

Public Must Decide School Goals, Says UO Educator

The real role of the public is to decide the ends for which our schools are working, asserted Dr. Adolph A. Sandin in developing his topic of "Changing Education in a Changing Society", this week. He addressed a large group of AAUW members and guests in the Roseburg High School library.

Dr. Sandin has an impressive background of experience as a classroom teacher, school administrator and lecturer. He is presently serving on the University of Oregon faculty in the school of education.

In his comprehensive outline of the changes in the theories of education down through the centuries, the speaker traced the trends from the early basic conceptions as practiced in the mother countries to present day conceptions. In early days, he said, education was looked upon as a training for the clergy, to gain knowledge of the Bible or to produce a gentleman.

After all, Dr. Sandin continued, education is learning how to live in current society, and good education should expand individual potentialities. Our schools' curriculum, he said, should include all of the experiences boys and girls have and a training that will enable youth to meet the problems of today.

The world, he declared, is smaller and larger. In calling attention to the ever enlarging place of the United States in world affairs, he stressed the need for adequate civic education for our youth in world citizenship.

In brief reference to his two years as a technical director of our U.S. Federal Education Mission in Lima, Peru, Dr. Sandin said, South America is not as illiterate as we think. He asserted that South America is leading in understanding of the need to conserve its natural resources. However, he continued at least half of the youth there today will likely never enter school. They are greatly handicapped, he continued, by their need of a common language, which they are striving to meet.

In summing up his lecture, Dr. Sandin said that public interest and participation in the school program, together with economic support, were key factors in developing education today.

Mrs. Gerald McCarthy, program chairman, introduced the speaker and included in her remarks the report that Dr. Sandin had expressed a desire to do some steelhead fishing in the North Umpqua.

Market For Oregon Seed Said Weather Dependent

CORVALLIS — While it's anybody's guess what will happen in the seed industry in 1957, certain factors that may affect the market can be seen at this time, reports Ray Teal, Oregon State College seed marketing specialist.

For instance, drought in many parts of the nation kept farmers from using as much cover crop seed last fall as they did the year before. As a result, supplies of vetch and crimson clover seed this fall were well in line with use of these seeds last summer, Teal says.

However, if the drought lets up this coming fall, Teal thinks cover crop seeds will find a ready market. So, unless cover crop seed crops are unusually large next summer, Teal guesses that prices of these seeds should hold around 1956 levels.

In contrast, common ryegrass seed supplies continue to be larger than the market will take at prices growers would like, Teal says, due to larger acreages and higher average yields. However, he reports the potential for increased use of common ryegrass is good in several sections of the nation. And ryegrass growers are now taking steps to form an organization to promote use of their product.

Teal says it's too early to predict effect of the Soil Bank on cover crop seed use. But he thinks the plan won't have as much effect on prices of these seeds as on prices of perennial grass and legume seeds.

Turf seed prices are harder to forecast, Teal says, with the 1957 price pattern probably dependent on factors that can't be seen at this time. Last year, turf seeds felled at the last minute from short crops of creeping red fescue in Canada and Kentucky bluegrass in the Midwest and from larger use of the better turf grasses due to lower prices. Right now, Teal says it looks like the size of turf seed crops in the United States and Canada in 1957 will probably determine turf seed prices this fall.

Earlier the store firm left it up to the court to determine who should get a \$25,000 reward it had offered.

William Clarence Peddicord, a blind chemist, is serving a 20-year sentence in the state prison after conviction for the bombing in an extortion plot.

The banks listed the reward claimants as William D. Browne, James C. Quinn and B. Prescott Hutchins of the Portland police; Stanley N. Smoot and Roland A. Severson, postal inspectors; Jack DeMent, Portland laboratory operator; William D. Rogers, Portland, and Leonora Hooker, Gladstone.

L. E. McClintock of the Commercial Abstract Company in Roseburg spent Wednesday in Eugene on business.

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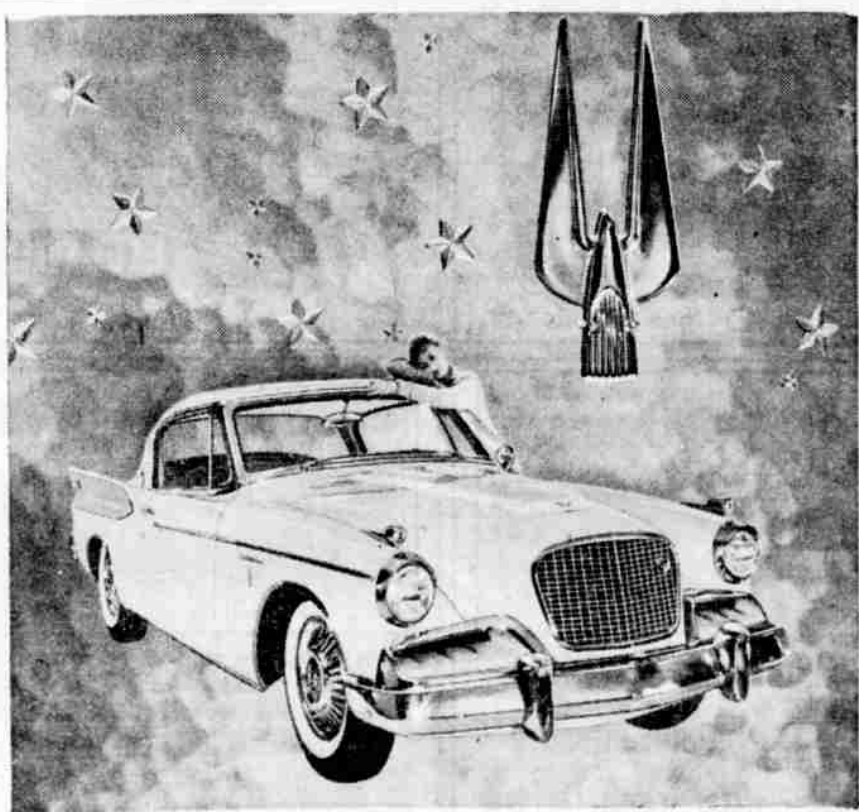
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
