Myrtle Seeks 15th
Douglas B League action for Tuesday has undefeated Elktion at home against the Riddle Irish. Coach Carl Grimsrud's Elks have 14 straight wins for the year and should have no trouble here making it 15.

The Springfield Millers, colder than the weather outside in the first half, suddenly found their shooting eyes in the second here Saturday night and led the Roseburg Indians in a merry chase before bowing out, 76-69.

Only a Roseburg bulge of 34-21 at halftime and the deadly fourth quarter shooting eye of Indians guard Bill Oerding prevented the suddenly hot Millers from evening the count.

The score probably set a record for combined score for the Roseburg gym. Old hands at watching the Tribe couldn't recall a combined score which would exceed the 145 points tallied. And some thought that Roseburg's 76 was a near-record.

Record
The game gave each team a 1-1 record in the first weekend of district 5-A-1 action. Roseburg lost to top-ranked Eugene Friday night while Springfield was measuring Cottage Grove.

Oerding waited until the fourth for his limbs to be completely unlimbered, then he tossed in six field goals and two foul shots for 34 points. He ended the night with 24 high for the game. The only things he missed in the fourth were two foul shots.

Roseburg wasn't by any means cold in the second half, but Springfield's capable rebounding kept the Indians in trouble. The Millers simply had more shots, canning 7 for 36 attempts, against 10-21, in the first half.

Roseburg wound up with 26 goals in 56 shots, with 16 of 27 coming in the last half. Oerding was the only Indian who could hit consistently then.

Tribe Leads 20-9
Springfield lost no time in ringing up a 2-0 lead in the first chukker, but appeared sunk when the Indians rang up 10 counters, holding the Millers scoreless through the midway point of the first quarter. The Tribe built that to 20-9 at quarter-time.

The pace leveled off in the second, Roseburg tallying 14 to Springfield's 12 for the 34-21 half time count.

Coach Bill Harper of the Indians could have settled back and stuck out his chest, but it's good he continued to worry about basketball. At halftime, it was announced that he had been selected as Roseburg's junior first citizen of 1956 for his coaching of the third-place Junior American Legion baseball team in the national finals last summer. That story is on page 1.

It was immediately apparent that Springfield was out for scalps as soon as ref Brownie Valdez lofted the ball in the second-half face-off. The tip went to forward Dick Mannila, who lateralled to forward Rick Herman, and it was two points, then four more for the Millers and the Roseburg lead of 13 had evaporated to seven.

Never again was Roseburg ahead by more than 10, and at times it was as little as four. With Herman, center Walby Knecht and guard Dave Saunders hoisting them up, the Millers kept in the game.

Score Is 34-45
Oerding, held to four points in the first half, and his running mate, Brady Montgomery, each potted three field goals during the third quarter.

quarter to keep the Indians going, and a new light in the Roseburg of fence, Larry Sloan, chipped in with five points. But Springfield outscored the Indians, 24-19, in the quarter to make the count read 52-45.

Herman and Knecht continued their assault in the fourth, but Oerding caught fire at the same time, racking through four goals in the first four minutes without a miss. He couldn't miss on anything—driving layups, jumpers and set shots from 20 feet out.

Montgomery was a steady scorer. Of Roseburg's first 10 points in the game started, Brady accounted for six on three field goals. He wound up with 17 points, tied with Herman for second-best for the evening.

Roseburg's 26 buckets in 56 shots was a highly creditable .464 shooting average. Springfield connected on 23 in 77 tries for .299, but it was the first half blues—from the cold, no doubt—that made that mark so bad.

Both teams were hot at the free-throw line. Roseburg made 24 in 33 tries, while Springfield made 23 of 34 goals.

On and On
At times in the third and fourth quarters, it was a matter of one team canning a shot, then giving the ball over to the other quint, which would retaliate—on and on. The chilly Springfield performance in the first half could be partially credited to Roseburg height.
