Union Leaders Plan Rap At 5th Amendment Use

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—AFL-CIO leaders were expected to take a strong stand today against union men invoking the Fifth Amendment to avoid giving testimony on alleged labor union racketeering.

Sentiment among union leaders appeared divided as the policy-making AFL-CIO Executive Council opened a winter meeting to decide organized labor's attitude toward an expected congressional investigation of union affairs.

Basically the question is, Will the 15-million-member AFL-CIO help congressional investigators try to find and boot out crooks and hoodlums from the labor movement? Or will unions contentance use of legal technicalities that will hamstring any probe?

G-P Plywood Firm's Net Income Increases

NEW YORK (AP)—Georgia-Pacific Corp., which has extensive Pacific Northwest lumber operations, reports net income for 1956 more than a million dollars over 1955.

It lists net income at \$7,428,767, up from the previous year's \$6,202,747; sales up from \$31,996,904 to \$121,205,397; income per share of common stock up from \$2.53 to \$2.84.

False Arrest Charged In Suit For \$33,000

PORTLAND (AP)—An arrest in Baker last year brought a \$33,000 damage suit in federal court here this week.

Ronald M. Rajewski, Spokane, says in a suit against Douglas Benton of Baker that while he was employed by Benton as an automobile salesman, he was arrested on a false charge brought by Benton.

Rajewski's complaint says he was in jail 18 days before being able to raise bond and his 10-year-old daughter suffered shock, embarrassment and shame it was necessary to remove her from school.

The complaint says he was charged with obtaining money under false pretenses, but that the grand jury returned a not true bill.

Major Power Missiles Arm U. S. 7th Fleet

BUCKNER BAY, Okinawa (AP)—The mighty U. S. 7th Fleet, which has been capable of delivering atomic bombs for many months, is rapidly being armed with the newest and most powerful guided missiles in America's arsenal.

Vice Adm. Stuart H. Ingersoll said Monday, "The latest high performance jet aircraft and air-to-air guided missiles are being added to the fleet to greatly increase its combat potential."

Ingersoll, turning over command of the fleet to Vice Adm. W. M. Beakley, said the 105 ships make up "the largest single integrated naval force in the world today."
