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Carolina Still First In Poll; UCLA Fifth

A week of idleness for both teams brought no change in the race between North Carolina and Kansas for top ranking in college basketball, but a single game was costly to Iowa State's hopes.

The eighth weekly Associated Press ranking poll of sports writers and broadcasters again found North Carolina's Tar Heels far out ahead of Kansas, which has held the lead up to last week. Unbeaten Carolina went to the front after Kansas dropped its first game of the season to Iowa State.

Cyclones Tumble
Iowa State's 69-66 loss to Missouri sent it tumbling from third place to eighth. Louisville's Cardinals, who edged out Dayton 57-56 in their only game of the week, moved up to third.

North Carolina got 62 of a possible 86 first-place votes and a total of 824 points on the basis of 10 for each first-place vote, 9 for second, etc. Kansas drew 8 firsts and 715 points.

Kentucky, a 91-83 winner over Vanderbilt, moved up to fourth; and Illinois, which whipped Notre Dame 99-81, went up from ninth to seventh. Seattle slid back one notch to ninth.

Southern Methodist stayed in sixth. UCLA took over fifth place position by a two-point margin over Ohio State.

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Coen Building Supply Rolls 3,174 High Series For Year To Drub League Leader

A sizzling hot Coen Building Supply bowling team racked the maps for the highest team series count of the year during Town League keeling action Monday night at the Roseburg Bowling Lanes, and in doing so, halted the 12-game winning streak of the News-Review.

The high rolling five rapped out team games of 1,077, 1,044 and 1,033 for a scorching 3,174 series total. Leading the Coen barrage was steady Art Mills, who fashioned single counts of 197, 212 and 198 for a 607 count. He was assisted by teammates Jerry Coen with 579 and anchorman John Saunders, who had 596.

The high series gave them four wins over the paper five and leaves them tied for top spot with 12 wins each.
