Receipts Show Rise

Year-end totals at the Canyonville Post Office showed a 14.26 per cent increase in receipts for the calendar year 1956 over 1955, according to Norman Hanson, postmaster.

As there have been no increases in postal rates in the past two years, this increase reflects additional business, Hanson said.

Christmas mails were handled in the local office without delay or backlog, and work was considerably easier than in past years because of new and adequate equipment and ample work space, Hanson continued.

The Canyonville Post Office staff moved into their new building on December, 1955, with new equipment completed early in 1956.
