Stengel Banters On Trade Talk

NEW YORK (AP) — Casey Stengel, backed up with another world championship, figures his New York Yankees won't make a trade right now. "I gotta go with what I got," says Casey. "We don't want any strangers on this club."

Only the last part is a jest. "The other clubs say they won't trade with us unless they can get five or six men and maybe hurt us. Now I haven't heard them say that, you understand. But you know they're saying it."

The mighty Casey told an informal press conference Tuesday that as far as the Yankees are concerned, there just aren't any trades to be made. Not right now, anyway.

"I don't need to trade now," said Casey. "I've got some good men on this ball club, some of 'em I'd trade, but if I trade 'em, the other club will play 'em because they're better than the players they have now and then you might get hurt."

Broken down, what he said was this: The Yankees have a pretty good crop of youngsters and second line players. But Casey won't let them go — unless he gets exactly what he wants in return — because they could be first string material on another team and might come back to haunt him.

Next Three Opponents Big Tests For Tarheels

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) — Coach Frank McGuire believes that if his North Carolina basketball team wins its next three games, it will be able to "give any team a battle."

This is quite a statement from a coach whose team has captured 17 straight and is the only undefeated major college in the country. The Tar Heels naturally are No. 1 in the Associated Press poll.

Before Monday's 65-61 double overtime victory over Maryland, McGuire confessed he was worried about two things — the effect of the recent layoff for mid-term examinations and three upcoming games sandwiched around a bus trip.

McGuire's next worry starts Saturday when North Carolina entertains Duke at Chapel Hill. The bus trip to Charlottesville, Va., precedes a Monday night game against Virginia. Then comes the bus trip back for a home game with red-hot Wake Forest next Wednesday.

Four more Atlantic Coast Conference games are scheduled after that, but McGuire feels the next three contests create the biggest obstacle to a continued unblemished record.

Williams Signs \$100,000 Contract; Ponders Future

BOSTON (AP) — Ted Williams, perennial throughout his brilliant career, is mellowing with age — maybe it's just the off season.

The 38-year-old Boston slugger indicated yesterday that he has had a change of mind and might like to stay in baseball after his playing days.

Williams displayed a beaming grin after signing a one-year contract for about \$100,000 which continues him as baseball's highest paid player.

But he turned off the grin and became serious when asked if he would like to remain in baseball when he has to quit as a player.

"After my playing days are over I will do everything possible to help the game," he said. "Other than that I want to fish any time in any place I want."

He thought the matter over carefully for a few more seconds and added:

"Put it this way, I would stay."

USF Coming Around Again After Early-Season Miseries

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The University of San Francisco Dons, the NCAA basketball champions of the past two seasons, appear to finally have shaken the shock of having the school's 60-game winning string snapped.

Coach Phil Woolpert says the letdown after that first loss last December was greater than he had expected but now "the rough edges have worn off and we're ready. When you have a winning streak and then get dumped, it will show. I probably took it as hard as the team."

Two of the fellows largely responsible for the winning streak also were responsible for ending it. All-America Bill Russell and K. C. Jones starred with the Dons against the string on Dec. 11, 1954.

Last Dec. 15, the U.S. Olympic team beat the Dons 83-52 in the Chicago invitational tournament with both Russell and Jones standouts of the Olympic champions.

Although the NCAA labeled the game an exhibition that didn't officially cut the win skin, Woolpert feels that defeat started the emotional letdown. On Dec. 17, Illinois swamped USF 62-33 to officially end the longest winning streak in basketball history.

Before that, the Dons had beaten five teams this season, including Seattle and California, two of the ranking clubs in the nation. After that, troubles set in. Key players were hampered by injuries and Capt. Carl Boldt was dropped from the team for violating a squad rule, nature of which was not announced.

Now the club is on the way up. Last weekend the Dons beat Pepperdine 78-67 and Loyola 66-45 to put themselves back into the California Basketball Assn. championship and a spot in the NCAA playoffs. The season record today is 12-5 with 4-1 in the CBA.

BASEBALL CROWD RECORDS

CLEVELAND (AP) — Cleveland holds practically all of the crowd records in major league baseball. Largest crowd ever to see a night game was registered on Aug. 20, 1948 when 78,382 turned out at Municipal Stadium. Ageless Satchel Paige pitched a three-hitter to beat the Chicago White Sox, 1-0.

Cleveland also holds the daytime record. A crowd of 84,587 paid to see a Sept. 12, 1954 double header with the New York Yankees. On Oct. 10, 1948, Cleveland drew the largest World Series crowd in the fifth game of the series against the Boston Braves.
