Mayor To Stay In Pokey While Announcer Solicits Polio Aid In Marathon

Mayor Arlo Jacklin was put in jail and KRNR's Johnny Huddleston was put in a store window at noon today as a stunt designed to benefit the March of Dimes began in Roseburg.

Huddleston has vowed that he will stay on the air for 48 hours, maybe 72, and Jacklin promised he'll stay in jail until Huddleston calls it quits.

RHS Will Sponsor Polio Campaign, Students Decide

Roseburg High School students start their week-long polio drive Wednesday. Theme of the drive is "Let's Finish the Fight Right."

Last year, Roseburg High led the nation's high schools in polio fund contributions by raising over \$10,000.

There was some doubt this year to whether the school would conduct a polio drive. Some students felt that this year's drive should be conducted to raise funds for the Teenage Youth Center.

Members of the school's student council heard Del McKay, announcer for radio station KRXL and founder of the Roseburg High polio drive, tell of the need for the polio drive at the high school. Mrs. Charles Brown, advisor of the youth center, told the council members at a meeting Tuesday about the needs of the center.

The question of a drive was put to a vote of the entire student body for a second time. There were 738 student votes for a polio drive and 363 for the drive supporting the Teenage Youth Center.

He continued:

"The designs of that power (international communism) though dark in purpose, are clear in practice. It strives to seal forever the fate of those it has enslaved. It strives to break the ties that unite the free. And it strives to capture — to exploit for its own great power — all forces of change in the world."

Having identified international communism (headed by Russia) as the dragon that must be slain before mankind can live in peace and freedom, he added, his jaw jutting as he uttered the words:

Trial Jury Views Scene Of Crime

A jury of eight women and four men was finally empaneled at 10:45 a.m. today in the trial of Forrest L. Winn, 66, Roseburg, accused of second-degree murder in the death of Eugene Donald Wood, 72, Roseburg.

The jury immediately was instructed by Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich to inspect premises of the Monarch Cigar Store, 808 SE Cass Ave., where the incident took place.

The judge's instruction came on the motion of Dept. Dist. Atty. Don H. Sanders, prosecuting for the state. Sanders and Harrison Winston, Winn's counsel, had yet to make their opening statements late in the morning.

Members of the jury are: Mary Bilger, Effie L. Nickens, Edith E. Kamp, Ruby J. Havens, Lydia M. Hindsdale, Doris Voorries and Phil W. Sutton, all of Roseburg; Edna McDonald, Myrtle Creek; Helen J. Beorli, Glendale; Frank Kausche, Oakland; Chester Davis, Sutherlin; and R. E. Minch, Camas Valley.

Monday's questioning of prospective jurors by defense and prosecution attorneys saw 15 prospects excused by Judge Woodrich, who is conducting the trial.

Fourteen of those excused from duty were excused on preliminary challenges while one juror was dismissed for cause, at the request of the two sides. Of the 12 jury seats to be filled, one of them had seven changes Monday.

Throughout the conduct of the jury selection, the defendant sat by his attorney, Winston with apparent calm. Sanders handled the questioning for the state.

Winn was indicted by a grand jury in November. He was accused of murdering Eugene Donald Wood, 72, Roseburg, by kicking and beating him to death in a local card room on Nov. 10, 1956.

Wood died a few days after the alleged fight occurred.

Supplied with pills to keep awake, Huddleston will continue his broadcast from a window in the J. C. Penney Co. on Jackson Street.

"I'll have to be carried off," Huddleston said. He spent most of Monday in the hay preparing for the marathon broadcast.

The broadcast will be interrupted only for station breaks, spots of news and bids from the public on merchandise, ranging in value up to an automobile, which will be auctioned off by the station.

Huddleston will receive the bids on a special telephone rigged in the store window. The number to call on the wares which will be sold is OR 2-4050.

Anyone outside the display window will be able to talk with the sleepless announcer, he said. They can make their March of Dimes contributions there.

Huddleston is in condition for the ordeal. A local physician examined him Monday and declared him healthy. No one said whether "hizzoner" received a similar exam.

Huddleston is the head "kat" on a nightly disc jockey program on KRNR, "Kats Korner."

All regular KRNR programs were cancelled for the stunt.

Two Winston Burglaries Net Estimated \$86 Cash

Two burglaries in Winston were reported to Police Chief Ben Scheele, and an estimated \$86 in cash was stolen.

The first break-in was reported by Mrs. Al Hooten, Rose Avenue. Mrs. Hooten told the chief that someone had broken into her house between 5:30 and 6:45 p.m. Sunday while she visited neighbors and had taken \$88 in cash. She told Chief Scheele that lights were on in the house.

Later, at 11:15 p.m., Chief Scheele said, the Art Griese home was entered and a purse of Mrs. Griese containing \$18 was stolen.

The Griese told him, Scheele added, that they were sitting in the living room and the lights were on. Mrs. Griese heard a noise, the chief stated, but thought it was the chief's children coming home. Chief Scheele quoted Griese as saying the door through which the thief entered was left open.

Mad Bomber Of New York Is Captured

WATERBURY, Conn. — A clean-cut looking man in a blue suit told calmly Tuesday of 25 years of suffering and of hatred boiling up inside him. Then he confessed he is New York's "mad bomber."

George Metesky, 53, stocky and grey-haired, said he made a vow a long time ago to go on planting bombs in New York until he either was caught or died.

"This is the man," said New York Deputy Police Commissioner Walter Arm. "We know him by his admissions. Secondly, we know him by a check of his handwriting."

Charged with being a fugitive, Metesky waived extradition in a special City Court session at 9:30 a.m. New York police said he would be held here, under \$100,000 bond, until warrants arrived from New York Tuesday afternoon.

Arm said Metesky signed a written statement saying he is the man who, because he felt he got a raw deal from the company he once worked for, planted at least 32 bombs in public places in New York city since 1941.

Several of the bombs exploded. The toll: 15 persons injured, none critically.

Arm quoted him as saying he never meant to kill anyone. The commissioner added that Metesky said he planted bombs in New York "whenever he felt like it."

In his gold-rimmed eyeglasses, Metesky could well have passed for a school teacher as he went over each bombing one by one in all night questioning. He was awakened from his bed shortly after midnight and taken in.

Arm said Metesky held a years-long grudge against the Consolidated Edison Co. of New York.

Metesky said he contracted pulmonary tuberculosis after he was gassed while working at the firm's Hell Gate plant in New York in 1931, according to Arm. He claimed the company refused to take care of him and that was the reason he planted the home-made bombs, Arm said.

Strike Hits American Motors Corp. Plant

KENOSHA, Wis. — A strike hit the American Motors Corp. Tuesday after overnight negotiating talks broke down with no progress reported.

Pickets appeared at the AMC's assembly plant at 3:30 a.m. (PST) and an hour later were advised the strike had begun.

The dispute, over layoff provisions, involves about 5,000 workers. But a company spokesman said a strike at Kenosha would force an immediate suspension of operations at the Milwaukee plant where 2,500 workers produce Rambler, Nash and Hudson bodies for assembly here.

Workers in the Milwaukee plant were not involved in the grievance dispute.

It's Return To Business For President Following Day-Long Inauguration

WASHINGTON — It's back to business as usual today for President Eisenhower after a brilliant inaugural celebration, crowned by appearance at four gay, diamond-studded galas honoring the start of his second term.

They kept him on the go until nearly 1 a.m. — and he seemed to enjoy every minute.

With his lady on his arm, he left the White House soon after 10 o'clock, started at the Washington Armory and showed up at three hotels in the next 24 hours.

Dance orchestras played, colors were trooped, thousands of people promenaded past the presidential boxes, and celebrated singers gave their all with everything from the National Anthem to "The Blue Danube" and "Mr. Wonderful."

The President was a picture of perpetual motion.

He bowed, waved, smiled, bobbed up and down from the chairs, gave one and two-handed salutes to acquaintances, and fell into at least one deep conversation.

Green Sanitary Dist. Agrees To Compromise Offer

The Green Sanitary District Board adopted a compromise offer to the Roseburg School District Monday night in financing debt service on the proposed bond issue for sewer construction. The board adopted a resolution settling the sewer service charge at \$4 per month to effect a lower millage rate against property owners.

Board member William House made the motion to adopt the resolution following a discussion by board members of the remonstrances received from two large industrial property holders in the district, United States Plywood Corp. and Umpqua Plywood Corp., which contain 43 per cent of the assessed valuation and the possibility of court delays that might result from their opposition.

The plan as adopted would lower the millage rate to retire the bonds from 14.3 down to 10.8.

Board Chairman Warren Engdahl earlier reported to the board that the district's application was now under study by federal agencies and he had received a letter to that effect.

A tentative date of Feb. 26 for a bond issue election received support from members of the board. The meeting was recessed until next Monday so that the proper legal forms of an ordinance could be prepared by the board's attorney, Edward M. Murphy, and submitted for action by the council. The issue will total \$355,000.

The board re-elected Warren Engdahl chairman for the coming year and reappointed Mrs. Orpha A. Rutan, 4445 SW Carnes Rd., as secretary.

Teacher Pay Differential Discussed By School Board As Committee Offers Plan

A four-hour discussion on proposed differentials between high-paid teachers and low-bracket administrators in the Roseburg School District ended Monday night with the school board ordering possible adjustments in the plan.

The differentials were contained in a proposed new salary schedule for all certified — teaching and administrative — personnel in the district. The schedule was suggested by the Economic Welfare Committee of the Roseburg Education Assn.

It would raise administrators' salaries over those paid teachers by allowing payment for time worked past 190 days a year, then applying a percentage to the total of the base salary for the administrator added to the overage.

But with school directors Dudley Walton and Darley Ware arguing against some features of the plan, the board handed the schedule over to Supt. M. C. Deller and high school Vice Principal Kenneth Simon for possible revision.

Walton argued that a salary should fit a specific job and a man found to fill the job, rather than having the salary for the job built up through annual increments.

He suggested that a pegged salary for each administrative job in the district be set.

The positions of school superintendent, assistant superintendent and high school principal won't be figured in the revisions.

Deller and Simon, the latter a member of the group that proposed the new schedule, will consider Walton's suggestion in coming up with any revisions.

Chairman Harold Hoyt said that administrative "minimums" probably can be figured. In that event, a guaranteed salary would be set for an administrative job. If the person in the job qualified later for increment raises through reaching a high level of experience

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Philippine Educator Will Speak In Roseburg

A Philippine education supervisor will speak in Roseburg Feb. 2 at a regional meeting of the Oregon Vocational Assn., according to Richard Boss, director of adult education in the Roseburg School District.

Casimiro E. Maningas is supervisor of trades and industrial teacher education in the Bureau of Public Schools, Manila.

The meeting was announced at a monthly gathering of Douglas County industrial arts teachers at Myrtle Creek High School last week-end.

The group followed a tour through Hanna Nickel Smelting Co. at Riddle with a dinner meeting at Myrtle Creek. Myrtle L. Barkhurst, principal of Myrtle Creek High School, was a guest.

Next meeting of the group will be Feb. 15 at Drain High School.

Search Yields 18-Year-Old At Tri-City

Officer's Car Stolen At Gunpoint Monday: Intensive Manhunt Held

An intense 12-hour search for a teen-age youth who pulled a gun on a state policeman and stole his patrol car ended at 11:35 p.m. Monday with the capture of the youth in the Tri-City school.

The capture was effected by officers Warren Demytt and William McCullum of the state police. Demytt was the officer whose car was taken earlier in the day.

The youth was identified as Harvey Lee Eubanks, 18, Bragg City, Mo. State police said he was wanted for a preliminary hearing when he was arraigned in district court on charges of burglary, not in a dwelling and assault and robbery while armed with a dangerous weapon. Judge Warren A. Woodruff set bail at \$7,500 on the robbery charge and \$2,500 on the burglary count.

State police Sgt. F. A. Holley said the youth was armed when apprehended but made no resistance.

8 Persons Killed When Unseasonal Tornado Strikes

GANS, Okla. — Eight persons were killed Tuesday when an out-of-season tornado smashed this tiny farm community near the Arkansas border before dawn.

Two families were hardest hit, one counting four dead and the other three.

At least a dozen other persons were injured.

Two other twisters struck in eastern Oklahoma, destroying some property but there were no casualties.

The National Guard, Highway Patrol and county officers rushed to Gans, which has a population of about 600.

Six houses were demolished including those of the victims who were still sleeping when the twister swooped down through heavy-laden clouds.

A tornado forecast had been issued for the area by the Weather Bureau as a cold front from the northwest swept into Oklahoma. Monday record highs in the 70s for this time of year were reported.

The two other tornadoes were at Warner and Wewoka.

The dead, all from Gans or the immediate area:

Joe Johnson, 60; C. J. Johnson, 14, his son; Mikeey Johnson, 15, another son; Jimmy Jenkins, 34; Ted Jenkins, 47; Norma Jenkins, 47, his wife; Bonnie Jenkins, 14, their daughter; and Darrel Jenkins, 7, their son.

Among the injured brought to hospitals at Ft. Smith, Ark., about 15 miles away, were Mrs. Leora Steek, wife of the dead man, and Lena Mae Meek, 8, and Loreta Meek, 2, believed to be their children.

The tornado hit as cloudbursts soaked the eastern area of the state as much as 3 1/2 inches of rain.

Roads into the town were blocked to keep unauthorized persons from the stricken area.

Airline Settles Case Of Racial Discrimination

NEW YORK — Pan American World Airways says it has made out-of-court settlements of four damage suits alleging racial discrimination brought by Negro singer Ella Fitzgerald and three of her staff members.

The suits, filed two years ago in U.S. District Court, asked damages totaling \$270,000. Observers said settlement was made for \$7,000.

Nine More Persons Die From Shell Explosion

TAIPEI — Nine more persons have died of injuries from a shell explosion at an artillery range Sunday in central Formosa. Twenty-seven persons were killed outright. Most of the dead were civilians collecting shell fragments to sell as scrap metal after a firing practice.
