

Polish Elections Back Communists

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Communist Party newspaper Pravda said Tuesday the Polish elections resulted in victory for all 459 top-listed candidates of the pro-Communist National Unity Front. It declared the voting was carried out in an "atmosphere of political maturity."

In a special report from Warsaw, Pravda added that all attempts by "reactionary forces" to create disturbances during the voting was carried out in an "atmosphere of political maturity."

The Sunday parliamentary balloting in Poland stoutly endorsed the policy of "independent communism" led by party chief Wladyslaw Gomulka. Complete returns are scheduled to be announced Wednesday.

Jazz-Pianist Offers Alibi In Murder Case

VENICE, Italy (AP)—Giampiero Piccioni testified here that he could not have been involved in the death of Wilma Montesi because he was holidaying 140 miles away. He named Italian movie actress Alida Valli among those who could alibi him.

Piccioni, 36-year-old jazz-pianist son of a former Italian foreign minister, told the three-judge court he, Miss Valli and others were at the seaside resort of Amalfi below Naples, "before and after the reported crime was supposed to have taken place" near Rome.

Piccioni is one of the three principal defendants in the case which has rocked Italy for three years. He is charged with contributing to the death of the black-haired, 22-year-old party girl "by abandoning her, believing her already dead, at the edge of the sea."

Wilma's body was found on the sands of Ostia beach in April, 1953. Police classed the death an accidental drowning but subsequently accusations were made that she died after a high-society dope and sex orgy.

Churchill's Daughter, 2nd Husband Separate

LONDON (AP)—Sir Winston Churchill's eldest daughter, Diana, has separated from her second husband, British Defense Minister Duncan Sandys.

"We have parted, but I cannot say yet exactly what we will do," Mrs. Sandys told a reporter.

She married Sandys in 1955 after divorcing her first husband, John Bailey. Mr. and Mrs. Sandys are parents of a son and two daughters.
