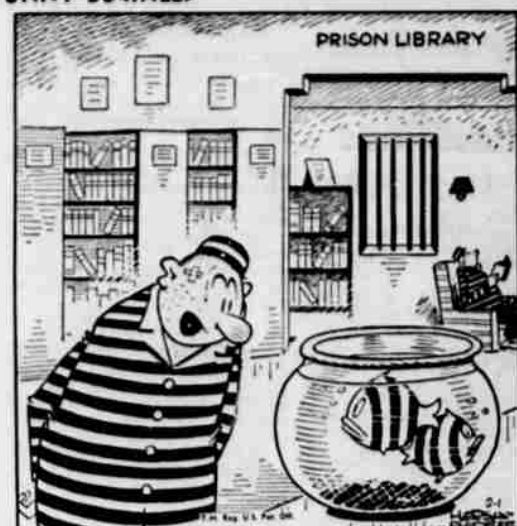
The braided rug workshop course was completed Jan. 18.
