Stanford Spokesman Hits State Proposal

SAN FRANCISCO — Any bill that would give the state control of collegiate athletics "should be sent to Russia," Stanford University's athletic director said Monday night.

At Masters spoke out to newsmen after assemblyman Charles H. Wilson (D-Los Angeles) proposed a five-man state commission with "complete jurisdiction" over athletic programs of every California college and university receiving "direct or indirect support from the state."

Wilson made his proposal in a bill presented to the Legislature. Masters commented:

"The Legislature has more sense than to pass a crazy bill like that."

"If such a bill were approved it would mean the end of intercollegiate athletics."

University of California athletic spokesmen, Paul Hastings and Greg Engelhard, were also opposed to the proposal. Hastings is executive director of the Associated Students of UC and Engelhard is athletic director.

Washington Hires New Grid Coach

SEATTLE — Jim Owens, 30-year-old assistant at Texas A&M, will arrive here in about a week to take over his new duties as head football coach at the University of Washington.

Owens' appointment to the post as successor to Darrell Royal was announced last night by George Briggs, athletic director at Washington. Royal, who attended Oklahoma University with Owens, left Washington last month after one season to become head coach at Texas.

Briggs declined to disclose salary terms or length of contract, but in Texas Owens said his contract is for 3 years.

The Washington post is the first Owens has had as top football man at a major institution. After graduation from Oklahoma in 1950 he played for the professional Baltimore Colts. From 1951 through 1953 he was assistant to Paul (Bear) Bryant at Kentucky and in 1954 moved with Bryant to Texas A&M.

Owens has been given a free hand in selection of his assistants. He will name the five Tuesday. Some of them, he said, will be from Texas A&M and some would come from colleges outside Texas.

The new coach is a devotee of the "spread" offensive used by Royal.

Eugene Axemen Still Lead Poll; Roseburg Indians Ranked Eighth

Eugene, the No. 1 Oregon high school basketball team in the opening poll of sportswriters and sportscasters last week, retained its position Tuesday in the second Associated Press poll, but only barely.

In the second balloting, eleven first place votes were cast for Eugene, which had a total of 168 points. Klamath Falls, which got six first place votes, had strong secondary support and was only four points behind with 164. Klamath Falls was No. 2 last week, too.

Axemen, Pels Win
Eugene played only one game last week, defeating Corvallis 63-54. Klamath Falls posted 33-41 and 37-40 victories over Ashland.

Benson, despite a 33-50 loss to Lincoln in a Portland League game, retained third place, aided by a 78-55 victory over Franklin in another game.

Central Catholic and Medford ranked No. 4 and No. 5 in that order this week, the same positions they held in last week's poll. Central Catholic lost 39-38 to Astoria last weekend while Medford was idle.

Lincoln made its first appearance in the top ten, earning a tie for sixth place Jefferson, also of Portland, Lincoln beat Benson and Roosevelt in Portland League games while Jefferson lost to Washington.

Roseburg advanced one step from ninth last week to eighth this week. Pendleton dropped back from seventh to ninth and Astoria and South Salem tied for tenth. Hermiston, tied for ninth in the first poll, and Marshfield, eighth last week, dropped out of the top ten into the also-ran division.

SALEM — Bill Brenner, veteran minor league manager, agreed Wednesday night to become general manager of the Salem Senators of the Northwest Baseball League.
