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Eisenhower Asks \$10 Million More For National Parks

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower's budget for the next fiscal year, announced Wednesday, carries an increase of more than 10 million dollars for national parks.

The boost over the current year is mainly for construction and for management and protection of the parks as visitors increase steadily.

The President's recommendations include about \$4,255,000 for the Pacific Northwest, as follows: Mt. Rainier National Park, \$1,403,700; Olympic National Park, \$1,299,400; Glacier National Park, \$501,600; Crater Lake, Ore., National Park, \$429,200; Crater of the Moons National Monument, Idaho, \$355,000; Ft. Vancouver, Wash., National Monument, \$1,800; Coulee Dam, Wash., national recreation area, \$44,900.

Last year marked the start of "Mission yy," a 10-year program designed to equip and staff the parks to take care of an estimated 80 million visitors in 1966. It is now believed that the figure may reach 100 million.

The Park Service budget calls for \$78,651,000 against \$68,020,000 for the year ending June 30.

For the coming fiscal year, the service recommends \$14,523,000 for management and protection against \$11,250,000 appropriated for the present year; \$20,000,000 for construction as compared to this year's \$15,250,000, \$11,763,000 for maintenance and rehabilitation as compared to \$10,138,000 this year.

Among other activities announced by the PTA is a member ship drive which will end this month. A family fun night is also being planned and is scheduled for the spring term. The date has not been announced.

Parents are acting as hosts to the boys and girls of the school during events called youth activity fun nights. The fun nights are held once each month during the school year.

Telephone Expert To Show Principle Of Solar Battery

Sunlight will be turned into electrical energy next week in Douglas County.

Charles E. Seavey, Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. public relations supervisor, will demonstrate to school and service club groups how the Bell solar battery operates.

Seavey is scheduled for eight appearances during the week of Jan. 20, according to Manager D. E. Lafferty. His schedule is:

The solar battery, first efficient device developed by man for converting sunlight into electrical power, was invented in the Bell Telephone Laboratories.

Seavey will use the battery to power a telephone system. It can also provide energy for small electrical motors, relay systems and portable radios.

Secret of the solar converter is a razor-blade thin disc of silicon (purified sand), which is coated to one ten-thousandth of an inch with boron. The action of light hitting the boron-coated silicon disc is what produces energy.

In a recent experiment the Bell Solar Battery was used to provide power for a rural telephone system in Americus, Ga. The experiment was termed successful by telephone scientists.

Present models of the battery, according to Seavey, equal the power producing efficiency of the best gas or steam engines in operation today.

Seavey has been with the company for 33 years. He was born in Illinois, educated in Oregon and now lives in Portland.

Speaker Rayburn Sees Passage Of Ike's Plan

WASHINGTON — Speaker Rayburn said Wednesday "of course" the House will pass a Middle East resolution with the force of law—the kind of action President Eisenhower has asked.

But the House Democratic chief at a news conference steered away from predicting what changes the House Foreign Affairs Committee might make in the resolution offered by the administration.

He was emphatic however that the House would not take the course suggested by some legislators and adopt a resolution merely expressing the sense of the force of law.

In other developments Wednesday: Sen. Young (R-ND) predicted that Eisenhower's request for specific authority to act in the Middle East "will be greatly modified and approved by an overwhelming vote of Congress."

It was disclosed that Adm. Arthur W. Radford has advised Congress he believes the Eisenhower Middle East resolution would "practically eliminate the chances of war" in that area.

'Great Decisions' Facts Made Available Here

Information concerning a home discussion program on foreign policy issues is available through the Douglas County Extension Agent's Office it was announced today by Helen Chandler, county home extension agent.

The program is carried on mainly through small, informal discussion groups. The groups will meet for eight weeks, starting Jan. 20 and ending March 10. Materials for the study and discussion of eight foreign policy issues will be found in fact sheets provided by an agency called Foreign Policy Assn.

Persons can take advantage of the program, which is called "Great Decisions . . . 37," by using materials for discussion of the issues with neighbors and friends. Individuals and organizations interested in forming discussion groups should contact the County Extension Agent's Office, Miss Chandler said.

21 Counties Had Fewer Deaths On Highways

SALEM — Twenty-one of Oregon's 36 counties had fewer traffic deaths last year than in the preceding year, the state Traffic Safety Commission reported Tuesday.

Thirteen counties had higher death counts. They are Baker, Benton, Grant, Hood River, Jackson, Morrow, Multnomah, Tillamook, Union, Wasco, Washington, Wheeler and Klamath counties.

Two counties, Clackamas and Douglas, had the same number as in 1955. Multnomah County led with 76 deaths, followed by Klamath 31, Lane 27, Douglas 25, Jackson 22, Marion 21, Umatilla 19, Clackamas 18, Washington 17, and Josephine 16.

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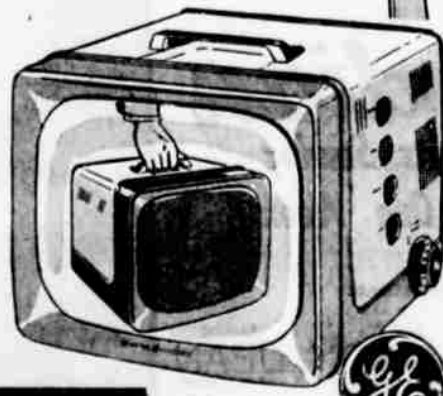
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
