## Olympics May Have Cost Australia Money

MELBOURNE, Australia — The 1956 Olympic Games were run at a loss — and quite a big one.

As the games ended last month, officials believed there would be a small profit but in the past six weeks many bills have come in — and every one is higher than anybody figured.

The full amount of the loss cannot be assessed yet but the Melbourne Argus said Wednesday it might be close to a maximum of \$450,000 underwritten by the Victorian government.

The total figure will not be known until all debts are settled and assets, such as sporting equipment at the Olympic Village, sold.

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## Sen. Neuberger Would Repeal Two-Term Law

WASHINGTON — Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) told the Senate Tuesday this nation should repeal the constitutional amendment that limits presidents to two terms.

At the same time Neuberger proposed midterm election of a new president if one dies in office before he has served two years or half his four-year term.

At present, the vice president succeeds to the top office for the remainder of the four years.

Neuberger introduced a proposed constitutional amendment to repeal the existing two-term limitation, and set up the midterm presidential election in case of a vacancy.

"The American people are mature and capable of sound judgment," Neuberger said. "They should be free to elect any citizen they favor for president, for as long as they want his services in the White House."

Neuberger said the anti-third term amendment was conceived "primarily by political opponents of President Franklin D. Roosevelt."

## Canadian Court Rules Against Player Raid

PHILADELPHIA — Commissioner Bert Bell of the National Football League today described a Canadian court decision upholding a Detroit player contract as a "precedent setting" and said it means an end to player raids across the border.

The Ontario Court of Appeals in Toronto yesterday ruled in favor of Detroit, which had brought a breach-of-contract action against quarterback Tom Dubinski.

The Lions were awarded \$6,950 in damages.

Dubinski, and understudy to Detroit's Bobby Layne in the 1954 season, joined the Toronto Argonauts of the Big Four Football Union in 1953.

The Lions claimed his contract, which ran until May 1, 1955, carried an option clause which the club said it exercised in March, 1955.

## San Francisco 49'ers Sign Third Quarterback

SAN FRANCISCO — San Francisco's 49'ers have joined the growing trend in the tough National Football League of carrying three quarterbacks. That's a position where injuries can prove disastrous.

They signed the veteran Y. A. Tittle Wednesday for his seventh pro season here.

Coach Frank Albert stated flatly that he expects to keep Tittle, Earl Morrill, a former All-American from Michigan State, and John Brodie, the 49'ers' No. 1 draft choice from Stanford, on the squad all season.

## Negro High School Teams To Compete

LEXINGTON, Ky. — Negro high schools will compete in the tournament trail leading to the state high school basketball championship this year for the first time in the history of Kentucky.

Seven Negro schools which hold membership in the Kentucky High School Athletic Assn. have notified commissioner Ted Sanford they qualify to enter district tournaments which open next month.

## University Of Oregon Abandons Swimming

EUGENE, Ore. — Swimming has been abandoned as an inter-collegiate sport at the University of Oregon, Leo Harris, athletic director, announced Tuesday.

Harris said only five candidates had reported to coach John Borchardt.

Oregon will resume the sport whenever there is adequate manpower to field a team, Harris added.

## High Court Rules T-H Act Doesn't Bar All Strikes During Life Of Contract

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court ruled unanimously Tuesday the Taft-Hartley Act does not bar all strikes during the life of a contract.

The decision—widely awaited by unions and management—upheld an unfair labor practice finding by the National Labor Relations Board against the Lion Oil Co.

The board's finding grew out of a strike of Lion workers at El Dorado, Ark., in 1952 before a labor-management contract expired.

The Supreme Court's ruling reversed a decision by the U. S. Circuit Court in St. Louis. That court had held the act flatly bans strikes to obtain modifications of a contract until the contract has terminated either by its terms, or by action of the parties to it.

The contract at issue had provided for negotiation at an intermediate date during its life.

The high court's opinion, by CIO Oil Workers Union did not call a strike until after complying with the 60-day "cooling off" period provided by the Taft-Hartley law.

Warren said the "dual purpose" in the Taft-Hartley Act—to substitute collective bargaining for economic warfare and to protect the right of employees to engage in concerted activities for their own benefit—had been recognized by the high tribunal in an earlier decision.

Warren said the court had been told by the Justice Department the question was of major importance to hundreds of collective bargaining agreements throughout the country. The department noted that there has been a "decided trend among unions and employers to execute contracts of longer duration than formerly and to include provisions for reopening to negotiate changes during the contract term."

The decision was the only one of importance handed down during Tuesday's delayed opinion session, postponed from Monday because of the inauguration ceremonies.
