Eight From County To Attend Parley

Eight Douglas County men, headed by an executive delegation, will attend the annual mid-winter session of the Oregon Wildlife Federation in Corvallis Saturday and Sunday.

Presiding over the session will be Bruce L. Yeager, Roseburg, president of the state federation. He will be accompanied by Charles S. Collins, another Roseburg man, who will be present in his capacity as executive vice president of the federation and acting secretary.

Yeager will address the convention with his president's report at 10:45 a.m. Saturday at Withycombe Hall Auditorium on the Oregon State College campus. In the afternoon, Collins will moderate a panel discussion on proposed stream pollution legislation.

The panel will be composed of representatives of the lumber industry and state conservation agencies. Legislation is designed to help reduce excessive siltation and debris contamination in rivers. The proposal was originally submitted by the Umpqua Conservation Council.

F. Ross Brown, director of the National Wildlife Federation will report briefly on national affairs during the afternoon. Election of officers will be held as one of the concluding features.

Other local men attending will be John P. Amacher, Pete Serafin, William Stein, Merle Winn, Ross L. Myers and Charles V. Stanton.

Myers is chairman of the forest and mining committee. Collins is chairman of the recreation and parks committee and Amacher is a member of the OWF-IWLA liaison committee.

Braves Looking For Infielder

MILWAUKEE — The Milwaukee Braves are in the market for a second baseman who can hit 270 or better. If they find him, they might become favorites in the National League race.

Braves General Manager John Quinn discussed the 1957 campaign and Milwaukee trouble spots last night in a talk at the Press Club.

As for the race, Quinn said he saw it as a contest between the Braves, Brooklyn, Cincinnati and possibly St. Louis.

Second base and left field, where Danny O'Connell and Bobby Thomson labored last year, are the trouble spots. If able to run out either one, or both of the weak positions, the Braves probably could take the field in April a jump ahead of the competition.

Quinn said, "If O'Connell could add 20 points to his batting average I think nothing more could be desired." The second baseman hit .29 in 1956.

"Don't be surprised if you see some new names on our club this year," Quinn said, and then added that he didn't mean they would have to be players with established reputations. They could come from the farm system.

Mentioned as possible future Milwaukee second sackers are Gene Baker of the Cubs and Red Schoendienst of the New York Giants.

ST. LOUIS — Alvin Dark, veteran shortstop of the St. Louis Cardinals may have turned 34 but he is still a hot topic in the baseball trade markets.

"I received three offers for him a month ago," general manager Frank Lane told the Downtown Kiwanis Club Thursday.

Lane said the offer came from the New York Giants—the club St. Louis got Dark from last year in a four for four trade including Red Schoendienst—the Philadelphia Phils and Cincinnati Redlegs.

But Lane said at the present Dark is "not on the market."

Canucks Voice Protest On U. S. Football Raids

WINNIPEG — At least two clubs were reported unhappy with the relationship between Canadian and U.S. pro football Friday as the Canadian Football Council gathered for a closed session.

British Columbia Lions, maintaining that while "our teams are forbidden to raid American pros, the National Football League lets its teams raid American talent playing or signed in Canada," were reported in favor of repealing the no-raiding pact.

Montreal officials were disturbed over the signing of tackle Don Owens of Southern Mississippi by the Pittsburgh Steelers after he had first agreed to play for

Alouettes in 1957.

The relations of the Big Four and Western Leagues with the NFL were on the agenda for the session which was called to prepare material for discussion at later separate meetings of the two leagues.

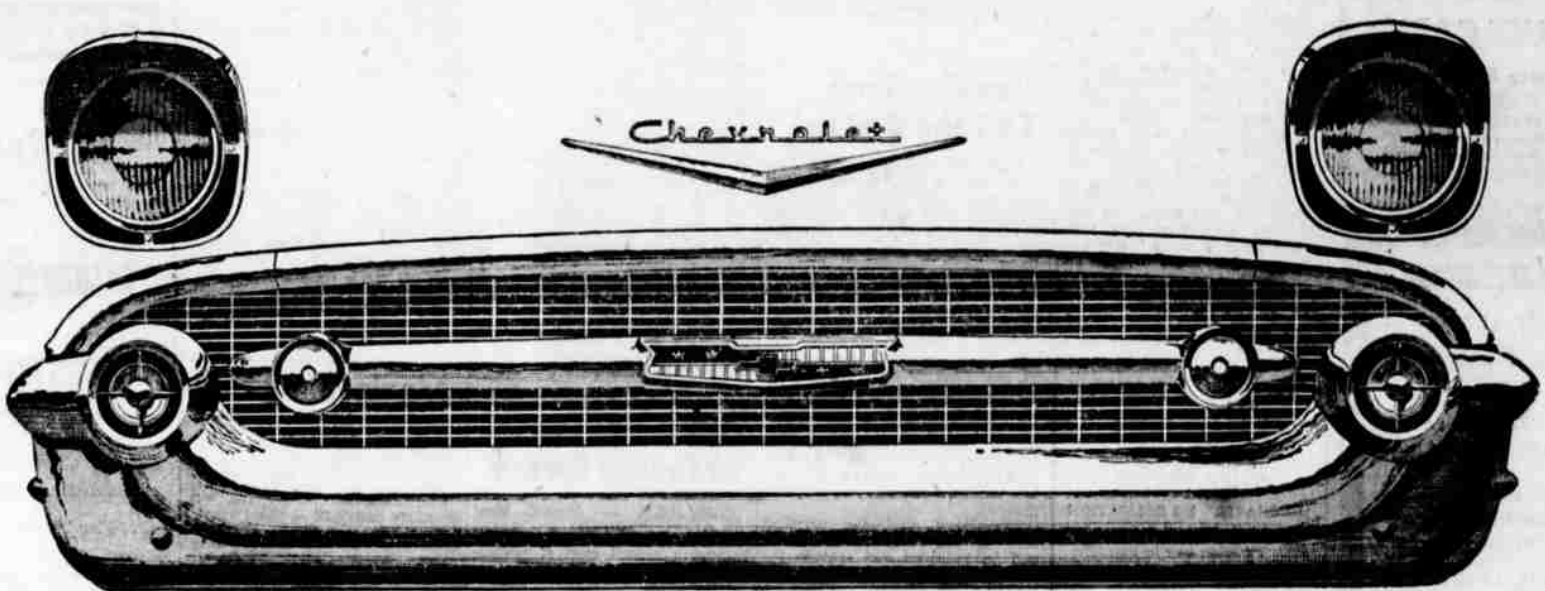
