"Excellent fire record" in the state in recent years.

Hagenstein devoted a major part of his speech to laud the trends toward greater utilization of timber.

He claimed that increased utilization of formerly unusable parts of trees had increased Western Oregon's store of timber by 60 billion feet in the last 10 years.

He also dramatized the amount of water material. He estimated the amount of waste from Lane County south in western Oregon would supply enough pulp and hardboard material for a mill of 1,400 tons daily capacity.

He painted a rosy picture of the future of the industry. He said he didn't think the current soft market in lumber would last long.

He did, however, conclude by citing what he considers a pitfall to the industry.

Master of Ceremonies Jim Whipple described Hagenstein as "the man who knows more about the forestry industry in the Northwest than anyone else."

Morse To Press Three Sisters Wilderness Plan

WASHINGTON — Sen. Morse (D-Ore) will carry into Congress the fight for the Three Sisters wilderness area of Oregon if the Department of Agriculture attempts to cut the size of the area.

Morse announced that Friday he said he had received a letter from E. L. Peterson, assistant secretary of Agriculture, in which Peterson said he would oppose further hearings on the matter "because we have at hand the facts necessary to make a carefully considered decision."

Morse said in reply that Peterson's letter indicated the decision would "alter the status of the substantial area west of Horse Creek."

"If this implication is borne out by your announcement, those of us who oppose such action have to do what we can in Congress to counteract such a decision in order to protect the Three Sisters wilderness area and to achieve a sound and predictable program for these areas throughout the country," Morse said.

Last month Morse asked Peterson to make no decision on the boundary matter for a year, so that discussions could be carried on with interested parties, including conservationists who oppose the reduction.

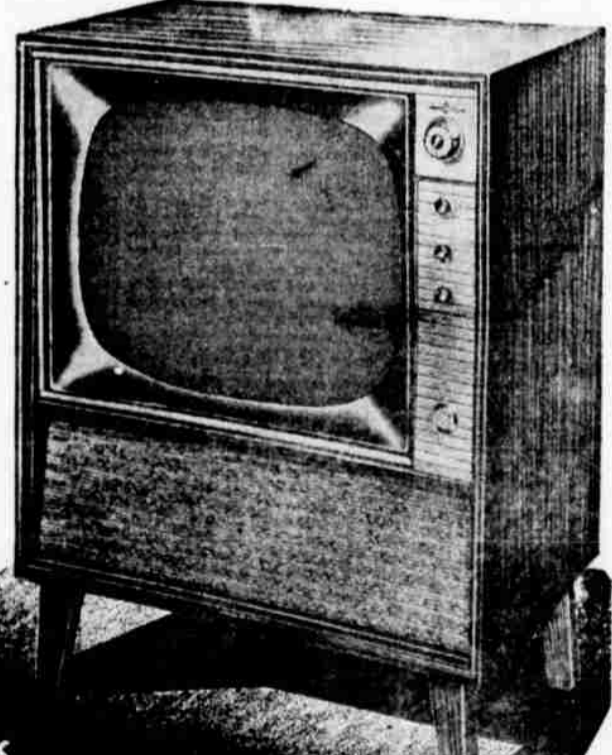
