Sparkling his teammates with brilliant play, Oregon State star Dave Gambee nearly shook Washington from the Pacific Coast Conference basketball title. Then he talked too loudly to himself. The Huskies collected their seventh victory against one defeat to stay among the conference leaders — California with a 6-0 record and UCLA with 4-0.

Gambee's blunder was Saturday night. The Beavers led powerful Washington 45-39 with nine minutes to go. When the host Huskies collected four straight points, Gambee was assessed his fifth foul.

The 6-foot-7 junior forward marched indignantly off the court, talking to himself. The referee heard him, and called a technical foul.

Washington tied the score with two points on Gambee's personal. It went ahead on the technical, and took the game 58-51 — its second in a row from the Beavers. Gambee was top scorer with 25 points.

The Huskies take on underdog Oregon Tuesday in a Kings-X game at Seattle. Oregon State moves to UCLA for the weekend, and Oregon returns home to host Stanford, USC plays at Hawaii.

Over the weekend, Washington State took two from Oregon, 87-81 on Friday and 74-67, Stanford, the only team to drop Washington, lost Friday to California, 67-64, in an overtime.

Tired after hosting the Bears, Stanford lost 77-61 to Santa Clara at Palo Alto Saturday in a non-leaguer.

Captain Larry Beck of WSC shot Oregon dizzy, hooping 33 points and breaking his own PCC free throw record of 19 with 21 hits out of 26 tries.

Brown & Allen Scores 241 To Lead Winter League

The cold weather that has been experienced around the area for the past few days must have taken its toll judging from the looks of the "scattergunner" scores posted Sunday during third round action of the Winter League trapshoot. The meet is held each Sunday at the Roseburg Rod & Gun Club range at Winchester.

Bert Dompier was the only shot-gunner busting a perfect 50 X 30 "birds." However, his perfect score enabled the Brown & Allen team from Sutherlin to move into the loop top spot held last week by Wilbur Lumber Company.

The Sutherlin crew added a good 241 total with their previous two-week 483 score for the league high. Sayre Volkswagon jumped from third to a second place tie, with three men hitting near perfect 49's, tallying 237 for a grand 719 count.
