

PTA, Grange Ask Increase In Mail Calls

The Galesville Parent-Teacher's Assn. and the Azalea Grange are working together in an effort to procure rural delivery of mail on Cow Creek and Starveout Roads six days a week instead of three. Both areas are up canyons above Azalea and receive mail only on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday.

Mrs. George Wendert, president of the Galesville PTA, states that when a survey was made last summer there were some 100 families living on the Cow Creek Road. Last summer's estimate did not include Starveout Road, but it, too, is heavily populated, he said.

Letters have been written to Congressional representatives asking for forms to fill out concerning the area's request and for any possible help in getting the matter expedited.

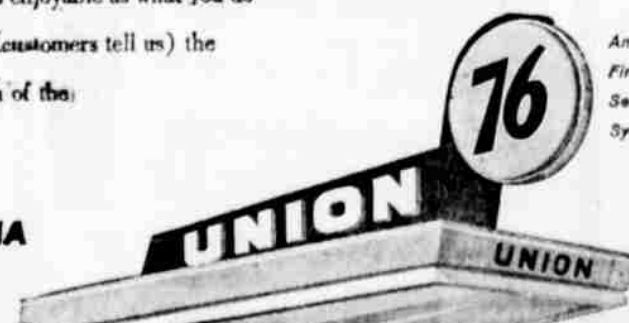
