Forwards Lloyd Yandell and Bob Burns sparked the opening quarter drive by the Braves with eight and six points respectively. The opening minute of the second canio had them increasing their margin further, 21-5, but the combined Pirate forces of Roger Johnson and Hardy Spurgeon narrowed the gap to 25-15 at halftime.

Reedsport maintained this margin throughout most of the third frame and then the Pirates began to connect, closing the lead slowly. With Johnson leading the way with 11 counters, Marshfield pulled into a 43-43 tie with the clock still showing six minutes left in the final stanza.

Yandell then put the Braves out front with a field goal followed by two foul shots by Jerry Friese.

Friese cnaled two additional field goals on "cripples" alone with three foul shots by Yandell accounting for the final point spread.

It was the eighth win for Reedsport against five losses. The Pirates are five and five for the year.
