Former Army Transport Scheduled For Scrapping

PORTLAND, (AP) — The former Army transport Chateau Thierry, which has been in a mothball fleet at Olympia, Wash., Tuesday was towed here to be scrapped.
 The ship will be scrapped by Zidell Exploration, Inc., which bought the transport for \$308,678 from the federal government.
 Scrapping operations also are due to start this week at the Zidell yard on the World War II hospital ship Louis A. Milne, which has been with the Astoria reserve fleet for 10 years.

Hull Of Navy Seaplane Damaged On Reservoir

EUGENE, (AP) — The hull of a Navy seaplane was damaged Monday when it attempted to take off from Fernridge Reservoir near here. There were no injuries.
 The plane was forced to land in the reservoir Sunday when it ran into icing conditions on a flight from the Whidbey Island Naval Air Station in Washington to the Alameda, Calif., Naval Air Station.
 A repair crew was sent from Whidbey Island.

Jewish Victims Of Nazis Press Damage Claims

NEW YORK, (AP) — A conference of Jewish leaders has asked West Germany to speed settlement of a million damage claims by victims of the Nazi regime.
 The call was voiced this week by the Conference on Jewish Material Claims Against Germany, representing 22 major Jewish organizations throughout the free world.
 The conference estimated that only 350,000 individual claims have been settled since West German law went into effect Oct. 1, 1953.
 No estimate was available on how much had been paid out in claims settlement thus far. Some observers estimate that 1 billion dollars will have been paid by the time the law expires in 1963.
 In urging the speedup of claims settlements, the conference appealed to West Germany to enlarge the staffs of indemnification offices to expedite settlement. Other procedural changes were suggested to facilitate the handling of claims.

Lumber Market Hurt By Slump In Housing

EUGENE, (AP) — Rising freight costs, bad weather in consuming areas and the prospect of a curtailed housing market contributed last week to a three-year low in demand for many lumber items, the weekly lumber market news letter, Random Lengths, said this week.
 The news letter said most green mills remain idle or on curtailed production but demand continues to fall short of output.
 Stud prices dropped last week after a mild post-holiday boom, the letter said, while the pine market held to its "normal slow January pace."
 Better weather in major consumer areas could increase the demand, the letter said, with a trend toward higher prices and market firmness if the mills could not keep pace with volume.

BLM Timber Offering To Be Increased In '57

PORTLAND, (AP) — The Bureau of Land Management's Salem district will offer 158 million board feet of timber for sale this year, district forester Otto Kruger said here.
 The figure represents a boost of 25 million board feet over 1956 sales on O&C and public domain lands in 12 northwest Oregon counties in an area running from Junction City to the Columbia River and the Cascades to the Pacific Ocean.
 Nearly a third of the sales will be salvage timber on 71 tracts, ranging in size from 250,000 to 10 million board feet.
