Two games played in Umpqua Valley League basketball action Friday night had the Myrtle Creek Vikings of Coach Bob Abrahamson downing the Glendale Pirates 70-36, and the Glide Wildcats posting a narrow 35-31 win over the Sutherland Bulldogs.

The win for Myrtle Creek was their third straight since commencing league play and leaves them at the top of the UVL ladder. Glendale is fourth with a 4-2 record, Glide with 5-2 is third and Douglas, who was idle Friday, is in the runnerup position with a 5-1 record.

Vikings 70, Pirates 36

Hitting at a .455 average from the field, the Myrtle Creek Vikings broke a 4-4 deadlock and raced to their third straight Umpqua Valley League basketball win over the Glendale Pirates Friday night at Glendale.

With center John Losey and guard John Bardwell peppering the basket from all angles and scoring six points each, the Vikings drove to a 20-10 first quarter margin.

The Myrtle Creek hoopers continued the blistering attack in the second period canning 16 additional counters. In the meantime, the Bob Stoltz-coached Pirate offense hit a snag and could get but a single two points, a field goal by Bill Hale, making the halftime score read, 36-12, in favor of the Vikings.

Warriors Grab 10th Straight From Creswell

The Drain Warrior basketball team journeyed to Creswell Friday night for a non-league hoop mix and came home with its 10th consecutive victory of the season, 45-38.

With center Virg Merrill hitting 20 markers and controlling both backboards, the Warriors of Coach Ray Stratton built up a 12-8 margin at the first period rest and made it 26-16 at halftime. Merrill was the big scorer during the drive, jamming 10 points through the bucket.

During the opening minutes of the fourth quarter, Drain took its largest margin of the night at 42-26. Coach Stratton then inserted reserves and they finished out the game, with first stringers appearing only on occasion.

Center Don Burris of Creswell caught fire in the last stanza and staged a one-man scoring spree, hitting 10 of his 14 final markers, but it couldn't offset the lead built up by Drain during the first three cantos.

Merrill's 20 counters was tops for the contest and brings his 11-game total to read at 273 for an even 25 points average per game. The 6-3 pivotman's fine backboard work was outstanding during his tenure of play.

Burris tallied 14 markers to lead the losing cause. Junior varsity action had Coach Frank Doyle's baby Warriors five rings up on a thrilling 38-31 victory during overtime. Dick Blomberg and Jerry Watson hit 10 markers each to pace the winning attack.

Low Water Retards Fish Movement In North Umpqua

Low water temperatures through the first half of January retarded fish movement over the counting board at Winchester Dam, according to William E. Pitney, biologist for the State Game Commission here.

He said fish migrations up the North Umpqua River "undoubtedly" would increase in the event of higher temperatures and greater stream flows.

A late migration of silver salmon is on record through the first of the month. Twenty-seven fish passed over the counting board during the period, only the second time that a migration has been observed since the count of the species started in 1948. The other time was in 1956, when only one fish was counted in the first part of January.

The winter steelhead run continued during the period, with the 320 fish counted bringing the total for the migration to 2,988, third best on record.

In a nip-and-tuck basketball battle which saw the lead changing hands on several occasions, the Glide Wildcats finally emerged the winner 35-31, during an Umpqua Valley League contest played Friday night at Sutherland.

The win was the fifth in hoop action for Glide after two setbacks. Sutherland has one win and two losses.

The two teams waged a defensive battle from the opening buzzer with only one player hitting for double figures. That was Jerry Gwyn, forward for Sutherland, with 11.

Playing a deliberate brand of ball, Glide moved out front 10-6 at the end of the first frame. Neither team forced the issue during second period action and the half came to a halt with Glide still holding its four-point lead, 18-14.

With Glide tallying eight and Sutherland countering with nine, the third stanza scoreboard reading was 26-23.

This was soon erased, however, as three quick field goals by Sutherland cagers gave them their first lead of the night at 27-26, but the offensive forces of Glide rallied and drove to a five-point spread with less than two minutes remaining.

Varsity matches ended with Coach Walt Payne's Indian grapplers taking five bouts, including two pins three decisions along with two thrilling draws.

Eugene matmen copped two wins via the pin route, three on decisions, besides the two before mentioned draws.

Roseburg took an early lead in the lighter weights taking three wins and a draw in the first four bouts.

Eugene won the next bout, but Roseburg came back to take the one following. Axemen matmen then added two more wins followed by Russ Pinard's decision over Fred Edwards of the home crew.

Roseburg's 157 and 178-pounders went down to defeat and then Mike Vasey of the Indians and Joe Blakeley battled the full time limit for a 1-1 draw in the heavyweight and final match of the session. A win by either grappler during this bout would have provided victory for his respective club.
