Youth Threatens Jump From Top Of High Building

DENVER — A 23-year-old man kept a crowd of 1,000 guessing for an hour Tuesday night before he quit threatening to jump from the top of a nine-story downtown building.

He told police he was Robert R. Carson Jr. of Denver and a Korean War veteran. Friends said he was heartbroken over a romance.

Police officers and a Catholic priest, the Rev. Jerome L. Weinert, joined in pleading with him not to jump.

Carson, coatless and hatless, shivered in the freezing weather as he perched on the foot-wide ledge three feet above the roof of the Metropolitan Building at 227 16th Street.

Traffic was blocked off on the street below. Searchlights played on Carson while the officers and the priest repeatedly urged:

"You are a young man. You have so much to live for—this is no way to act. Face up to life." Carson, head bowed, finally allowed detectives to walk up to him.

Police quoted friends as saying Carson was hurt in Korean fighting and was treated for resulting mental disturbances.

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High Hells Canyon Project Gets Party Line Approval In Oregon House Tuesday

SALEM — Construction of a federal high dam in Hells Canyon on the Snake River won 36 to 18 approval in Oregon's House of Representatives Tuesday.

The vote, almost on party lines, was on a memorial asking Congress to provide funds to build it. It goes to the evenly split Senate, where the vote is expected to be close.

It was supported by 33 Democrats and four Republicans. The opposition consisted of one Democrat and 17 Republicans.

The Democrats argued that a federal high dam would provide more power, and at less cost, than the three low dams for which the Idaho Power Co. has a Federal Power Commission license.

The Republicans claimed that the three low dams would provide as much power as the high dam, and at comparable cost. They also contended that the low dams would produce power much sooner than the high dam.

Before the final vote, the Republicans failed, 23-33, in an attempt to send the memorial back to the State and Federal Affairs Committee. They argued that the committee, which recommended passage, didn't have enough facts.

But the Democrats countered that the issue had been in the headlines for years, and that every House member had decided how he would vote.

Last week, the House unanimously approved a memorial calling for federal construction of John Day Dam on the Columbia River. This memorial is in the Senate.

The debate, lasting 80 minutes, was the longest since the session began 23 days ago. Chief spokesman for the high dam was Rep. Don Willner (D), Portland, attorney for the National Hells Canyon Assn.

He cited the fact that Oregon, in the winter months, has the highest unemployment rate in the country, and said cheap power would bring new industries to the state.

He declared that the high dam would provide 40 per cent more power than the low dams, and at only a third of the cost.

"The basic case for the high dam," Willner declared, "is that it would provide more power cheaper. The Federal Power Commission, in granting the license for the three low dams, said it isn't concerned with low cost power."

The fight against the memorial was led by Rep. Emil A. Stunz, Nyssa, the only Democrat who opposed it.

"It is foolish for this body," Stunz said, "as a relatively poorly informed group, to say that the Federal Power Commission didn't know what it was talking about when it granted the license to Idaho Power."

"The three low dams would produce as much power as the high dam, and we won't have to pick up the check for the low dams."

He said that Brownlee Dam, the first of the three low dams to be built, would be producing power by the fall of next year.

Stunz said there isn't much chance that Congress would provide money for a high dam, asserting it has defeated similar measures five or six times.

"I'd rather," he said, "take a bird in the hand than take a chance on a bird that is flying around."

Construction of the Brownlee Dam already is under way, Rep. Shirley Field (R), Portland, said she objects "to telling

the federal government what to do. We have enough state problems. The high dam is a political football in Oregon."

She said that the chief problem in attracting new industry is lack of markets, and "even if you gave power away, you'd still have that problem."

The only Republicans who voted for the memorial were Reps. Herman Chindgren, Molalla; George Layman, Newberg; Charles A. Tom, Rufus; and Sam Wilderman, Portland.

56 Teachers Stay Off Jobs To Dramatize Need For Pay

BONNERS FERRY, Idaho — The 56 Boundary County school teachers stayed off the job Tuesday to "dramatize the need for higher salaries" and a higher appropriation for education from the Legislature.

It appeared, however, that the teachers here walked out alone. They had sought a state-wide demonstration but there were no reports of teachers walking out elsewhere.

Students in the high school and elementary schools here, at Evergreen, Naples and Mount Hall in the county were advised by the teachers that there would be no school Tuesday.

They didn't show up and neither were given extensive homework to do while the teachers stayed home.

M. E. Shelman, chairman of the county school board, said "the teachers have walked out and there is nothing we can do about it. We will hold the teachers to their contracts. They will have to teach 122 days."

He said the teachers apparently will be "docked" for the missed time on their pay unless it is made up.

The teachers who announced earlier they would stay out for six days, scheduled a meeting for Wednesday morning on "textbook evaluation." They said they will decide then how long to remain away from classes.

Supt. Jack Jones said he had no comment on the walkout. But Mrs. Victor Hines, president of the county Parents and Teachers Assn., said the teachers picked a good time for the walkout. She said heavy snow would probably have kept many students away from school, anyway.

Earl Barnard, president of the Boundary County Teachers' Assn., said last month the teachers decided the walkout was the only way to "dramatize the salary and education situation in the state."

He sent letters to teacher groups in all parts of the state asking them to join in the walkout. Top officials of the Idaho Education Assn. and members of the Legislature in Boise assailed the idea.

Barnard, band director at the high school here, said Idaho salaries are much lower than in neighboring Washington and Oregon. He said some teachers in the county "receive only \$2,900 a year."

ST. LOUIS — "It looks like it wasn't my time," said Robert Ransom, a 33-year-old elevator mechanic's helper, as he told how he fell 10 to 12 floors down an elevator shaft.

Ransom was working on the 17th floor of the Ambassador Building. He opened the shaft door, intending to turn on a light in the elevator. The elevator was at the ground floor. He stepped into space.

He estimated he fell five floors before managing to get his arms and legs around the elevator cable. This checked his fall but didn't stop him. Desperately he grabbed the cable with his hands. The friction burned them painfully but he managed to stop his fall. He opened a door with his feet and swung himself out of the shaft.

MANCHESTER, N. H. — The first teacher strike in the state's history ended Wednesday as Manchester public school teachers returned to their classrooms in the wake of a court decision that their two-day walkout was illegal.

The Superior Court ruling that teachers do not have the right to strike against the city will be appealed to the state Supreme Court and a hearing will be held later this month.

Both teacher and student attendance was reported normal as classes were held for the first time since last Friday.

Elevator Helper Falls 10 Floors

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The teachers' decision to return to work ended a two-day strike that closed the city's two high schools and 22 elementary schools and gave more than 9,000 pupils an unexpected holiday.

Truman Has Six-Stitch Cut On Back Of His Head

INDEPENDENCE, Mo. — Harry S. Truman has a six-stitch cut on the back of his head as the result of a fall Tuesday morning. He slipped on some ice at his home.

The former President went on to his office in Kansas City and was treated there by Dr. Wallace Graham Jr., who also was his physician at the White House. Dr. Graham said the cut was superficial and Truman stayed on at the office for a full day's work.

Mrs. Truman slipped and fell Jan. 3 and broke a small bone in her left foot. It still is in a cast.

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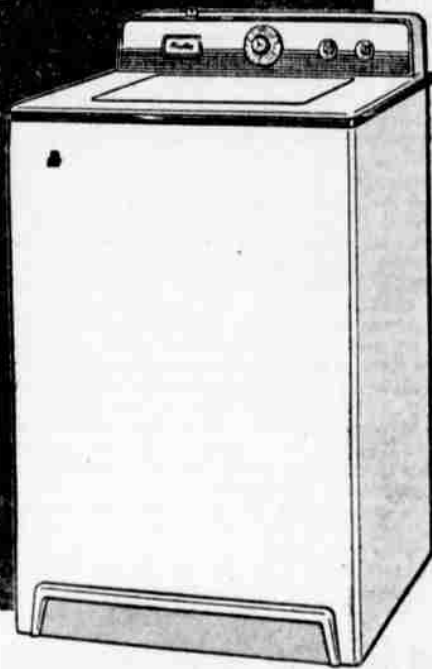
