# Union Challenging Senate Authority In Probe Of Funds

WASHINGTON — Counsel for two West Coast labor union officials announced Wednesday "we are challenging the authority" of the Senate investigations subcommittee to look into the union's affairs.

Samuel B. Bassett, Seattle lawyer, made the statement to reporters. The subcommittee had just begun closed doors an inquiry which chairman McClellan (D-Ark) said would seek the facts about alleged "labor racketeering."

McClellan called as his first witness chairman Boyd Leedom of the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB). He said Leedom would be questioned about possible need for tougher laws.

Robert F. Kennedy, subcommittee counsel told reporters that public hearings may be held Thursday.

Bassett is counsel for Frank W. Brewster, a vice president of the Teamsters Union (AFL-CIO) and head of its Western Conference, and for LaPoma, also known as George Cavano, secretary-treasurer of Teamsters Local 174 in Seattle.

Bassett said Brewster and LaPoma would refuse to hand over to the subcommittee financial records for which it has issued subpoenas.

# Sen. Johnston Calls For Halt Of Refugee Flow

WASHINGTON — Sen. Olin D. Johnston (D-SC) called Tuesday for halting the flow of Hungarian refugees into his country pending further investigation. He said he believes "a substantial number of Communists" have been admitted.

"We are playing with dynamite," Johnston told newsmen after a Senate Internal Security subcommittee hearing at which an escapee from Hungary testified a Communist secret police agent had been planted in the American legation there.

Johnston, acting as the subcommittee chairman, said that "in my opinion there is no question that a substantial number of Communists are coming in under the pretext that they didn't like their country and wanted to come here."

# Britain Forced To Cut Air Defenses Budget

LONDON — Britain's shortage of fuel and money forced cutbacks in its air defenses. Part of the reduction was attributed to diminished requirements, but money and gasoline economies plainly were factors.

The Ministry of Supply announced a cut of 100 in the number of supersonic Hunter jet fighters on order from manufacturers.

# Former Deputy Held On Charge Of Hauling Loot

HOUSTON, Tex. — Jack Lyles, former sheriff's deputy, was jailed Tuesday on a charge of carrying across a state border \$22,000 of the loot from an Oregon bank robbery.

Lyles, 24, son of a former Houston fire chief, was accused by the FBI of making off with part of the money taken in a \$58,000 robbery of the Inland Empire Bank at Umatilla, Ore., Aug. 22, 1955.

Arrested at his home, Lyles declined comment. He waived a hearing before U. S. Commissioner Alpha Fowler.

Bill Scott Jr., his attorney, said, "My client hasn't admitted anything."

FBI agents said that Jack E. Hill and Tilton B. Benson robbed the Oregon bank, divided the money and parted company.

They said Hill went to New Orleans where \$22,000 was taken from him on Aug. 29, 1955. The charge against Lyles said he brought the money to Houston that day and knew the money had been stolen.

# Fair Weather But Colder On Tap For Oregon

Oregon will have generally fair but very cold weather until the weekend, when a storm off the coast will bring some rain to the western part of the state, the Weather Bureau said Wednesday.

A chill mass of cold air from Canada Tuesday night hit most of Oregon and Wednesday night is due to grip even more of the Willamette Valley and southern Oregon.

Light snow continued to fall Wednesday morning at several points east of the Cascades as the mercury dipped to 2 degrees below zero at Pendleton and 2 degrees above at Baker.

Colder temperatures are forecast Wednesday night, with the low in eastern Oregon from 19 below zero in the north and from zero to 10 above in the south.

The mercury also will dip lower west of the Cascades — where Tuesday night Portland had a low of 29 and Salem a 28. Wednesday night it will be from 22 to 32 degrees.

A chill east wind is expected through the Cascades. Coastal winds will hit from 10 to 25 miles an hour.

# Radford Claims Ike's Plan Would Eliminate War

WASHINGTON — Adm. Arthur W. Radford says Congress' passage of the Eisenhower Middle East resolution would "practically eliminate the chances of war" in that area.

The chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff testified Jan. 8 at a closed session of the House Foreign Affairs Committee. His testimony made these other points:

1. The United States has a "definite" military superiority over Russia, probably even somewhat greater than that of a year ago.

plained its position on the stalemate over dividing control of the 20 Senate committees.

The Democratic spokesman, Sen. Harry Boivin, Klamath Falls, said "The Democrats believe that control of the five top Senate committees is necessary in order that the governor's program can be given a reasonable opportunity to reach the floor of the Senate."

Sen. Philip S. Lowry, Medford, speaking for the Republicans, answered that since the Republicans have half of the Senate membership, they are entitled to a fair split in the committees.

At a session Tuesday night, the Republicans announced they had accepted a special committee's plan to divide Senate committee control, but the Democrats would not accept it.

Three more ballots—bringing the total to 42—were taken Tuesday night, with the Republicans still voting for Gill and the Democrats for Pearson.

The plan to divide the committees would let the Democrats choose the first three on which they would have chairmanships and 4-3 majorities. The Republicans then would select the next three. From then on, the parties would take turns picking one at a time.

Pearson said that the Democrats insist on getting control of these committees—Taxation, Ways and Means, Education, Labor and Industries, and either Commerce or Utilities or Natural Resources.

Pearson said his party has a mandate from the people because they voted in November for a Democratic governor, a Democratic House of Representatives, and for 12 Democrats in 15 Senate races.

This mandate, he said, is "to prevent the governor's program from being stymied in 'Senate committees that are controlled by Republicans."

The committee which negotiated the plan to divide committee control consisted of Sen. Philip S. Lowry, Medford; Lee Ghmert, Salem; and Carl Francis, Dayton, all Republicans; and Ward Cook, Portland; Harry Boivin, Klamath Falls; and Alfred H. Corbett, Portland, Democrats.

They negotiated all day Tuesday in secret. When Lowry asked his fellow negotiators Tuesday night for permission to announce details of the plan because "the public is entitled to know," all agreed except Corbett.

Lowry then said he wasn't free to tell about the plan because of Corbett's objection, but details were easily obtained after the session ended.

The Republicans, at a caucus after the night session, invited news reporters to attend for a briefing.

Lowry said the Republicans offered the Democrats "any number of formulas," but that none had been accepted by them.

According to Ernie Barker, Roseburg, chairman of the legislative committee, by divorcement the dealers seek to "separate the wholesalers from retailing."

The second proposal seeks relief from oil companies' price control over the industry, according to Baker, wherein the wholesalers can regulate prices by distributing their product through cut-rate retail outlets.

In its third proposal, the act would free the retail gas dealers to buy such things as tires, batteries and accessories on the open market, rather than be restricted to purchasing from organizations designated by the petroleum suppliers.

In a third proposal accepted, the committee favored a bill that would demand gasoline sold to off-highway users such as farmers, contractors and loggers be "dyed" so that it can be checked for violation use in highway vehicles.

Eisenhower is able to bring off a surplus in the next fiscal year. It will be the third in a row for his administration—the first time that trick has been turned since 1928, 1929 and 1930.

In fiscal 1956, ended last June 30, the government wound up \$1,600,000,000 in the black. The President said he foresees a \$1,700,000,000 surplus this year. That would be about a billion dollars more than was estimated last summer.

In other main points, Eisenhower also did these things:

1. Predicted spending during this fiscal year will total \$68,900,000,000—about \$200,000,000 less than he figured late August, and put government revenue at an unprecedented \$70,600,000,000—about \$800,000,000 more than the August forecast.

2. Estimated the national debt next June 30 will be trimmed to \$270,600,000,000 and on June 30, 1958, to \$269,200,000,000. These figures would compare with the \$267,274,000,000 debt existing when he took office Jan. 20, 1953.

3. Called for new appropriations of \$72,300,000,000, up \$2,800,000,000 from this year and only \$300 million less than projected revenues for the next fiscal year. The total is 1 1/2 billion more than his spending outline and marks the second straight year in which he has asked for more spending authority than he planned to use within that 12-month period.

Eisenhower said tax rates are still too high, but "urgent national responsibilities" foreclose a general tax cut now.

He asked the lawmakers to continue for another year the present 52 per cent tax on corporate profits, along with excise taxes on tobacco, liquor and automobiles, which otherwise would drop back on April 1.

On the expense side, he predicted the heavy demand for credit and capital in the prosperous economy would push interest on the national debt up another 100 million dollars next year. The new figure of \$7,360,000,000 would account for 10 per cent of all federal spending.

The \$8-billion-dollar defense spending figure would be about \$2,626,000,000 more than that for the current year, although total manpower levels would remain at about the present 2,800,000 figure. New weapons are growing more costly, he said.

He said spending for military public works at bases at home and abroad would be up about 14 per cent next year.

The \$4,365,000,000 foreign aid figure he proposed — 258 million more than this year — includes half of the 400-million-dollar emergency fund he already has requested to give military-economic help to the Middle East during the next two years.

Of the foreign aid total, \$2,900,000,000 would be earmarked for military aid and the rest for economic aid.

A record sum of \$5,329,880,000 was recommended to aid farmers and for the agriculture department. This is a \$178,215,000 increase.

# Hammarskjold Says Israeli Withdrawal Essential Step

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold declared Wednesday the withdrawal of Israeli forces behind the 1948 armistice line is an essential step for restoring peace with Egypt.

In a progress report to the 80-nation General Assembly, Hammarskjold said he had held extensive but unsuccessful discussions with representatives of Israel "aiming at full compliance with the withdrawal requirements" laid down by the Assembly last November.

Israel, he said, still was silent "concerning compliance with the resolutions by withdrawal of Israeli forces from the Gaza Strip."

This is one of the two areas which Israel said Tuesday would still remain in its hands when a new phase of the withdrawal from Egypt is completed Jan. 22. The other area is Sharm el Sheikh on the Gulf of Aqaba.

Hammarskjold said Israel had indicated the evacuation of the Aqaba Strip is anticipated, although it had suggested further talks with him on this problem. He indicated this involved the question of guaranteeing free shipping through the Gulf of Aqaba, but he said he did not consider this question fell within the mandate given him by the Assembly.

Hammarskjold released his report as the 27-nation Asian-Arab bloc prepared to lay before the Assembly a resolution condemning the pace of Israel's withdrawal and calling for economic and financial restrictions against Israel.

The secretary general said the Assembly's November resolutions make "it clear that the withdrawal of Israeli forces must be behind the armistice line as it has been established, in the Egypt-Israel agreement."

He added that the Gaza Strip, "according to this agreement, falls on the Egyptian side of the armistice demarcation line" and said further talks with Israel are required on this point.
