Condition Of 'Tight Money' Explained At Rotary Meet By Official Of Local Bank

One of the most used terms in the current condition of Douglas County economy is "tight money."

Donald A. Reed, assistant manager of the Roseburg branch of the U. S. National Bank, examined the term verbally at a Thursday Rotary Club meeting and listed its causes.

He spoke as part of a four-man panel on the 1957 economic prospects in the county.

He pointed out that "some confusion" exists as to the causes of "tight money," which is loan money at high interest rates.

He explained that "money represents a commodity, and, as such, is subject to the law of supply and demand." He indicated Douglas County was suffering a "slight recession" which is a local situation.

"The country as a whole is booming with greater employment, higher earnings and a great demand for products," he said. He contended these conditions were threatening inflation, which if unchecked, "could lead us to serious trouble."

Two results rest with the Federal Reserve Bank. In order to curb the inflationary tendencies, the bank has (1) required more reserves from member banks, thus reducing the amount of money for loans and (2) restricted its purchases of government issues, which resulted in more competition among borrowers and resultant higher interest rates.

Reed pointed out that it is a boom condition, rather than a recession, which is causing the current tight money. He said plant expansion and improvements in industry boomed to more than 35 billion dollars in 1956. Government was spending at the rate of \$6 billion, and consumer credit was 40 billion.

Thus, he said, demand is greater

than supply. The result is higher interest rates and limited supply. He cited some economists as saying tight money would exist as long as demand for funds exceeds rate of savings.

Another factor listed as a cause of tight money for home construction that lenders can receive a higher "net yield" from large industrial loans than from FHA or GI home loans.

Still another factor cited was that bond holdings must be sold to provide money for some home loans. On the current market, these bonds must be sold at a discount, so lenders are unwilling to sell.

He noted some hope for prospective homeowners, however, in government assistance. "Home ownership is the greatest insurance toward a stable nation and undoubtedly Congress will endeavor to aid the home construction situation," he said.

Former Roseburg Man Dies At Eugene Home

Funeral services were held Thursday in Eugene for Frank L. Weichlein, former Roseburg resident, who died at his Eugene home Jan. 7.

Born in Bloomington, Ill., Sept. 26, 1895, he came to Oregon at an early age with his parents and attended Roseburg schools. He was employed with the Southern Pacific Co. following graduation from high school and in later years served as an engineer working out of Eugene.

He was a member of the Baptist Church and the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. Survivors are his wife, Mildred, and a daughter, Nadine Davis, the latter of San Pedro, Calif., and a brother Will, antioch, Calif.
