Oregon Delegates Ask For Larger Access Road Funds

WASHINGTON — The full amount of money authorized by law should be appropriated for the Forest Service's access road program, four Oregon Democrats told a House appropriations subcommittee Monday.

Sens. Morse and Neuberger and Reps. Porter and Ullman said \$2,664,000 should be added to the access road fund to bring the appropriation for the year beginning July 1 to the full \$38,848,000 authorized by law.

Morse said adequate access roads would bring increased prices for timber and the government would thereby benefit.

Porter also urged appropriation requests to improve national forest recreation facilities, stating that in many places, including Crater Lake, such improvements are "long overdue."

Neuberger asked for a two million dollar addition to the Forest Service recreational management and maintenance appropriation for Mt. Hood National Forest and for improvements in the forest's Timberline Lodge to make it capable of returning to the government the money being spent on its upkeep.

accepted, would have been \$11.89. He said he believes that figure would have been the highest per-square-foot cost of any school in the school district.

Glenn argued that a per-square-foot basis for cost comparison "isn't reliable," saying that in the case of Eastwood School, special problems in excavation will be encountered. The school must be built on concrete caissons poured down to solid rock for support.

He said the design was not of an expensive building, and materials were incorporated with a view to economy.

New tentative plans will be submitted by Glenn to the board Feb. 13. The architect will have the help of Supt. M. C. Deller and Guy Davis, building and grounds superintendent, in finding possible cuts in size and cost of the structure.

The board also heard another architect's opinions on school construction.

Palmer Hewlett, of the Portland firm of Freeman, Haylip, Tuft and Hewlett, discouraged lengthily on new architectural and construction procedures, and displayed new architectural plastic now being marketed.

The board invited Hewlett's opinions because of an apparent construction program now in the making.

Because of availability of funds through the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, it seems possible that two new West Roseburg buildings may be in the design stage in the next few months.

The schools, probably both elementary, would be located on the 24 acres of surplus Veterans Administration property recently acquired by the school board, and on Broccoli Street.

The district becomes entitled to the federal aid money because of the place of federal lands in the economy of the community.

The board, however, hasn't officially approved any building program, although it has been discussed briefly at several meetings during the past few months.

munist hierarchy showed up Tuesday at the opening of a semi-annual session of Russia's parliament, the Supreme Soviet.

Economic matters and overhaul of the judicial system appeared to be the major business in prospect. No drastic shakeup was expected in the Soviet government leadership.

Premier Bulganin, Deputy Premier Mikoyan and President Voroshilov, three members of the Presidium of the Communist Party Central Committee, attended the opening of the colorful Soviet of Nationalities in the Kremlin's chamber of the Supreme Soviet.

With Foreign Minister Shepilov and others on hand, that house met 13 minutes, just long enough for the reading of an eight-point agenda.

An 18-minute session of the second house, the Soviet of the Union, followed Tuesday afternoon. Bulganin and Mikoyan skipped this, but Voroshilov and all the other members of the Presidium, formerly known as the Politburo, appeared on the platform.

Communist Party secretary Khrushchev was there, along with Deputy Premier Malenkov, Molotov, Kaganovich, Pervukhin and Saburov.

It was thus evident that no top-rank Soviet leader is the mystery patient in a Moscow hospital being treated by a blood specialist.

A joint session of the two houses, whose membership totals more than 1,300, was called late in the day.

Economic boss Pervukhin promised the Supreme Soviet an increase of 7.1 per cent in economic production in 1957 — a sharp cut-back.

He was reporting on the revised program for this year, drafted after the Communist Party's Central Committee demanded changes in the economic development plan.

His prediction indicated a reduction in the rate of growth of economic production as compared to 1956.

In 1956 the Soviet Union's total industrial output rose 11 per cent over the previous year.

The planning chiefs figures revealed no great shift in the emphasis between heavy and light industries during 1957.

Report Of Ship Sinking West Of Florida False

KEY WEST, Fla. — A report that a Liberian freighter with 35 crewmen aboard was sinking in the Florida Straits 70 miles west of here turned out Tuesday to be a false alarm.

Eleven hours after the start of an intensive search by air and surface craft, the SS Nortuna was located by a Navy vessel, in no danger and suffering from nothing worse than a lost propeller. She refused an offer of a Coast Guard tow.

A garbled radio message in mixed Spanish and English, received by a commercial station at Lantana, Fla., was interpreted to mean that the ship was sinking and her crew was going overboard.

Extensive Improvements To Diamond Lake Camping Facilities Being Planned

Extensive improvements to the camping and recreational facilities at Diamond Lake are planned for this year, it was announced today by Vondie E. Miller, Umpqua National Forest supervisor.

The rehabilitation will be part of the stepped-up program planned for such facilities in the Northwest. The plan calls for a five-year program, and financial support was recommended to Congress in the President's budget message.

Last year, the Umpqua received \$7,500 in campground rehabilitation money. Supervisor Miller said. Under the present plan, the local office hopes to receive three to four times that amount.

Most of the money for this year will be put into improving facilities at Diamond Lake. Also on the planning board for this year are a small campground development on the Tiller-Trail Highway about five miles south of Drew and the start of some campgrounds on Lemolo Lake.

Miller said the plan for the Umpqua is to concentrate most money and effort on places of heavy use. "We will try to clean up one before moving to another, rather than scatter our efforts," the supervisor stated.

Most of the facilities on the Umpqua were built by the Civilian Conservation Corps between 1933 and 1941. There was little maintenance during the war years, Miller pointed out, and not enough after the war because of lack of funds for such work.

In the years since the end of the war there has been a tremendous increase in the use of forest recreational facilities, Miller said, and added, "Further increases are indicated for the future."

In 1955, recreation visits to national forests of Oregon and Washington hit an all-time high of 54 million as compared with 34 million in 1946. About 39 per cent of the visitors camped and picnicked outside improved areas because existing facilities could not take care of them. At present on the Umpqua National Forest there are about 40 improved campgrounds.

Malyshev Said Mystery Patient

Moscow's mystery patient is Vyacheslav A. Malyshev, Soviet minister of machine building and former deputy premier.

This was established in private advice from the Soviet capital Tuesday. Moscow news dispatches identifying him are held up by Soviet censors.

The mystery developed last weekend when Dr. Hans Schulten, a West German blood specialist, was summoned to Moscow to help Russian doctors treat the patient. His name was concealed even from Dr. Schulten.

Malyshev, 54, was awarded the Order of Lenin on his 50th birthday Dec. 16, 1952.

A lieutenant general in World War II, Malyshev has been active in Russia's industrial development. He is believed to have been chief of the Soviet Atomic Energy Commission for a time after Stalin's death in 1953.

Dulles Hopeful Israel Will Comply With U. N.

cause, he said, that would put a premium on the seizure of American ships for use as pawns in international bargaining by unfriendly governments. Dulles said he does not propose to pay that kind of blackmail.

He personally believes the lagging deliveries of U.S. oil to Europe, hard pressed by the closing of the Suez Canal, are not bad enough to require the personal intervention of President Eisenhower. The shipments are not as good as the administration hopes. Dulles said, but Venezuela and some normal shipments from the Middle East to the United States are being diverted to Europe.

5. The administration's failure to get its proposed Middle East powers from Congress by Feb. 1 as it had hoped has not seriously affected the impact of the proposal on world opinion.

6. Dulles hopes the debate now beginning in the United Nations on French rule of Algeria will be an exchange of views only and not become an effort on either side to force a solution of the issue.

7. The administration still thinks an exchange of views between President Eisenhower and President Tito of Yugoslavia would be useful. Tito decided that in view of strong congressional criticism he would not visit Washington at present. Dulles said in effect he still hopes Tito will come.

Dulles said he felt the position the United States took in the Middle East was both honorable and sound and would be justified by the verdict of history.

The decision last November to break with Britain and France over their attack on Egypt was one of the most difficult the United States government has ever had to make, he added, but also historically one of the most important decisions made in recent times.

Nixon Will Attend Gold Coast Celebration

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower Tuesday named Vice President Nixon chief of a U. S. delegation to attend March 3-10 ceremonies marking Britain's granting of independence to the Gold Coast.

Mrs. Nixon will accompany her husband.

Informed officials said Nixon will be personal representative of the President, and will make the trip by plane.

Coverage would be extended to all firms, while it now is limited to firms hiring two or more workers.

James T. Marr, secretary of the Labor Council, said the package "also would abolish the harsh disqualifications that were passed by the 1955 Legislature."

It also would be easier for jobless workers to qualify for benefits.

Marr said that a third bill would be introduced to increase employer contributions so that they would equal the amount to be paid in benefits.

Legislation May Be Needed For Oil Price Curb

WASHINGTON — Sen. O'Mahoney (D-Wyo) said Tuesday "legislation may be needed" to deal with the problem of increasing oil prices in the aftermath of the Middle East emergency.

"Of course," O'Mahoney said, "everybody will agree that an objectionable as price fixing is when carried on by the government, it would be far worse if carried on by private operators."

O'Mahoney made the comment while presiding at the start of an inquiry into recent oil price increases being conducted by Public Lands and Antitrust subcommittees. The dozen senators sitting in included also members of the Interior Committee.

O'Mahoney questioned the wisdom of the Eisenhower administration plan for supplying European needs for oil since the closing of the Suez Canal. He said it consisted of allowing "five giant corporations" to set up an oil pool exempt from antitrust laws — a contention administration officials have disputed.

O'Mahoney said he could not understand increases in oil and gasoline prices, both in Europe and in this country, in view of reported large reserves.

New Legislative Bills Include One For Teachers' Pay

SALEM — Action in the Oregon Legislature included the following: New House bills Monday would let the state Department of Education set up a program for education of specially gifted children, and give the Department of Agriculture authority to establish programs to eradicate brucellosis and tuberculosis of cattle.

Sen. Jean Lewis (D), Portland, introduced a bill making it illegal for a person to drive so slowly as to impede highway traffic.

The Senate Taxation Committee sponsored a bill to transfer tax collection duties from the county sheriffs to the assessors.

A teachers salary increase bill, requested by Democratic Gov. Holmes, was introduced in the Senate with support from both parties.

The minimums would be increased from \$3,300 a year to \$3,400 for teachers without college degrees; \$3,400 to \$3,700 for those with bachelor degrees, and \$3,800 to \$4,000 for teachers with master's degrees.

The House will debate the controversial measure to build a federal high dam in Hells Canyon on Tuesday at 10:30 a.m. This is a memorial to Congress.

At 1 p.m. Tuesday, the House Highways Committee will hold a hearing on Highway Commission bills to issue \$8 million dollars worth of bonds for construction, and to limit access on any existing highway.

Professional Football Player Held For Theft

RIVERSIDE, Calif. — Burglary charges based on theft of \$60 from wallets in the locker room of the Elks Club have been lodged against Art Hunt, 23, professional football player. He will be arraigned Wednesday.

His arrest last Friday followed a police stakeout across the street from the club. The arresting officer said he was watching with field glasses when the locker room thefts occurred.

Hunter and his wife, Patricia, Miss Riverside in 1950, were married in South Bend, Ind., in 1954 when he was a Notre Dame varsity tackle. Later he played for the Green Bay Packers and said he is now under contract to play center for the Cleveland Browns.

ENTER GUilty PLEA

Joseph Julian Ryerson, 18, Box 363, Ileyd Park, pleaded guilty in circuit court Monday to the charge of grand larceny. Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly suspended imposition of sentence.

Life Edison is taking Smith's place until he is able to return to work, Mrs. Fox said.

Mrs. Fox added that the sewage treatment plant is reported to be nearly ready for use but that work was discontinued during the extreme cold weather.

New Multnomah Grand Jury Sets Langley Probe

PORTLAND — A new Multnomah County grand jury was in session here Tuesday, looking again into the matter that last summer brought indictment of Dist. Atty. William Langley on a charge of conspiring to permit gambling.

The indictment of Langley and two Seattle men—Thomas E. Maloney and Joseph P. McLaughlin—were thrown out last month because of a legal flaw. The names of all those who testified at the earlier grand jury session were not listed on the indictments.

Tape recordings of what Atty. Gen. Robert V. Thornton said were conversations between Langley and others will be used by the new grand jury in its deliberations. Langley's attempt to have the tapes suppressed as evidence failed Monday when Circuit Judge Charles W. Redding ruled against him. The tapes were also used by the first grand jury.

Thornton's office continues in charge of the investigation by order of Gov. Robert D. Holmes.

Mother Drowns Three Children In Bathtub

CHICAGO — A young mother who, police said, left notes admitting she drowned her three children and then tried to kill herself, was held in a hospital today on a charge of murder.

The bodies of the children, 3-year-old twin girls and a 5-year-old boy, were found by
