School Specifications Error Poses Knotty Problem For Roseburg Dist., Contractor

Roseburg School Atty. George Neuner was tossed a hot potato by the school board Thursday night when the board referred a dispute between a contractor and the school district.

Entering into the dispute is a school architectural firm, Freeman, Hayslip, Tuft and Hewlett, which may have drawn up faulty building specifications to touch off the incident.

Crux of the matter is this: The school clerk, V. J. Micelli, is holding a \$925 check from John Todd, contractor of the addition to Huerfano School, and Todd is keeping \$288 which the school board claims should be in the district treasury.

When the architect drew up specifications for the school addition, it stipulated that heat to the building during construction "shall be furnished and paid for by the contractor." If building went past the completion date, which it did, only the specifications left out the vital word "by."

So the specifications actually read: "shall be furnished and paid for the contractor."

Todd is claiming that the letter of the specifications make it plain that he should be reimbursed for the heating.

In the meantime, the school district owes him \$925 for completion of the building. But Micelli has the check locked up in his safe.

Thursday night, Todd offered to settle the dispute by paying the district 50 per cent of the hearing cost — \$144.

But School Director Dudley C. Walton demurred, and suggested that the entire \$288 be collected from the architect.

After brief discussion, the problem was handed over to Neuner to untangle.

In other action, the board set up two new policies regarding use of school property.

One resulted from a request by the Elks Lodge for a waiver of \$20 rent for use of Central Junior High School when the lodge sponsors the Young Oregonian troupe March 13. The \$20 regularly is charged to non-profit functions in the school auditorium. The Elks' request was denied.

The other was a decision to ban all parking on the Central playground across Rose Street from the school. A barbershop quartet group, which is sponsoring a contest here in April, had asked use of the playground for parking, and the request also was denied.

The board authorized an additional \$2,500 expenditure to complete sewer and water lines to Eastwood School, due for construction this spring.

Guy Davis, superintendent of buildings and grounds, said that 3,000 feet of sewer pipe to hook up to a city sewer extension on Garden Valley Boulevard, and 1,200 of water pipe will be needed to complete a permanent job.

Earlier, \$2,500 had been authorized for the job, of which \$1,670.80 remains.

The board members made plans to inspect schools in Eugene and Harrisburg for ideas in building trends. The trip will be made next Wednesday. Later in the day, some members of the board will attend a school meeting at Corvallis.

Marketing Area Restrictions End Hearing March 1

PORTLAND — The Bureau of Land Management will hold a public hearing here March 1 on proposals to abolish marketing area restrictions on the sale and processing of timber from O&C lands.

Edward Woolley, director of the Bureau of Land Management, called the hearing in response to recommendations from the lumber industry, communities and the county governments of the 18 O&C counties in Western Oregon.

Regulations of 1947 restricted the primary manufacture of all O&C timber to the area of origin.

In July of last year, the restrictions were modified to permit the manufacture of O&C salvage timber in any of the 12 O&C marketing areas, regardless of the origin of the timber.

The scheduled hearing will permit interested parties to tell whether they want the present marketing area program continued or revoked.

ACCEPTS INVITATION

American People Convert Knowledge Into Production, Du Pont Speaker States

America is a veritable horn of plenty because Americans have learned "to convert knowledge into production."

This was the appraisal of the reason for the world's highest standard of living by Wyatte F. De Loache, Pacific Coast manager of the Du Pont Co.'s extension division. He spoke to both Rotarians and Lions Club members Thursday in the Hotel Umpqua.

He pointed out that this country's material comforts are so great because the cost of living index is now little more than a price list of former luxuries which have become commonplace necessities. He ticked off such items as television sets, price of movies, cost of buying houses, ice cream and other former luxuries as part of that index.

De Loache also judged America's spiritual values as being at an unprecedented level. "We have half the hospital beds of the world and half the high school enrollments," he emphasized.

"Only six nations in the world have a total wealth equal to our investment in schools alone," he continued.

De Loache claimed the reason for the gigantic capacity for production was due to two principal factors, tools and motives.

"No nation on the face of the earth has such an abundance of marvelous and efficient tools," he said. "This explains why the average industrial employee today who works but 40 hours a week can produce more, earn more, own more and live better than his grandfathers could working 72 hours a week."

He said tools come from people who are motivated to supply them—the investors. Their motive is the hope of reward, "which can come only from that grossly-misnamed and much misunderstood word, profits."

De Loache emphasized his points by displaying a variety of new products.

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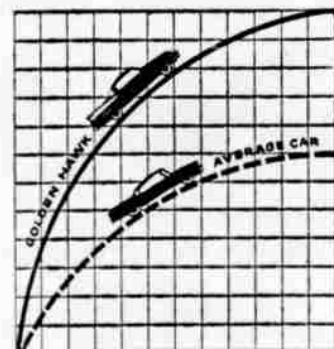
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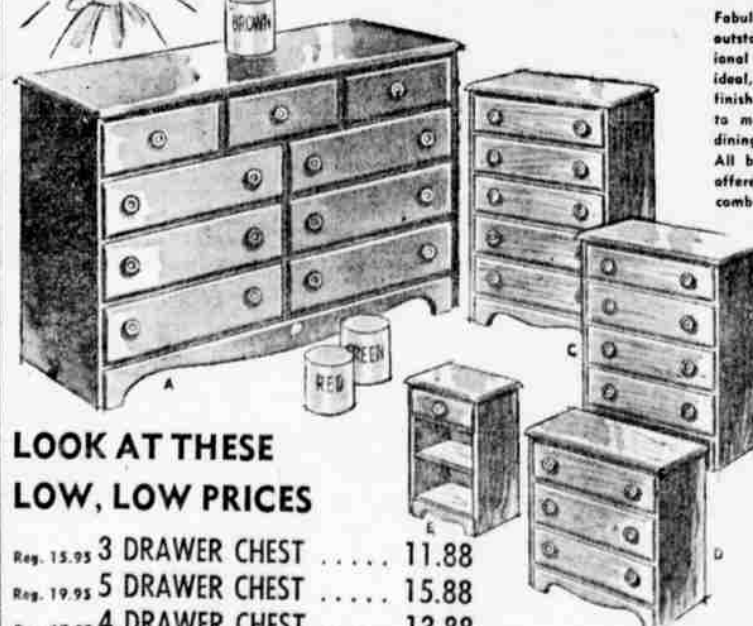
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
