

Lamb Will Force Beef To Share Price Spotlight

Lamb will force beef to share the spotlight in many supermarkets and neighborhood grocery stores across the country this week.

Leg of lamb and lamb chops will be widely featured, reflecting a plentiful supply of grain-fed lambs. Farmers had 4,468,000 of the critters on feed January 1, the highest number since 1948 and 207,000 more than a year ago. Choice chops and roasts will be coming to market from these lambs before spring.

Beef also is expected to be plentiful for some time, with the housewife having a choice of anything from chuck and stew to sirloin steaks at special prices. Both sirloin steaks and rib roast of beef are reported slightly cheaper.

Cabbage is still an outstanding vegetable buy. The same thing goes for such root crops as carrots, beets, turnips and parsnips. New potatoes from Florida's winter crop already are coming to market, and are rated a good buy, along with Idaho fall potatoes. Other good buys this week are lettuce, spinach, collards, sweet potatoes, broccoli, pascal celery and peppers.

Yellow onions are in the good buy class, even though they've gotten a bit more expensive this week. Tomatoes are reported cheaper this week, but with a wide range in quality. Beans and cauliflower are only moderate in price. Apples and grapes are moderate in cost in most places.

Army Gives Red Cross Worker Full Clearance

SEATTLE — The Army has notified Irving I. August, a Red Cross worker, that it has given him full security clearance for overseas duty, August disclosed Tuesday.

The Army last April refused August, a Korean War veteran, the clearance. Former Sen. Harry P. Cain, at the time a member of the Subversive Activities Control, said August had been a victim of "heartless injustice," and the Red Cross restored him to duty last June.

The Army later reopened the case after Cain told a Senate subcommittee that the Army never advised August of any charges against him and did not grant him a hearing.

W. German Specialist's Services Not Needed

MOSCOW — Dr. Hans Schulten, West German blood specialist called here to treat a high-ranking patient, said Wednesday he had been advised by the Soviet Ministry of Health that he would not be called in for another examination or consultation and was free to leave Moscow.

This could mean either that the patient's condition had improved substantially, or that he was now considered beyond hope.

Dr. Schulten saw the patient but once, on last Sunday. The name of the patient never has been disclosed by Soviet officials. Private advice from Moscow on Tuesday said he is V. A. Malyshev, minister of machine building and former deputy premier.

Crucial Period On GI Mortgage Financing Seen

NEW YORK — The next few weeks may be crucial ones for that popular method of home financing known as the "GI mortgage."

Congress is being asked to raise the legal interest rate on GI mortgages from the present 4½ per cent to 5 per cent. If the rate is increased, the GI mortgage may again become popular with big institutional lenders. Otherwise, say spokesmen for the lenders, it may soon become as extinct as the dodo bird.

The GI mortgage was established at the end of World War II to make it easier for returning servicemen to buy houses. Because the Veterans Administration guaranteed repayment of the loan's share of the loan in case of default, lenders were willing to grant extremely liberal terms. Often a GI with no cash of his own could buy a new house with no down payment at all. The loan could be liquidated in small monthly payments extending over a period of 30 years.

This arrangement worked splendidly when banks and insurance companies had more money in the till than they could loan and interest rates were low. In the present era of "tight money," however, the GI home loan with its 4½ per cent interest tag has fallen in favor.

"We can get 5½ per cent on a ship loan and it will be insured 100 per cent under the government's tanker building program," a spokesman for a big life insurance company said. "Conventional home mortgages now yield 4½ per cent. Yields on corporation bonds are high, too, and there are fewer headaches. So there's no inducement for us to buy 4 per cent GI loans."

Dairy Industries Date Annual Meet

CORVALLIS — New trends in processing and marketing dairy products will be reviewed by state and national leaders at the Oregon Dairy Industries' 46th annual conference Feb. 11 to 14 at Oregon State College.

The ODI represents some 200 Oregon dairy plants serving as outlets for products that gross Oregon farmers about \$50 million annually.

ODI secretary G. H. Wilster, OSC professor of dairy manufacturing, says conference highlights will include a demonstration of a short-time method for making cheddar cheese, dairy promotion and market outlook, and more efficient plant management.

The new method of making cheddar cheese that cuts labor costs and reduces processing time by one-third will be demonstrated for the first time outside the U. S. Department of Agriculture laboratories where it was developed.

Other dairy processing developments on the program include a promising method of butter-making at OSC that makes butter easier to spread at refrigerator temperatures.

Foreign markets and future sales for dairy products under the stepped-up government disposal program will be discussed by C. J. Babcock of the USDA Foreign Agriculture Service.

An annual feature of the conference is naming of Oregon's best makers of ice cream, cheddar and cottage cheese, and butter. Milk and cream entries from dairy plants throughout the state will also be judged.

Wheat-Laden Train Piles Up On Track

SPRAGUE, Wash. — Twenty-two Union Pacific freight cars loaded with wheat jumped the tracks and piled up in a draw northeast of here in Lincoln County.

No one was hurt but 300 feet of track was torn up and A. M. Fueston, the UP wrecker foreman, called it "the worst wreck I've seen in 20 years."

Fifteen of the cars were stacked sideways, others lay sideways on the right of way and two were upended. Wheat was scattered along the twisted track.

They were part of a 97-car freight train made up in Spokane Tuesday night and bound for the Hinkle, Ore. yards. The 22 derailed cars were toward the rear of the train.

Cause of the derailment wasn't known immediately and Fueston said it may take most of this week to return the line to service.

Reno Building Hit Three Times Within 6 Years

RENO, Nev. — Tuesday's explosion was the third disaster in six years to hit the same buildings along Reno's Sierra St. The destroyed buildings were battered twice by roaring floods.

The Gray Reid department store, for example, suffered three-quarters of a million dollars damage in the 1950 flood. The building was remodeled only to be flooded again by the lesser 1955 flood. Wednesday it is an empty shell.

The same experience was suffered by the Elks Club next door and the half-block row of stores and buildings across Sierra St. Only steel girders—abandoned like taffy—rise Wednesday above the rubble filled basement of Patterson's men's store where the smell of gas first brought a call for utility workers and firemen.

The Banker's Trust Building, which contained a number of shops and offices, disappeared—leaving only smoke, steam and rubble.

The Blitz Building's walls stood—but its interior was a ruin.

13-Year-Old Boy Found Strangled By A Rope

SALEM — A 13-year-old boy was found strangled by a rope in his basement Tuesday night, and the coroner reported it may have been an accidental death.

The boy was Frank Emerson Warner, who was found hanging from a rope slung over a water pipe. The coroner said the boy may have been experimenting with the rope.

The mother, Mrs. Beulah Warner, a widow, was away at work. She found the body when she returned at evening. A sister, Linda, 10, was upstairs at the time, unaware anything was wrong.

REHABILITATION STUDY

PORTLAND — A four-year study of how best to rehabilitate state mental hospital patients will be conducted by four state agencies, if they can finance it.

The state Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, Board of Health, Public Welfare Commission and the state hospital estimated here that the program would cost \$800,000.

They have asked the Federal Department of Health Education and Welfare for \$198,150 for the first year.

Northwest To Receive 2½ Billion For Roads

PORTLAND — Chamber of Commerce executives from Oregon and Washington were told Monday that 2½ billion dollars will be spent in the federal government's highway construction program.

Frank E. Andrews, division engineer for the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads, told the annual conference of chamber executives here that 170 million dollars will be spent each year for 13 years in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana.

Another speaker, Oregon State College engineer Lewis A. Stanley, reported that both Oregon and Washington have ample water supplies for foreseeable future needs. This heritage makes possible the development of a great industrial empire, he said.

Clergy Could Enter Politics Under Measure

SALEM — Ministers, priests and rabbis would be able to take full part in political campaigns under a bill introduced in the House Tuesday by its Elections Committee.

The clergy now can make speeches, but the archaic law says they can't otherwise advise any individual how to vote on a candidate or measure.

The new legislation also would remove restrictions on officers of corporations.

It also would provide for filing campaign expense statements before elections, set up a uniform system to find out how much each candidate's campaign costs, and let employees have time off with pay to vote and register.

Broiler Chicken Growers To Consider Commission

SALEM — Broiler chicken growers from throughout Oregon will meet here Feb. 13 to talk over the possibility of forming a state broiler commission to promote the sale of Oregon-grown birds.

The session was called by Cornelius Bateson, Salem, president of the Oregon Broiler Growers Assn.

In an advance notice about the meeting, the association said initial steps might be taken toward forming a commission under the state enabling act.

It requires a petition by 25 or more growers to start action. If the state agriculture director agrees on the need, it is submitted to a vote of growers throughout the state.

Stockholders Of AMC Told Of Pay Schedule

DETROIT — Stockholders of American Motors Corp. were told Wednesday that the corporation paid its officers and directors a total of \$1,055,000 in 1956. They were told the figure compared with \$1,649,000 paid to officers and directors of Nash-Kelvinator and Hudson Motors before the merger of these latter companies into American Motors in 1953.

They also were told that the management of American Motors has an open mind on possible merger with other concerns.

Richard E. Cross, a company director and prominent Detroit attorney, made the remarks during the opening phase of the company's annual meeting here. Cross was substituting as chairman of the meeting for George Romney, hospitalized after emergency surgery Monday.

"We would not reject any merger opportunity that is advantageous to American Motors stockholders," Cross said. He explained to the meeting that questions of salaries and possible mergers were among leading questions in letters from various stockholders.

Multnomah Grand Jury Will Consider Gambling

PORTLAND — The Multnomah County grand jury, which will consider gambling conspiracy accusations and possibly related cases, was in the second day of deliberations Wednesday.

Another grand jury last year indicted William Langley, county district attorney, and two Seattle men, Joseph P. McLaughlin and Thomas E. Maloney, on charges of conspiring to allow gambling here. But a judge last week held there was a legal flaw in the indictments and ordered the cases re-submitted to the current grand jury.

The first witnesses called Tuesday were Harvey E. (Swede) Ferguson, night club operator; former Police Chief Jim Purcell Jr. and his brother, Lt. Bard Purcell, also of the city police.

ARMY CALLS 13,000

WASHINGTON — The Army Wednesday issued a draft call for 13,000 men in April, 1,000 less than for February and March.

The new call raises to 2,193,430 the total number drafted or earmarked for induction since the resumption of selective service in September, 1950.

Overhulse and Dooley will report on the progress of the Legislature in its first three weeks.

SALEM — Oregon roads were in good condition Wednesday, the state Highway Department said. Motorists were advised of chain requirements only in the Timberline, Government Camp and Warm Springs Junction areas.

ORDERED EXILED

SANTIAGO, Chile — The top five leaders of Chile's big Central Workers Union (CUT) have been ordered exiled for three years to remote parts of the country for violating an anti-Communist law. The union called a general strike early last year in defiance of a government order. A federal court last night found that this action by the five men violated Chile's law for the defense of democracy.
