The final budget meeting of the Yoncalla grade school was held last week. W. M. Campbell, Douglas County deputy superintendent of schools, was present and assisted in the budget.

Among those working on the budget for the coming year were Harley Means, Don Wood, Clifford Rice and Wayne Phillips, with the school board members, Keith Van Krevelen, Lloyd Mathis, Norman Stapleton, Quentin Rychard, Roy Dodd, Jr. and Joseph Farrell, and the principal William Lewellen.

The committee decided that an additional \$100 per year for four years' experience be added to the teacher's salary schedule. Also included in the budget is \$11,882 for major improvements to the buildings to meet the needs of the school enrollment. The major items of the budget followed closely to the budget figures of last year.

The present budget will be sent to the Rural School Board to be voted on and what they don't accept of this budget will be made up in the local district and will be voted on at a later date.

Glendale Delegates To Attend Convention

Thirty-two delegates from the Glendale congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses will attend a ministerial convention at the Ashland Army in Ashland Jan. 25, 26 and 27.

Robert E. Aggson, presiding minister at Glendale, will head the delegation. He announced today that a total of 1,000 delegates are expected to attend from Northern California and Southern Oregon.

The three-day convention will include several talks, a model ministry training class, the baptism of newly dedicated ministers at Helman Baths in Ashland, and the showing of a film.

Court Upholds Order To Permit Union Letters

SALEM — The state Supreme Court Wednesday upheld a Marion County Circuit Court order permitting a striking union to send letters to customers of a Salem automobile agency explaining the union's reasons for picketing.

The lower court had dismissed a suit brought by Loder Brothers, auto dealers, to prevent the International Assn. of Machinists from listing licenses of cars entering the agency and then sending letters to the owners.

Loder Brothers had contended these methods bordered on intimidation. The high court said that if the listing of auto licenses could be considered an implied threat, such implication was ruled out by the use of the information. The letters were devoid of any suggestion of threat or intimidation, contained no offensive language, and were merely informative of the issues involved in the strike, the court said.

The court also affirmed a Douglas County Circuit Court order in an eviction case. The opinion held that although the lease to the original tenant prohibited assignment without the owner's written consent, it had been assigned to the second tenant by oral consent.

The second tenant had contended that the restriction against assignment had been waived. The court, however, said the second tenant was not an assignee of the lease and had no right of possession. Plaintiffs were Herbert D. and Lois M. Quine. Defendants were Lloyd J. Sconce and H. J. Winter.

In another opinion, the court affirmed an award of \$10,000 to Carl Sherwood, Pendleton real estate broker, as commission on the sale of a ranch owned by Harold Gerking. The court said the fact that a tenant took up an option to purchase the ranch did not preclude payment to Sherwood, who had an exclusive listing of the property.

Edward Brown Named Publisher Of Salem Paper

SALEM — Edward A. Brown, 61, was appointed publisher of the Capital Journal Wednesday. He will also become vice president of the Statesman Journal Co., which publishes both the Capital Journal and Oregon Statesman.

The announcement was made by Charles A. Sprague, president and Mrs. Jennie Mainwaring, director, co-owners of the Statesman-Journal Co.

Brown replaces Bernard Mainwaring who died Saturday. The Mainwaring family will retain ownership of 50 per cent of the Statesman-Journal stock and will continue to publish the Capital Journal.

Glenn Cushman, 29, city editor the past 11 months, was appointed managing editor of the Capital Journal. He has been with the Capital Journal two years and was formerly a news reporter and advertising director for the Idaho Free Press in Nampa, Idaho.

The new publisher is a veteran of 37 years as a newspaper executive with Salem papers. He became advertising director of the Capital Journal in 1920 and held that position until both Salem newspapers were merged in 1954. He then became advertising director of the Statesman-Journal Co.

Brown is a former director of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Assn. and is presently state vice president for the National Advertising Executives Assn.

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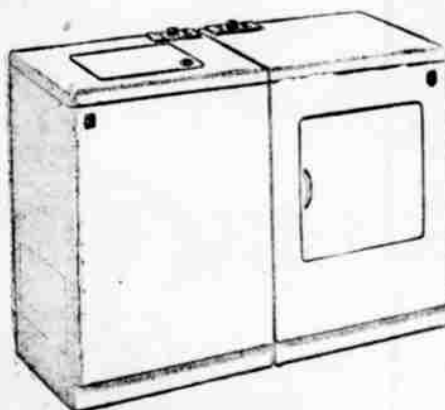
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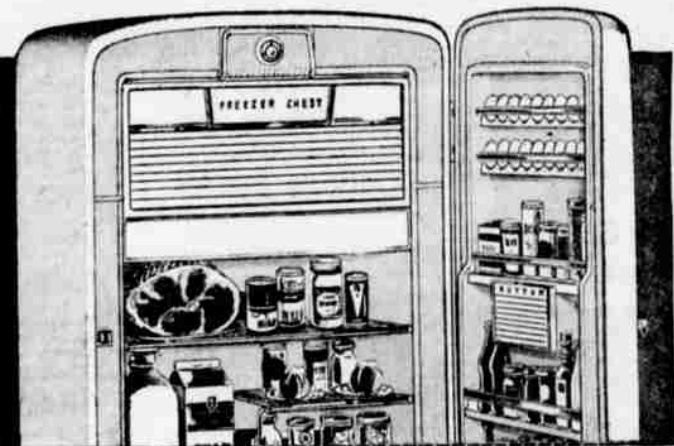


• King-size oven provides large "bake-broil" area

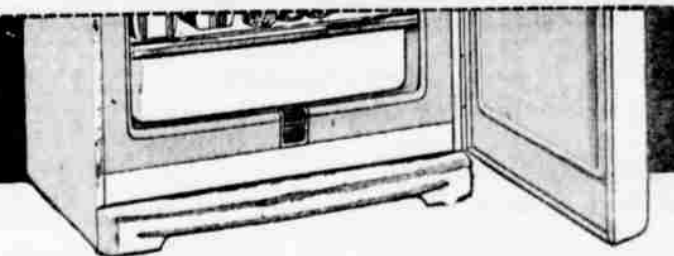
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
