The Camas Valley Hornets, trailing by 15 points at halftime, staged a rousing second half rally and won a 51-49 Douglas B League contest over home Days Creek Friday night. It was the only B League encounter played. One other game was scheduled at Yoncalla, but was called off due to road conditions.

Senior Byron Baker was the big man in the winning Hornet scoring attack. The 5-10 forward tallied a staggering 32 points while leading his mates to victory. All but nine of his markers went through the hoop during the spectacular second half rally.

Days Creek took a commanding 15-4 lead at the end of eight minutes of play and held a halftime margin of 29-14. Mike Nimsie, George Williams and Jarrod Richardson led the first half scoring. Camas Valley narrowed the gap to 35-33 at the end of three quarters on some fancy shooting by Baker and teammate Bob McClellan. Baker continued the assault during the final period hitting three field goals along with seven out of eight from the charity line, including the winning points.

The win for Camas was its fourth in play and the Wolves' fourth loss. Baker's 32-point output is the highest registered during B League play for a single player this year.

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SUTHERLIN TAKES MAT TITLE

Five Wrestlers Top Field At Glendale Invitational

Winning five championships, three consolation titles, four runner-up spots and several who placed high in the consolation bracket, the veteran-loaded Sutherland Bulldogs wrestling crew safely defended its 1956 Glendale Invitational title by winning the team championship with 97 points, during the two-day affair. Six teams in all took part, including four from Douglas County.

Illinois Valley rolled up 61 points for second, followed by Crater with 51. Glendale 49, Douglas 31 and Myrtle Creek with 31 also. Glendale and Douglas each won a championship weight bracket to round out Douglas County winners.

Illinois Valley copped three titles, including both the light (97) and heavyweight (unlimited) togas. The remaining two titles went to class A-1 Crater.

Several exciting bouts took place during the finals. One was between Durrell Gieger of Sutherland and Gary Koehler of Glendale. The 105-pounders went at it hot-and-heavy during the full time limit, ending tied at 4-4. Gieger was awarded the match for having accumulated the most riding time.

Perez Notches Win
State 105-pound champion Jerry Perez of Sutherland added another win on a decision to keep his undefeated two-year string intact, nine of them coming this year. He won a 2-0 decision over Glendale's rugged Dan Densley.

Ron Smith of Glendale won his 11th consecutive match of the year in the 140-pound class by pinning Myrtle Creek's Claris Hughes in 1:39 of the second round.

Another good bout took place when Sutherland's Jim Seal won a close 2-1 verdict over his capable challenger from Crater, Cal Dixon. The latter is a transfer student from Redmond, where he lettered in the mat sport for three years.

The most crowd-appealing match however, came in the final bout of the tournament between Eldo Swift of Illinois Valley and hometown Andy Owens. Both are heavyweights who are very agile considering their size. Swift tips the scales in the neighborhood of 240 pounds and Owens hits around 200 even. Swift won on a 4-2 decision.

Douglas Boys Rough
Of the 12 consolation titles, Douglas County grapplers won nine, including those by Sutherland, three by Myrtle Creek, two by Douglas and one by host Glendale. Crater won two and Illinois Valley took the remaining bout.

Vikings taking consolation honors were Gary Weaver, Benny Hubbard and Ed Cearley. Trojans were Gary Albertus and Darrell Hill. Bulldogs winning matches were Stan Schrieker, Allen Barnes and Gene Knapp. The only Pirante to post a win in consolation was Lester Diltz.

A fair-sized crowd was on hand for the finals, but far below that expected by tournament chairman Jim Revoletto. He blamed bad weather conditions as the main cause. The tournament itself was run off in machine-like fashion, much to the delight of those on hand. Better than 200 bouts took place during the two-day show.

A 22-point second quarter propelled the Douglas Trojans to a substantial lead which they never relinquished as they rolled over the Glendale Pirates 65-46 in an Umpqua Valley League game Friday night at Glendale.

The winners had to overcome Glendale's 14-10 first period advantage before rallying to go ahead. By halftime the count was 32-24 and in the third period the Trojans clinched things by scoring 23 points to six for Glendale.

Forward Pete Amorice, who led all scorers with 16 points, and guard Junior Hopper, who scored 13, came off the Douglas bench to pace the assault in the second period.
