

Elliott Accepts California Job At \$18,000 Pay

BERKELEY, Calif. — The University of California looks today to young Pete Elliott, former Michigan quarterback, to boost its football fortunes in the Pacific Coast Conference.

California lured the 26-year-old Elliott from Nebraska with a three-year contract estimated at about \$18,000 a year.

Pete directed the Cornhuskers last year in his first season as head coach and had been voted a pay raise of \$14,500 there. His club had a record of four victories and six defeats with a 3-3 mark in the Big Seven.

Succeeding 54-year-old Lynn O. (Pappy) Waldorf, the split-T advocate becomes the 21st and youngest head man in California's grid history.

Three Rose Jaunts

Waldorf took the Golden Bears to the Rose Bowl in 1949, 1950 and 1951 but last season they finished next to last in the nine-club PCC with a 2-5 record. He announced his retirement before last season ended.

Athletic Director Greg Engelhard announced last night that Elliott had accepted the California job and had been approved unanimously by the Executive Committee of the Associated Students of U.C., the group making the final decision.

Immediately after that Nebraska said backfield coach Bill Jennings would succeed Elliott.

Prior to heading the staff at Nebraska, Pete served as assistant coach at Oregon State in 1949 and 1950 and at Oklahoma from 1951 through 1955.

A native of Bloomington, Ill., Pete won 12 varsity letters at Michigan, four each in football, basketball and golf.

Meanies Lindsay, Lenz Set On Saturday Mat Agenda

Lindsay is rated as one of the top five contenders for the world's heavyweight title belt held now by Lou Tesser, who has grappled the husky colored grappler on several occasions.

Lenz appeared on last week's card and won his match over Tito Carreon with little trouble using his pet hold (full nelson) for both of the falls.

Lenz and Lindsay grappled to a crowd-thrilling draw recently in

Sports Football Rules Group Outlaws Mask Grabbing

NEW ORLEANS — The Football Rules Committee of the National Collegiate Athletic Assn. took final action Wednesday on proposals to outlaw face mask grabbing and expand the substitution rule as its annual meeting came to a close.

The two moves dominated suggestions made during the three-day session presided over by committee chairman H. O. (Fritz) Crisler, former head coach and now athletic director of the University of Michigan.

The suggested change in the substitution rule was made by the American Football Coaches Assn. through Lou Little, retired coach at Columbia University.

Little asked the rule be relaxed to permit substitutes to return to the game once each quarter. The present rule permits only the starters to return once after being relieved in each period.

E. E. (Tad) Wieman, secretary of the committee and former Michigan and Princeton coach and present athletic director at the University of Denver, said the grabbing of protective face masks was becoming a dangerous situation.

President Makes Messages Public

TUCSON, Ariz. — President Eisenhower Tuesday made public an exchange of messages with Great Britain's new prime minister—an exchange pledging continued personal friendship and obviously looking to bolstering Anglo-American unity.

The exchange with Harold Macmillan, who last week succeeded Anthony Eden as chief of Britain's government, was put out in Tucson shortly before the President left on a further tour of drought damaged areas of the Southwest.

"I send my warmest congratulations to you on becoming prime minister of the United Kingdom," Eisenhower messaged Macmillan, with whom he became well acquainted during World War II.

"Your distinguished career is well known on this side of the Atlantic and has earned our widespread respect."

"My own warm admiration stems, as you know, from our associations in North Africa and through the succeeding years. For me that association has been as agreeable as it has been productive."

Neither Eisenhower nor Macmillan, in his reply, made any mention of the possibility of a face-to-face meeting. There has been speculation that they may get together soon to mend further the differences between the two countries resulting from the ill-fated British venture into Egypt.

Portland Board May Use Non-Teacher Aides

PORTLAND — The Portland School Board here this week approved a plan to use non-teacher assistants to ease crowded classroom conditions here.

Assistant superintendent Norman Hamilton said the program—to start on a trial basis next fall—will use the non-teachers in kindergartens and in high school English and typing classes.

The aides will help regular teachers keep records, grade papers, supervise attendance and perform other non-teaching roles. Hamilton said they probably would be paid about \$3,500 a year.

Hamilton said they will enable a teacher to take care of more pupils and would fill the gap during any instructor shortage.

The board also approved Monday night a plan to have programs dealing with art, music and social studies telecast into Portland's elementary schools.

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Holdout Season Is Here; Minoso Returns Contract

The major league holdout front opened officially today when outfielder Minnie Minoso began his annual tug-of-war with the Chicago White Sox.

The White Sox received Minoso's unsigned contract from Havana yesterday with the notation: "It looks like this contract was intended for the Minoso of 1953 or 1954, not the one who had such a fine season in 1956. Please send corrected contract."

Minoso, who batted .316 last year, reportedly was offered \$32,000, the same as last year.

With the exception of the Washington Senators, none of the major

league clubs have come up with any serious holdouts and most top-line players are coming into the fold without argument. New York Yankee star Mickey Mantle sent back his first contract, but his case isn't regarded as serious — yet. Senator chiefiea Calvin Griffith said: "With the contracts we're getting back unsigned, apparently a lot of us think we're going to have a better year."

A fistful of players signed yesterday. The Milwaukee Braves snared the No. 1 plum when they got first baseman Joe Adcock to agree to a two-year contract calling for \$20,000 to \$25,000 a season. The St. Louis Cardinals corralled left-handed pitcher Wilmer (Vinegar Bend) Mizell and the Chicago Cubs brought pitcher Bob Rush into the fold.

Reds Invite U. S. To Cinder Tourney

NEW YORK — Russia would like to have a U. S. track team compete in the "friendly sports games for youth" at Moscow next summer, but indications Wednesday were that an invitation would be turned down.

"We have refused invitations to that meet before," said AAU secretary-treasurer Dan Ferris. "In view of the current political climate following the Hungarian revolt, I strongly doubt that we'll change our attitude."

Ferris does not care to talk much about the matter because the State Department plays a big role in such things.

Nevertheless, he indicated that both the National Track and Field Committee and the Foreign Relations Committee of the AAU would consider the question at their meeting here Feb. 22-24.

"It wasn't really an invitation," said Ferris. "It was more of a feeler. It said the athletic section of the U.S.S.R. 'will be glad to invite' an American team."

The big festival, an annual fixture behind the Iron Curtain, is scheduled for Moscow between July 27 and Aug. 13.

OSC Seeks Oregon Ocean Facts

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Research by an Oregon State college oceanographer is producing new and highly valuable information on the tides, inlets, water temperatures and salinity of Oregon's more than 300 miles of coastal waters. Dr. Wayne V. Burt, project leader, in picture is using device to measure flow of tides. His studies will provide basic information for shellfish growers and other industries located on tidewater. The long-range program will cover all estuaries from Coos Bay to the Columbia. He has received a third \$10,000 grant from the office of naval research for the extensive study.

Portland High School Hoop Leaders Are Upset

PORTLAND — Two of the 10 top high school basketball teams in the state were upset in Portland League play Tuesday, making a three-way tie for first place in that league with two other teams only a half-game behind.
