a breach of contract should I desire to move on."

Few Changes Mark Rules; Substitution Change Asked

NEW ORLEANS — The Football Rules Committee of the National Collegiate Athletic Assn. reached the midway point of its annual meeting today with Chairman Fritz Crisler contending, "Everyone's pretty well satisfied with the game just as it is."

The greying Crisler, athletic director and former head coach at the University of Michigan, said there were fewer suggestions for rules changes this year than ever before.

"Why, I usually receive more than 75 or 80 myself, but this year I think I got only about 30," he said.

The American Football Coaches Assn. requested an expansion of the substitution rule which now permits only starting players to return to the game once a quarter.

Sen. McCarthy Now In Sports

MOSCOW — Mikhail M. Pestyak, deputy chairman of the All Union Soviet sports committee, said Saturday that Sen. McCarthy blocked future sports meetings between United States and Russian athletes.

Soviet sportsmen are willing to compete with the U. S. sportsmen anytime and anywhere, "But there's nothing we can do about it as long as U. S. sportsmen are not permitted to compete with us," Pestyak said at a news conference.

Pestyak said the Soviet Olympics team established friendly contacts with the Americans at Melbourne and both sides expressed eagerness to meet again.

"Two or three days later, however, Dan Ferris received threatening letters from McCarthy saying what all this foolishness about — you know we won't permit such meetings."

Ferris is secretary-treasurer of the Amateur Athletic Union in the United States.

McCarthy, in Washington, said he never wrote such letters, and Ferris, in New York, said it was "all news to me."

Ocean Water Plan Urged To Kill Tenmile Scrap Fish

PORTLAND — A proposal to protect young steelhead and salmon in the Wilson and Trask rivers and another to clean Tenmile Lakes of scrap fish were made before the state Game Commission.

The commission is expected to announce tentative angling regulations for the state later Saturday.

O. B. Forsell of Lakeside made the suggestion to clean out Tenmile Lakes. He suggested ocean water could be pumped into the lakes, to be left there through a summer. The salt water would kill perch and catfish, he said, and the fall freshets would wash the lakes fresh again, with salmonid fish as the only survivors.

A Tillamook County delegation said trout fishermen in spring and summer seasons were destroying steelhead and salmon crops in the Wilson and Trask river systems.

They proposed closure of all tributaries to those streams.

"We in Tillamook don't need a summer fishery on these streams. What we desire is to protect our winter fishery on salmon and steelhead," said John Epping, president of the Tillamook chapter of the Izaak Walton League.

But the 22-year-old slugger said he'll expect general manager Spike Briggs to give in a little too, when they sit down — for the fourth time — to talk contract in about two weeks.

Unhappy at the publicity given his squabble with Briggs and most especially with the general manager's comment that "Kalline thinks he's as good as Mickey Mantle and wants more money," the young right fielder made the first move since the flurry to patch things up.

DETROIT — Al Kalline, admittedly a bit uneasy about the prospect of a slugger match over his 1957 salary with the Detroit Tigers, said Tuesday he is "willing to compromise."
